The Mount Allison Wesleyan College was organized in July, 1862, under a charter obtained from the Legislature of New Brunswick. By virtue of this charter it possesses full University powers. An Act was subsequently passed amending the charter and changing the name of the corporation to "The University of Mount Allison College,"

The College is conducted on strictly non-sectarian principles. The general denominational control under which it is placed furnishes a sufficient guarantee that sceptical license will never be allowed within its walls, but does not imply the existence of a purpose or wish to interfere with the conscientious convictions of any. The fullest recognition, however, is given to the truths and claims of the Christian religion. The Bible is publicly honored as the Word of God, and no pains are spared that the education imparted may be suitably leavened with religious principle.

Students may enter the College either as regular Undergraduates having passed the Matriculation Examination; or as Specialists,

who do not look forward to a University Degree.

There are Honor Courses in Classics, Mathematics, Science,

Philosophy, and in English Language and Literature.

Special Students are admitted to any class or course of Lectures for which, in the judgment of the Faculty, after due examination, they are deemed prepared; and upon leaving the College, they will be entitled to receive Certificates bearing the College Seal, and specifying the particular branches of study in which they have received instruction and passed satisfactory examinations.

Ladies wishing to pursue an undergraduate course will find at Mount Allison facilities for thorough collegiate training under the most favorable conditions as regards health, and domestic and social advantages. Board may be had at the Ladies' College on reasonable terms. In addition to the regular undergraduate work, the best instruction in Music and the Fine Arts is available.

Mount Allison was the first chartered College in Canada to admit women to all the privileges of regular conegiate courses and degrees.

The Matriculation Examinations are held on the second and third days of the First Term of the Collegiate Year.

Certificates of Matriculation from chartered Colleges are accepted in place of the examination. Students holding provincial licenses and non-professional certificates will be exempted from examination in any subject covered thereby.

## DEPARTMENT I.- ENGLISH.

Candidates in English will be expected to be acquainted with the main principles of English Grammar as taught in the Provincial High Schools. To test their power of writing their language accurately, an essay must be written on some special work which they have studied. (For 1896, Scott's Lady of the Lake. For 1897, Longfellow's Evangeline; Tennyson's Enoch Arden.) Other questions will be asked about the text. Special importance is attached to the general analysis of sentences. In addition there will be an examination on the Outlines of English and Canadian History, and General Geography, as in the books severally prescribed by the Educational Departments of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and P. E. Island.

## DEPARTMENT II.—CLASSICS.

Latin — Cæsar, Gallic War, Book I.; Virgil, Æneid, Book I.; Latin Grammar, Harkness. Easy sentences of English to be translated into Latin. Questions in History and Geography, arising out of the Books prescribed. For 1897, the required authors will be Cæsar, Gallic War, Book IV.; Virgil, Æneid, Book II.

Greek — Xenophon, Anabasis, Book III.; Greek Grammar, Hadley's or Goodwin's. For 1897, the required Greek author will be Xenophon, Anabasis, Book I.

[Instead of the Classical selections prescribed, satisfactory equivalents from the same or other authors will be accepted.]

## DEPARTMENT III .- MATHEMATICS.

Arithmetic - Proportion, Interest, Extraction of Square Root, Vulgar and Decimal Fractions.

Note.—Skill in drawing, acquired before matriculation, will be found helpful in all the science studies of the College course.

Candidates for the degree of B. A. will be allowed to take Natural Philosophy, Chemistry, Drawing and French as an equivalent for Greek, viz.:

#### FRENCH.

Grammar—Fasquelle, first 50 lessons, or Edgren, Part First; the Accidence, Fénélon's Telemaque, Books I. and II., or an equivalent. Translations of simple and easy sentences from English into French.

#### \* SENIOR MATRICULATION.

Students may enter the Sophomore Class by passing the ordinary matriculation examinations, together with examinations on the subjects of the Freshman year, or their equivalents. In Physics a laboratory examination will be given in addition to the written one.

