The lumberman has mostly all left the woods and general satisfaction is expressed with regard to the winter's work. Operations on the upper part of the North-west have been more extensive this season than for any previous year.

**School Examination in Derby.**

The examination of Miss Mary Kelly's School, District No. 4, Derby, took place on Monday, the 26th inst. The examination was held in the presence of the children, and the results were as follows:  
There were on the Register that day thirty pupils more than at other times, and they were examined in the following branches—Reading, Spelling, Dictation, Composition, History, Geography, Grammar, Analysis, Arithmetic—Mental and on Slate. Besides these branches of Education there were Dialogues and Recitations by the pupils which deserve great praise.  
The examination was a credit to Miss McIntosh. She could not have spent a moment of idleness in the school, or she never could have brought her scholars to their present excellent standard.  
After the examination was ended, Rev. A. B. R. Shewsbury, in his usual good style, made a few appropriate remarks, and Mr. Wm. Bryanton. The latter gentleman was well pleased to see the children improving rapidly. It is pleasing to hear such a teacher in the place, who is not like some teachers I know of, under whose charge the scholars retrograde, instead of advancing. I have much pleasure in saying the examination was a perfect success. May Miss McIntosh be enabled to keep on as she has begun, and there is no doubt that she will turn out first class scholars.
