MINUTES OF THE PROCEEDINGS

THE LONDON CONFERENCE

OF

THE METHODIST CHURCH,

HELD IN THE CITY OF LONDON, ONTARIO, 1888.

The Conference began its Sessions in the Queen's Avenue Methodist Church, in the City of London, on Thursday, June the 7th, 1888, at 9 a.m.,—the Rev. W. S. PASCOE, D.D., President, in the chair.

After singing the 753rd hymn, and the reading of the 2nd chapter of 2nd Timothy by the Secretary of the Conference, the Revs. John Reynolds and J. M. Collins led in prayer.

The Secretaries of Districts presented the names of the laymen appointed delegates to this Conference.

The President then submitted the following report of the Transfer Committee:—

QUESTION.—What Ministers or Probationers for the Ministry have died during the Year?

JOHN HICKS EYNON.

The Rev. John Hicks Eynon was born in Gloucestershire, England, on May 6th, 1801. While quite a young man he was soundly converted to God through the instrumentality of a lady evangelist, who afterwards became his wife, and was his able fellow-laborer both in the old land and in this country. In 1826 he entered the ministry in the Bible Christian Church, in England, and for six years made full proof of his ministry. He showed himself so adapted to misson work, being naturally fearless and robust, and fitted to toil in the hardest and most laborious fields, that he was chosen for such work in Canada. One missionary preceded him in 1831, but he had grown discouraged with the difficulties he had to meet, and had turned aside to some other employ. Bro. Eynon was appointed to the field that had been so abandoned in 1832. On his arrival he entered upon his hard and important mission with characteristic ardor and pluck. Not a little was he indebted to his noble and saintly wife for advice, encouragement, and aid in proclaiming to the settlers in the woods the message of Divine mercy. She was removed to a better world long ago, but her work as well as his remains. As the work developed under his supervision, laborer after laborer was sent to his aid, or was raised up among his sons in the gospel in this country, until in 1854, the late Bible Christian Conference was formed, which was from the first financially independent of the parent Conference in England. For many years he was the Treasurer of the Missionary Society of the Canadian Conference. He took his full share of Circuit work, until 1859, when through enfeebled health he had to apply for superannuation. Until October, 1883, he resided in Darlington, and labored as health and strength permitted in proclaiming the sinner's Friend. Extreme deafness prevented his working to advantage in social means of grace, yet his place at the prayer and class-meetings was seldom vacant. house and delighted in its hallowed services. The last few years of his life were spent in Exeter, and until "age and feebleness extreme" prevented, he occasionally went into the neighboring Circuits to tell the old yet ever new story of the love of Christ to men. One of his ministerial brethren, writing since the death of the veteran pioneer minister, says of him? "Pious dispositions were strong in his soul, and he recommended them with force to others. His love to God was strong and abiding, and his love to perishing men correspondingly so. He hungered and thirsted after spiritual things, and inspired others with living faith and earnestness. "The love of Christ constrained" him, and he felt that to train immortal souls for virtue, for God, for heaven and eternity, was no mean work. He was deeply impressed with the sense of his great responsibility, and from county to county, township to township, and house to house, he went telling the story of the cross of Christ."

He was strongly opposed to the union of the Methodist Church in this country, believing that more and better work might be done for God under the stimulus of friendly rivalry. His was no factious opposition, however; as he had openly expressed his views and manfully maintained them, he yielded to the logic of events, and quietly fell into line with the rest of his brethren.

His last illness was brief, and when free from delirium, his words and looks indicated how truly he was prepared for the momentous change that awaited him. On Thursday, March 22nd, 1888, he passed away from earth in great peace, in the eighty-seventh year of his age, and the sixty-second of his ministry.

THE SUNDAY-SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

We rejoice in the continued prosperity of the Sunday-schools of our When we think that 200,000 of the children of the Dominion re attending these schools, it is difficult to overestimate their influence pon the character of the coming generation. Believing, then, that in he careful teaching and training of the youth in all things which tend to ourify and exalt individual and national life, lies the key to the solution of the problem of the world's evangelization, we recommend:

1. That increased attention be paid to the provision made for instruction in the principles of temperance, and that the total abstinence pledge be explained and commended to the children and young people of the Church. The number who signed the pledge last year was 3,549; this year,

turns furnished present the fol-3,723; increase, 174.

2. That the graded catechisms of the Church be placed in the hands of the children, and that regular instruction be given in the same. Number learning catechism last year, 2,926; this year, 2,352.

3. That the direct leading of the scholars to Christ, as a present and perfect Saviour from sin, be ever kept before the mind as the true end of all Sunday-school work. Number of conversions last year, 946; this year,

1,065; increase, 119.

4. That the parents of the children, and the teachers and officers of the schools, render all needed co-operation in carrying out the provisions of the Discipline, section 2, paragraph 95, which relates to the gathering of the children into classes, and giving them instruction in things pertaining to experimental godliness.

