A CANADIAN SCULPTOR

The Canadian press has said little or nothing in regard to a young man of this country who is winning world-wide eminence as a sculptor. His name is R. Tait Mackenzie. He is a native of Ontario, and is a graduate in medicine of McGill University.

While filling the position of athletic instructor to McGill students he utilized his leisure hours to develop his talents as a sculptor, making a specialty of athletic subjects and taking the young men under his care as models for his work. His first venture was "The Sprinter", representing an athlete getting ready to run. Later he turned his activities to the United States, becoming physical instructor at the University of Pennsylvania and contemporaneously continuing work with marked success in art.

Recently he has been producing figures of great merit, among these being a statue placed in the Pennsylvania campus or guardrail at Whitefield, "The Boy Scout", a statuette of Captain J. W. Drummond, of Montreal, which is being placed in the National Museum at Ottawa, and "The Ouzelgait" which is shown in the Museum of Fine Arts at Montreal.

Last year he presented an excellent exhibition of his work in London, England, with the result that he received flattering and deserved commendation from the press of that great city; and in addition was awarded with a \$8,000 pound commission to design and execute a war memorial for the University of Cambridge, the tower of Cambridge and Cambridgeshire.

The figure he has modelled for this purpose represents the home-coming of a young soldier, and is described as an achievement of high merit by British and United States newspapers and magazines. His fame appears to be better known and more fittingly praised abroad than in his native land. While it is true that Canada has been somewhat backward in producing anything notable along such lines and has always been slow in manifesting her appreciation of this kind of work, especially in a monetary way, she indeed has reason to be proud of her ambitious son R. Tait Mackenzie who has become such a brilliant exponent of art.

The body will lie in state until tomorrow night, when it will be removed to the pro-cathedral. Archbishop Hayes will preside at solemn requiem mass at 11 o'clock Wednesday morning, the funeral and burial at Glasnevin taking place immediately thereafter.

Irishmen of all ranks and of all ages have paid tribute to the memory of Griffith. The Free State has lost in him a pillar of strength.

Michael Collins, interviewed today at the field headquarters of the National army termed Arthur Griffith's death a calamity for Ireland, and said it was not too late for Eamon De Valera and his followers to honor the passing of a great patriot by accepting the terms the Free State government had offered to achieve the unity of Ireland.

The commander in chief added that he would continue his military work until the trouble was ended.

Lloyd George Sends Regards.

London, Aug. 14.—The premier, Mr. Lloyd George, has sent his regards to Mr. Collins, head of the Irish revolution.

BRAWNY IRISHMAN HERO OF ADRIATIC

CAUSE NOT KNOWN

New York, Aug. 14.—On time and a watch instead of turning on the alarm, a brawny Irishman heroically crawled into a gas filler hole to rescue "one of my men" and seven men were killed. The cause of the explosion is not known.

At 10:30 p.m. on Friday night, a fire broke out in the boiler room of the White Star liner Adriatic, which was docked at the pier. The fire spread rapidly and in a few minutes the ship was in flames. The fire was extinguished after about an hour, but the damage was extensive. Seven men were killed and several others were injured.

The fire was caused by a gas leak in the boiler room. The cause of the leak is not known. The ship was carrying 500 passengers and 100 crew members.

J. L. STEWART IS AGAIN HONORED

Presented With a Grand Master's Jewel At Toronto, N. S.

Toronto, N. S., Aug. 9.—The 65th annual meeting of the Grand Lodge, I. O. O. F. opened at Toronto this morning with a large assembly of delegates present. They were greeted by Grand Master C. L. Wood, Windsor. Visiting members included Grand Master Sharpe, Ontario, and Grand Chaplain Shaw, of Washington, D. C. Grand Master's jewels were presented to J. L. Stewart, Gatham, N. B.; W. H. Westborough, Grand Pre, N. S.; John H. Sutherland, of Halifax and H. W. Rogers, Amherst.

AVIATORS KILLED.

Cleveland, O., Aug. 14.—Louis Yahn, 21, Newark, and James Bay, 21, mechanic and aviator at the Medina Aviation Club, were killed near Medina, Ohio, yesterday, when their airplane went into a tail spin and fell about 200 feet.

Fireman A. D. Dibley, J. Redmond, who were killed outright, and Fireman John Norman, who died from burns. All were from Liverpool. Robert McCarty, Simon Howley and Edward Duggan, all Liverpool firemen, were injured and the latter, still unconscious, is not expected to live.

NOTED JOURNALIST DIED AT LONDON

Viscount Northcliffe Expired Monday Morning—Was Outstanding Figure In Newspaper World.

PROMINENT POLITICIAN

London, Aug. 14.—Viscount Northcliffe, noted British publicist, died this morning.

