The Larmer's Corner. Manure for Grass.

No crop gets less attention than rarely for itself alone. Corn, wheat seeded the young clover takes what is left. What, then, might not the result be, if the same whatever else he may do the farmer care was taken of the clover field as of other crops? It does not need cultivating; the long, deep reaching roots mellow and pulverize the soil ing Jackets, as nothing else can. If the clover grows thriftily, the top acts as a mulch, shading the ground and keeping it moist. A crop of two tons or more of clover, whether ploughed under or cut for hay, can hardly fail to leave the soil better than it was before. It should be the farmer's aim to grow the largest possible crops of clover. A slight dressing of gypsum-one hundred pounds per acre in early spring-often produce wonderful results. But if a farmer has a little well rotted manure, the scrapings of barnyards, fall is the time to apply it. Clover is often injured by freezing and thawing in winter, a very slight covering of manure will afford a great deal of protection. Rich earth from corners again be in demand, I would respectfully intimate that I have just received a short distance on young clover, provided the ground is hard and firm. If the field is not to be mowed next season, coarser manure can be used. -Country Gentleman.

Top Dressing Orchards.

The London Garden says: "Top dressing can be applied to orchard trees on grass with the perfect confidence that improved crops will follow, although the grass itself, may be the first to show the benefit of top dressing. There is before us an instance of an orchard of apple trees planted on thin gravelly soil; the trees were covered with moss and stunted, although not by any means old (about 25 years.) The grass of this orchard has been mown year after year for the sake of tidiness, thus exhausting the soil more than the trees did. A rather rough system of top dressing was inaugurated at a sacirfice of appearance; all sorts of refuse material were wheeled or carted into the orchard and spread over the surface, tan, the old soil and rubbish from the potting beuch, sweepings and scrapings of roads, &c., until a considerable thickness of material had accumulated. The first result was N B W a troublesome growth of grass, which was kept down with the scythe, but not cleared away-on the contrary allowed to rot on the surface. By and by the trees began to emit quantities of young roots from the lower parts of their boles into the top dressing, and the second result was that the next crop of apples was considerably larger and of a much improved quality; the branches were severely thinned to admit light and air, well dusted with quick lime to remove moss and lichens, and they were amply repaid annually by this simple

EXPERIMENTS WITH BEETS .- W. F. Fish writes to the Cultivator:-Upon one-fourth of an acre of land sixteen NEW YEAR loads of good manure from a sheep shed were drawn and spread about the last of March. The beet seed was sown May 17th, in rows three feet apart and the plot rolled. Then, as an experiment, salt was thrown on all the ground at the rate of ten "SALTER BRICK STORE. bushels per acre, except on two rows, sixteen rods long, through the middle of the piece. The growth of the plants on which no salt was put was more rapid at first than where salted, but when the dry weather came on that advantage was lost.