5. That the excellent Sunday-school papers published at our own Book Room, which are so loyal to Church and State, receive the hearty and practical support of the Sunday-school authorities. We look with pleasure upon the gratifying fact that the increase in the circulation of those peri-

pdicals for the past year is 19,239.

6. Recognizing that the Sabbath-school Aid and Extension Fund has argely helped many new and poor schools, which are becoming the nuclei of future churches, we call attention to the importance of taking up this collection, and that it should be as liberal as possible. Amount raised

this year, \$229.06; last year, \$194.01; increase, \$35.05.

7. Noting the great disparity between the number of children attendng Sunday school and the number in attendance upon the regular services out the Circuit of the Church, we recommend that parents, pastors and teachers, examine tention be paid into and endeavor to remove the cause or causes. As an aid in that diites of the pre-rection, we suggest that, at least once a quarter, one of the church services be so arranged and conducted as to be specially interesting and profitable n improvement to the children.

According to the estimates of the Financial Committee of the General Conference, it will require \$7,500 to meet the claims on the Fund. This, I think, is a moderate estimate in view of the expenses of the past rear

The actual amount received from the Conferences during the year is only \$1,552.33. I am aware that some of the Conferences had paid a large proportion of the collections of the then current year just before the General Conference, but the collections for the following year should have been aid in before the 31st August. After making all due allowances, the amounts paid by the Conferences during the year were shamefully mall.

If this state of things should continue till the close of the quadrennium, there will be no funds to pay the expenses of the delegates to the General Conference of 1890. The officers appointed by the General Conference are forbidden to "disburse more than the amount in hand." The question, therefore, is assuming a serious aspect, and it becomes my duty to lay the facts before the parties interested at this early date, that they may govern themselves accordingly.

The Fund, at the close of the year, was indebted to the Treasurer \$7,921.70. It is scarcely necessary to say that this state of things cannot be continued. Some provision must evidently be made at an early date to meet the expenses of the Fund. I know of no available method of doing this, unless the Conferences provide in some way for the prompt payment annually of the amounts allotted to them by the Financial Committee of the General Conference.

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Treasurer's Report for the year ending July 31st, 1887.

In presenting this Report for the consideration of the Board, the Treasurer has pleasure in stating:-

1. That there has been an increase in the Permanent Fund amounting to \$4,244.23.

2. The estimates for the year, which were made with great care, were sufficient to meet the expenditure, and the debt has been considerably reduced. It was the desire of the Treasurer to make these estimates as close as possible, in order to keep the assessments to Circuits down to the lowest possible amounts.

3. The annual income from all sources has fully met the expectations of the Treasurer. Notwithstanding the low rates of interest, there has been an increase realized from this source of \$1,679.29. A part of this increase, however, should have been paid in and accounted for in last year's Report. The Book Room has paid \$6,000 to the Fund, an increase of \$2,000. The several Annual Conferences have paid the amounts in full apportioned to them, with very trifling exceptions, which are very

4. The claimants have been paid in full, and the debt, with which we commenced the year, has been reduced \$1,667.25, leaving only a balance of \$1,044.95.

5. On the whole, the working of the new law has been an encouraging success during this, the first year of its existence, and augurs well for the future. I do not claim for it absolute perfection, but it cannot be changed till the next General Conference. As we cannot "mend" it till then, let us, as ministers and laymen, "keep it," and, with the improvements that may be made at the next General Conference, it will be a lasting blessing to the Church in all times to come.

We endorse the sentiment contained in the memorial from the London District, recommending that only unfermented wine be used by our people for sacramental purposes. We are thankful for the Canada Temperance Act—which is in itself a prohibitory measure—and for the good it has accomplished. We are opposed to any and every license system, because the liquor business is an evil, and to license it is a sin in the sight of God. For God hath said by the mouth of the prophet Habakkuk, ch. 2, v. 15: "Woe unto him that giveth his neighbor drink, that puttest thy bottle to him and makest him drunken also." Surely a license system does all this. It is, therefore, contrary to God's word; while the "Scott Act"-a prohibitory measure—is in accord with the word of God. We regret the recent reverses in some "Scott Act" counties, but we know that the cause of Temperance must march on. "Truth crushed will rise again." The eternal years to come belong to truth. The Canada Temperance Act. as an educator, has done, and is doing, grand work. It is nonsense to talk about more liquor being consumed in counties where the Act is in force, than in license counties. Statistics inform us that the consumption of intoxicants is far less under the Scott Act : crime also has been greatly lessened by it.

We express thanks for a visit from a delegation under the presidency of the Rev. Thomas Cosford, sent by the Convention of the Temperance Alliance of the County of Middlesex, who reported very favorably on the working of the "Scott Act," and the cause of Temperance in that county.

Doubtless other efforts at repeal will follow those which have been made in some parts with success—which success was owing not only to the strenuous efforts of the liquor party, but also to the delinquency of some of the officials of the law, as well as the comparative indifference of many temperance men among whom, we are sorry to say, are not a few who profess the religion of our Lord Jesus Christ.