News of Lord Northcliffe's death was given out by the doctors who have been attending him, in the following bulletin: "Viscount Northcliffe died at 10.12 o'clock. The end was perfectly peaceful."

The death of no official personage could have made a deeper impression in England than that of Lord Northcliffe. The news was not a surprise, as the bulletins issued by the doctors for the last week plainly indicated that their patient was dying.

Lord Northcliffe was by far the greatest figure in British journalism, and the first question on everyone's lips was as to what effect his death would have on the policies of the Times and his other newspapers, which since the end of the war have strongly opposed the Lloyd George administration and its principles, with the notable exception of its dealings with Ireland, which the Northcliffe press supported throughout.

Medical terms used in giving the cause of Lord Northcliffe's death were ulcerative endocarditis, streptococcal septicemia and terminal anoxaemia.

Blood Poisoning Caused Death.

Later it was stated that the cause of Lord Northcliffe's death was suppurative, or the production of pus within the heart, which was followed by acute blood poisoning.

ELEVEN MISSING FROM RALEIGH

Some of Crew Failed to Reach Shore When British Warship Struck.

St. John's, Mtd., Aug. 10.—The number of missing from the British cruiser Raleigh, which went ashore at 4 o'clock Tuesday afternoon about a quarter of a mile west of Point Amour light, Labrador, still stood at 11 tonight according to latest advices here from the wireless operator at Point Amour.

The ship, messages announce struck on a shoal and is lying easily about 200 yards from shore. Her waterline is a few feet under water at the bow and the same above stern. The extent of the damage to the bottom of the ship is not known but, apparently, she is in no great danger.

The crew, following the striking of the Raleigh, took provisions ashore and made quarters.

The Raleigh with the Calcutta arrived at Curling, Newfoundland, August 2, from St. Lawrence and Admiral Pakenham transferred from the flagship to the Calcutta preparatory to making a trip along the Labrador coast. The Calcutta left Curling August 3, followed by the Raleigh next day, the latter going to Hawkes Bay. It was intended that the two should rejoin and make a trip around Newfoundland, including a call at St. John's. The Raleigh was en route to join the Calcutta at Forteau Bay when she struck. The Raleigh is commanded by Commander S. S. Spencer.

Made Highest Marks In High School Entrance Examinations.



UNNECESSARY LOSSES.

The Mount Allison Record devotes a recent issue to "information concerning the three hundred former Mount Allison students who are now resident in the United States."

If a list were made of all the graduates of all the educational institutions in the Maritime Provinces who are now living across the border, it would be something of an eye-opener to Canadians. We educate our youth and they migrate to other countries because the opportunities of a successful career are lacking at home. We cannot blame them for going abroad for ambition's call must be heeded if success is to result. The only remedy is to provide equally good opportunities at home. While it is true that many who have gone to other countries would have found places here, it is only natural that ambitious youth should seek the larger field. While college graduates form only a mere fraction of this movement, large numbers of young men and women have gone to Western Canada as well as to the States. To the West we have contributed not only farmers, but teachers, lawyers, doctors, university professors and statesmen.

Although this movement to other provinces possesses a unifying influence rather than a detrimental one, nevertheless it does not speak well for the maritime provinces. These provinces by the sea constitute a country of unlimited natural resources, which are capable of backing industrial and commercial activities which would offer enticing opportunities to our young people. If New Brunswick, with all that the next few years give promise of, can create more opportunities for her youth, every energy should be employed to achieve that objective, for gratifying dividends will ultimately result from such an undertaking.

NOTE AND COMMENT.

MANY BIG GAME HUNTERS COMING

Chief Game Warden Says Many Enquiries Are Being Received.

St. John, Aug. 15.—New Brunswick will have a record number of tourists for the hunting season according to information given out by L. A. Gagnon, chief game warden, while in the city yesterday. Already there have been inquiries from a larger number of hunters in the United States than ever before at this season of the year regarding hunting facilities in the province and the indications are that the guides will have a busy time if they attempt to accommodate all those who would like to be piloted through the big game regions.

There will be an open season for partridge again this year as there was last fall. The season will last for three weeks, opening on October 1 and closing on October 31. The season for big game will be two weeks shorter than last year and will extend from October 1, to November 30.

NEW ROAD MAP.

J. Charlton Berris, secretary of the New Brunswick Automobile Association, has prepared a motor car road map of the province which clearly shows the routes across and up and down the province, as well as the Maine state road paralleling the New Brunswick boundary. The map is invaluable to motorists and is to be posted in places where visiting motorists will see it.

RAILWAY NEWS

Port Coquitlam, B.C.—On July 29 the city treasurer received \$16,000, the C. P. R. taxes, which were not really payable until August 31. There is jubilation in the city. Hall for these taxes are the first paid since the expiry of the by-law fixing the flat rate.