#### NOTES.

The equivalent for the two years of Greek is either two years of French and one of German, or two years of German and one of French.

For students taking both Latin and Greek there are thus four full studies for four years; those substituting moderns have one additional study.

Students choosing French or German or Hebrew as one of their optional subjects must continue the same language the following year.

Students taking the full Honors Course in any department may omit one of the optional subjects from either the Junior or the Senior Year.

All students on the college roll shall, during their first year, write ten essays, during their second year eight, and during their third year six. These essays will be carefully revised and returned.

During the Freshman and Sophomore Years all students are required to attend fortnightly a class in elocution.

Every Senior is required to write, and deliver during his Senior Year, three orations at dates fixed at the beginning of the session.

Students in Science of the Freshman and Sophomore Years will be required to prepare permanent note-books of all lectures and experiments. Fifty per cent. of term standing will be determined by the accuracy and neatness of these books.

All Books of Reference may be found in the Library, which is open to students during lecture hours.

Graduates in Arts of this University who during their Undergraduate Course have attended classes in Constitutional History, International Law and Contracts, and have passed their examinations as required by the Law Faculty of Dalhousie College, can graduate in the Law School of said College in two years from time of entrance, provided they take during these two years all other required studies.

The examinations in the Honor Courses are held at the close of the year.

Supplementary examinations will be held twice each year, at the beginning of the first term, while the Matriculation examinations are in progress, and during the second term at different dates for different subjects (see p. 2). Students desiring such examinations must give notice in writing, and at least a fortnight in advance, to the respective Professors of the subjects in which they wish to present themselves. A fee of \$2.00 will be charged for each such examination.

The Degree of Master of Arts may be taken in course by any Bachelor of Arts of three years' standing who shall have taken (during his Undergraduate Course or subsequently) the full honors in any department, and who shall have prepared and forwarded to the President, at least three weeks before the Annual Convocation, a satisfactory thesis on some subject connected with his courses of study.

# Students' Aid Funds.

# SCHOLARSHIPS, PRIZES, ETC.

## THE BRECKEN STUDENTS' AID FUND.

The Income from an Investment of \$5,000, given by the Rev. Ralph Brecken, D. D., will be available hereafter for the assistance of students who may need such aid, under the following conditions and limitations:

- The applicant must show himself worthy by maintaining a good standing in his classes and in regard to his conduct.
- Not more than Fifty Dollars from this Fund will be assigned to any student in one year, but the same student may be a beneficiary of the Fund each year of his course.
- The allocation of these bursaries will be decided by the Faculty, in part according to the relative need, and in part according to the ability of the applicants, as may be determined by examination.

## THE BLACKBURN FUND.

By bequest of the late J. J. Blackburn, Esq., of Shubenacadie, Nova Scotia, a sum of from One Hundred to Two Hundred Dollars annually is placed at the disposal of the President of the University for the educational aid of candidates for the ministry.

## THE ROBERTSON FUND.

A bequest of the late Robert Robertson, Esq., Sen., of St. John, N. B., subject to a life annuity, provides a bursary annually of Twenty-five Dollars for the aid of candidates for the ministry.

Note, —Applications for assistance from the Brecken, the Blackburn, and the Robertson Funds, should be made to the President of the University, not later than the first of September in each year.

#### THE JOST FUND.

By bequest of the late Edward Jost, Esq., of Halifax, N. S., candidates for the ministry of the Methodist Church may receive educational aid annually. The Trustees of this Fund are Messrs. H. G. Laurilliard, A. M. Bell, William Crowe, and Rev. S. F. Huestis, Halifax, to whom application should be made.

#### THE HARRY SHEFFIELD MATHEMATICAL SCHOLARSHIP.

This Scholarship, founded in 1894, in memory of the late Harry A. Sheffield, B. A., '89, of the annual value of about \$60.00, is awarded to that member of the senior class in need of financial assistance who has taken, during his undergraduate course, the highest standing in Mathematics. Winner in 1895, W. M. Black; 1896, Bessie Alexander.