We, therefore, take this opportunity of expressing our appreciation of the services of those who have been faithful in the discharge of their duties in enforcing the law, and we pledge hearty co-operation with all

who are legitimately fighting for its maintenance.

We firmly believe that "the powers which be" should see that this law is respected and as honestly enforced as any other law. And while the "Scott Act" is not all we want—as prohibition for the Dominion is our motto-yet as a stepping-stone to something better, we will seek to use it as far as possible; and we call upon our people to hold on to what they have until the Government shall give us a more satisfactory prohibitory

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

We rejoice to know that the people of our land are interested in the question of Sabbath Observance as never before. We are sorry that the recommendations of your Committee of a year ago, anent Sunday railway and steamboat traffic, have not been acted upon as extensively as desired, and that the petitions sent to Circuits by the St. Thomas Ministerial Association,

have not been circulated on all our fields. However, petitions have been signed and forwarded to Ottawa from some of our Circuits, requesting the Dominion Parliament to take such steps as may secure the total abolition of railway and steamboat traffic on the Lord's Day. This movement has drawn the attention of the people to the wholesale violations of the Sabbath; has moulded public opinion on this great question; has led many of the people, deprived of the benefits of the Sabbath, to hope for their return, and has drawn from some of the railway presidents declarations of their readiness to reduce said Sunday traffic to the minimum demanded by public opinion. Our legislators have been brought to see and feel that legislation must be forthcoming that will secure a better observance of the Lord's Day.

We would urge our ministers and members to do all in their power to prevent the Sunday visiting and the pleasure seeking so commonly practised, and to use their influence in every way they can in putting an end to all unnecessary work on the best of days that God has given.

We would recommend that the Conference appoint a committee to confer with committees that may be appointed by other Churches to secure the better observance of the Sabbath. We would also recommend that the Committee consist of the following, viz.: Revs. Dr. Ryckman, J. Philp, J. M. Hodson, M.A., and Messrs. Wm. Bowman, of London, and James Beattie, of Sarnia.

OF THE

LONDON CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

TO THE

CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,—The established custom of sending forth an annual letter from the seat of Conference to the members of our Church is designed to be helpful and suggestive, to enkindle greater zeal in all our hearts towards Connexional interests; to awaken, strengthen and increase our faith in the great verities of religion, and to bind all our hearts together in Christian fellowship and sympathy, as "laborers together with God" in heralding "the truth as it is in Jesus," not only throughout the bounds of our own Conference, but also in the "regions beyond," where God has placed before us open doors.

The review of another ecclesiastical year awakens profound thanks-giving to God. Thousands have been guided into the first stage of Church life and "received on trial;" and yet so numerous have been the defections and withdrawals from the membership of our Church, that after the toils and self-sacrificing labors of ministers, local preachers, class leaders, and other "fellow laborers," we have to record the painful and startling fact that only seventy-three of an increase can be reported in the membership of our Conference, while more than one District reports a decrease in their membership roll. Can it be possible that we are barely holding our own? When shall the outlying population be reached and saved? Is there danger in encouraging superficial work in our revival services?

We cheerfully recognize the value and helpfulness of regularly appointed evangelists, whose doctrines and methods are in harmony with our own views and teachings. But we desire to remind you that the whole Church cannot wait for the coming of special messengers, and we would emphasize the Scriptural admonition to every pastor, "do the work of an evangelist," and would urge all our members to rally around their own pastors with as much fervor, zeal and faith as they are wont to manifest when other laborers are present, that we may have constant accessions to the Church, and "times of refreshing from the presence of the Lord."

We are more and more concerned to foster and develop a love for wholesome literature in our Sabbath-schools, and in the homes of our people. One of the clearest thinkers and closest observers of this hour, whose position and facilities enable him to form a correct judgment, says of the Methodist people: "In the old time our people read the Bible and the standard works more than they do now." Indeed, it was one of the first in the world that aimed s high or claimed so much for women. Nor can it now come as the only one in our own Church, for they have so multiplied that the competition for patronage is as keen as in any commercial calling.

We come, as usual, to greet you, and to assure you of our sympathy and co-operation in your great work. Ours differs from yours, but it i both preparatory and auxiliary to it.

Our course of study, as you will see from our catalogue, is both broad and practical. The mastery of it will imply a familiarity with the lead ing lines of culture of the present day. We are satisfied that if the gradu sport of bal, Rev ates of the Literary Course had a fair equivalent allowed for the extra work they had done in Music and Art, their work would be found full q., Q.C largeme equal to that required for the ordinary B.A. An equitable system of edu mber o cation would make such allowance.

But we believe that the study of the Scriptures should run all through a Christian education. In the preparatory year our junior pupils become familiar with the Gospel by Matthew. In the Academic year they take the Acts of the Apostles, thus finishing New Testament history.