St. John, N.B.—All the C. P. R. employees now living who served in the recent war will have a token to commemorate their sacrifices in the shape of a scroll which is a fine piece of work and is almost a copy of the large bronze tablet unveiled by the C. P. R. here on April 25, 1922. The scroll is signed by E. W. Beatty, President C. P. R., and E. Alexander, Secretary. The inscription on the scroll reads:

"In honor of duty nobly done, this scroll serves to commemorate that while in the service of the Canadian Pacific Railway the recipient's name (appears here), relinquished his position in response to the call of King and country and served during the Great War 1914-1918."

Retina.—The Saskatchewan better farming train brought its highly successful tour to a conclusion recently and Mr. Williams, agricultural agent of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, expressed his belief that this train, the biggest yet operated, with the biggest attendance, also got bigger and better result than any of its predecessors. "Many siles," said Professor Williams, of the Animal Husbandry Department of the College of Agriculture, Ypsen, Feutbert, the Somme, Vimy, Hill 70, Passchendaele, Amiens, Cambrai, Drocourt-Queant and Mon. Lubrication, ignition and carburetor troubles were the chief matters upon which farmers sought the assistance of Mr. Josephson in the "mechanical" car, and he believed that an unprecedented number of power users benefited by bringing the problems for solution to the better farming train.

Both the household science and the forestry sections were very busy throughout the trip. In the field husbandry car Miss Brayford's bees attracted considerable attention. This lady has kept bees for many years, and "Wavote" and last year's output of honey reached well over 900 pounds. J. K. Finlayson, who was in charge of the poultry car, the greater part of the trip, states there seems to be a good deal of doubt regarding the cotton fronted poultry house, some complaining that the birds freeze their combs. This, he said, was because the house was overcrowded, and the more hens there are the more moisture comes from the condensing breath. A hen's temperature is 106, and she can stand the air in dry. The cotton fronted poultry house had insulated walls.

Agriculture.—The total attendance for the tour was 32,881, and surpassed the former best on record by 107. The difference between this year and last year would have been many more had it not been for the fact that heavy rains spoiled the last day's attendance, when three meetings were scheduled. The average daily attendance was 1,081, and the total attendance was computed of 2,275 men; 4,222 women; 25,271 boys and girls; and 2,308 babies.

THE DOLLAR ABOUT PAR.
The Canadian dollar in the Wall Street money market is practically of the same value as the United States dollar. Yesterday the discount was only one-thirty-second of one per cent, a difference of one cent on \$32. The cessation of coal shipments from the United States to Canada is held partly accountable for the late rise in Canadian money, which is now worth more than it has been since during the war emergency. In 1920 the discount was 1 1/2 per cent., the high point.

HAD GOOD TIME.
The New Brunswick Canadian Girls in Training Camp broke up on Wednesday morning August 9th, after ten days at Wagescum Camp grounds on the Salmon River, four miles below Chipman. Eighty campers including leaders and girls spent ten enjoyable days. An interesting programme was carried out daily, consisting of Bible study, swimming, basketball, nature study, dramatics and physical instruction. The Campbellton girls attending this camp arrived home Friday evening.

NEW COMMERCIAL DEPARTMENT.
The Campbellton School Board have made arrangements to open on Aug. 28th a department in the Grammar School to teach commercial subjects, English Literature and Composition, Bookkeeping, Typewriting, Arithmetics etc. A highly recommended instructor for the department, Mr. John R. Vallis, who has been teaching these subjects for several years at Mount Allison has been engaged. Pupils who have High School entrance certificates may take this course if desired in preference to the regular academic course of the High School. This course is under the direction of a vocational committee appointed by the School Board and under the Vocational Education Board of New Brunswick.