#### The Dr. J. Sinclair Tait Prize.

#### READING ROOM.

A Reading Room, in which are to be found most of the leading Periodicals of the Dominion of Canada, as well as some of the principal newspapers of Great Britain and the United States, is accessible to all the students upon the payment of a moderate fee. The outfit of this room, which occupies a prominent position in the new Residence, has been generously supplied by the Alumni Society.

#### THE EURHETORIAN SOCIETY.

This is a voluntary Literary Society, the history of which reaches back for more than twenty years. Its special objects are the acquisition of readiness and power in debate, and the cultivation of a pure literary taste. Not a few of the Alumni of the Institution who are to-day prominent in the professional and legislative circles of the several provinces of the Dominion, have been enrolled in its membership. The Society, which had entirely outgrown the well-known room provided for it in the old Lodge, has been assigned the use of the large hall in the centre of the new Residence. This fine apartment, 58 x 34 x 16 feet in size, has a hard wood floor and panelled ceiling; and the Society has been enabled, by the help of its old members, to furnish it most handsomely.

#### YOUNG MEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION.

A branch of this society was organized in 1887, and has now a membership of upwards of fifty. Its object is to associate for Christian effort the young men who from year to year attend the University and Academy. A committee of this Association is appointed to meet new students at the railway station, and introduce them to college life. The Association has for its head-quarters a spacious and elegant parlor in the University Residence, the funds for furnishing which were in large part raised through the efforts of lady friends of the students.

## GYMNASIUM.

A commodious Gymnasium, fitted up with modern appliances for athletic exercises and physical development, and under the direction of a competent instructor, is available at a moderate


In all Science classes in which costly apparatus or materials are used, a small laboratory fee will be charged, to be paid when a student enters his name in a class. The supply of apparatus has been greatly enlarged through the munificence of Rev. Ralph Brecken, D. D., and every effort will be made to afford the students full courses of practical demonstration, and the use of as many instruments as can be entrusted to them. The list of charges will be posted on the laboratory door at the beginning of each term. Breakages and carelessness in regard to the property of the department will subject a student to extra charges, or permanent dismissal from the class.

Students who, upon examination, may be admitted to an advanced position in the Undergraduate Course, and non-residents, who may apply for examination, will be charged the usual Class Fee in each subject.

The higher charges will be exacted for all rooms except a limited number in the rear part of the building.

The Residence, a cut of which appears on the opposite page, is designed in plan and equipment to promote in the highest possible degree the comfort and convenience of its occupants. The site is one of ideal appropriateness and beauty-elevated without being unduly exposed, and combines all conditions favorable to health and agreeable living. The building is heated and ventilated by the Smead-Dowd system of uniformly warmed and constantly changed air. Drainage (which natural conditions favor) and plumbing have received special attention according to the most improved modern methods. Pure spring water has been brought to every storey, and numerous well-equipped bath-rooms are constantly available. The building throughout has been lighted by electricity. In general, a connected parlor and bed-room are allotted to each pair of students, though for such as prefer them, a small number of single and double rooms are at command. The dining-room is spacious, lofty, and particularly well lighted, with a handsome panelled ceiling. In entire keeping with the general character of the interior are fine roomy apartments designed for use as kitchens, pantries, servants' common rooms, laundry, drying

## THE HARRIET A. STEWART HOSPITAL.

The handsome suite of rooms designed for use as an infirmary has been provided with a complete modern hospital outfit through the kindness of the children of the late Mrs. Harriet Augusta Stewart, of Sackville. Collectively these apartments as thus furnished are known as "The Harriet A. Stewart Hospital."

An advance payment of \$40 on account of board is required at the beginning of each term.

Students will be charged for any damage done to rooms or furniture during their occupancy.

