"Oh dem golden slipppers" and "Climbing up the golden stair" which were rendered in fine style and a general atmosphere of alkarity and socialibity promoted success, fully diverting the attention of the passengers from the Wiggins affair, which had attained the dimensions of a turious temptest. A large number of assond cabin passengers being present by invitation (whense indeed some of the best talent had been arranged and perforce the chairman had to make the passage in the face of the bilinding gale of wind and rain. 