A supply of the necessary Text Books, Stationery, etc., is kept on hand in the University Office, and furnished to the Students as needed by them; and the articles so supplied are charged in the

## General Governmental Regulations, Etc.

Students, both Regular and Special, are expected to conduct themselves with propriety, and to observe all the regulations of the Faculty as announced from time to time. Students whose conduct or progress in study shall continue, after suitable admonition, to be unsatisfactory, will not be allowed to remain in the Institution.

Regular and punctual attendance at their classes shall be im-

perative on all students.

No student shall be absent from the College after ten o'clock at

night without special permission of the President.

All students are expected to attend Divine Service on Sunday, and to be punctual in attendance at daily prayers in the College Chapel.

Without necessarily involving expulsion from College, students may be debarred from the privileges of the Residence for failure to conform

to the recognized standards of gentlemanly conduct.

No student shall resort to any tavern or place where intoxicating liquors are sold without special permission of the President; and no student who is known to use intoxicating drinks will be allowed to retain his connection with the College.

The use of tobacco on the College premises is not permitted.

Undergraduates are expected to provide themselves with College caps and gowns, and to wear them at Classes and Lectures, at Church, and at all public Collegiate exercises and anniversaries.



### Degree of B. D.

They are required to pass a satisfactory examination in all the subjects of the three years' course of study, and to prepare for delivery a satisfactory thesis on some Biblical or Theological subject, which shall be forwarded to the Dean at least three weeks before the Annual Convocation.

Persons other than graduates in Arts may pass examinations in this course, and, if successful, receive certificates to that effect.

Special facilities are offered to graduates in Arts who wish to reside in the College while pursuing this course.

## Candidates for the Ministry.

Candidates for the Ministry of the Methodist Church of Canada, who have been appointed to attend College, will pursue the course of study prescribed on page 192 of the Discipline of the Church.

The Educational Society of the Methodist Church makes provision for free tuition, and aids in meeting the general expenses of young men appointed by the Conference to attend College.

## Preliminary Course of Study.

This Course of Study is designed to meet the wants of young men preparing to offer themselves to be received on trial for the ministry. It embraces all the subjects prescribed for the preliminary and first year's examinations of the Methodist Conference, and may extend over one, two, or three years, according to the previous attainments and circumstances of the student.

The Theological parts of this course may be pursued in connection with Matriculation in Arts.

The English and Classical parts of this Course are prepared in the Academy and College.

Students presenting themselves for admission to this Course should bring with them letters of introduction from the Superintendent Ministers of the Circuits in which they reside. If they expect to offer themselves for the ministry at the close of the year, they must be recommended from the quarterly meeting of their own circuits, and not from the Sackville quarterly meeting. Students bringing with them certificates of such recommendation will be exempted from fees for theological tuition. Licenses as exhorters or local preachers should also, in all cases, issue from the Superintendent and quarterly meeting of the Circuit in which the student resides, and where his church membership and standing should be continued.

After examination at the close of the College year, all students in the preliminary course will return home in time to be presented at their own district meetings, in case they wish to be received on trial by the Conference.

#### Societies.

Two Societies have been established having a relation to this department. The one is designed for the benefit of the Theological students in the College; and the other to serve as a connecting link between them and the ministers laboring in the three Conferences of the Maritime Provinces, as well as to promote among the latter a spirit of theological and ministerial culture.

Among the students it is proposed, by means of Essays, Exegetical Papers, and Oral discussions, to stimulate inquiry as to the best methods of ministerial efficiency, and so to assist in preparing each other for the great work of preaching the Gospel and feeding the flock of Christ.

The Ministers' Theological Union will meet at the close of each Collegiate year, and, in addition to the consideration of topics of interest belonging to their work, will have an annual Sermon preached and a Theological Lecture delivered. The Rev. WM. Dobson, will preach the annual Sermon, and the Rev. Joseph Seller, M. A., will deliver the annual Lecture in 1897.