OPENING OF SCHOOLS.
The Public Schools will re-open for the ensuing term on MONDAY, AUGUST 28th. All children of 6 years or over entering the primary grade, and all others not previously enrolled, and all students from outside of town, must present certificates of vaccination and obtain permits. The secretary will be in the Grammar School, from 7 to 8:30 each evening from the 17th to the 22nd, and in the Roseberry Street School on the 23rd and 24th to issue permits. D. BRITISH WARSHIPS NOW TARGETS
London, England.—Having found no buyers for the great group of battleships which the Washington conference decreed should be scrapped, Great Britain is using the monitors as targets for the gunners of the royal navy and the bombers of the royal air force. Like the United States and France, this country has a dozen or more specially fine cruisers and onetime dreadnaughts which must be relegated to the junk pile. Thunderer, Monarch, Conqueror, Colossus, Lion, Ajax, Centurion, King George V, Princess Royal, Erin and Orion, monitors of 20,000 or more tons, once the pride of the Seven Seas, are all doomed. Costing more than \$15,000,000 originally, junk dealers have offered the government only \$20,000 apiece for them. The navy is now engaged in a series of target tests on the famous battleships Agamemnon and Superb, which, like their sister ships, are to find their graves in the ocean at the hands of the gunners and jack tars that once manned them. The admiralty is trying by these tests to determine how a direct hit can be prevented from passing from the turret down the ammunition tube. In the battle of Jutland, Invincible, Indefatigable and Queen Mary blew up because of a flash passing from the ammunition tube to the magazines below. So Superb is now in the English Channel and is being shelled at punishing ranges to see whether or not the flash of explosion passes down to the powder and shell magazines under given conditions. Agamemnon, too, may soon need a successor. She is a moving target, more difficult to hit than Superb, which is stationary. She is propelled by oil. The supply of oil is turned on her engines as started, and the engineers see that she before she gathers too much headway. Her guns are controlled by wireless in another ship. The most exciting part of these tests is that played by the sloop Snarpen, which is responsible for taking the target pictures of what happens as a result of the firing. When she runs the target, she is responsible for taking the pictures, as well as being the target.

DRUG ADDICTS

APPEAL TO GOVT

Their Influence Grows Rapidly
in India—More Recognition
Accorded Them.

By Edward M. Thierry.
Wash., Aug. 9.—Many drug addicts
among the 2,000,000 in America are
appealing for congressional investiga-
tion of the narcotic drug situation.

They hope such an investigation
will remedy apparent defects in pres-
ent regulatory legislation and will lead
to governmental research to find a
scientific cure for drug addiction.

Addicts are writing Congressman
Lester D. Volk, who is leading the
fight for the investigation, prayerful
letters telling of their own tragedies
and urging action.

“Contrast these letters,” says Volk,
himself a physician, “with the state-
ments which have lately come from
high officials in which they say that in
all cases they can effect a cure; that
they will wipe out within six months
all cases of addiction; that the drug
problem in the United States is al-
ready solved. Ignorance of the facts
is inexcusable.”

Congressman Volk today gave out
the following as typical letters:—
West Virginia: Young man with
wife and five-year-old child, an addict
since 1915, says:

“Without morphine I go blind and
cannot support my family. I have
gone through a living hell; have been
in 11 cures without result. One was
a hell hole where nails were driven
through a board and it was placed a
foot over my cot to restrain me in my
delirium.

“All that has ever been done for
unhappy addicts like myself is to put us
in jails and asylums, where self-res-
pect is lost and one is driven to
crime and suicide. Why can't we be
treated by reputable physicians, in-
stead of being looked upon as crim-
inals?”

“I have no hope of saving a dollar
as long as I have to use the drug and
pay the prices forced on us. I would
mortgage my birthright for a real
cure.”

Connecticut: Married woman, a
morphine addict for ten years, caused
by physicians giving her injections to
induce physical rest. Her husband
says:

“Full records of my wife's case are
on file with the Internal Revenue Bur-
dicator and druggist was declared to
be within the law by the narcotic di-
rector, agents so terrorized the pres-
criptions.”

It is a matter of life and death with
my wife, yet official terrorism pre-
vents proper treatment.”

New York: A widow, college grad-
uate, an addict or years through acci-
dent during a critical illness, says:

“I used to laugh at people contract-
ing the so-called drug habit, but after
my illness I went through agony and
horror and when I was revived with
morphine I became aware that I was
an addict without knowing it.

“I tried to be cured, but I was in-
sulted and jered at for my pains,
and after taking a ‘home’ treatment
that cost me every cent I owned, I
was unconscious for 48 hours.

For 3 years I have struggled to sup-
port myself and my family, but these
have been years of torture. Every
day I have been compelled to go for
the dose of morphine to keep body and
soul together.

“I am neither criminal nor degrad-
ed, but I live in constant fear of be-
ing railroaded off to a ‘cure’ that
doesn't cure.”

West Virginia: Woman, 75 years
old, an addict for 40 years, says:

“Persons falling victims to narcotic
drugs, usually under circumstances
over which they have no control, are
being untuly punished by our coun-
try's laws as they are written and en-
forced today.

“Naturally I do not hope to recover,
but for the sake of others I hope a
remedy will be found or this malig-
nant ill.

“I have been allowed by the federal
authorities 20 grains of morphine
every five days, and for 40 years I
have taken this amount by the needle.
Now the federal agent has ordered
that hereafter I must take it in liquid
form only.

“In this form 30 grains is inade-
quate for my mind and body and it
costs \$30 a week—and my pension of
\$30 a month is my only income—
whereas under scientific administra-
tion it would cost only \$2.50.”

Ohio: “Married woman, an addict
since the birth of her child 24 years
ago. Her husband says:

“During her illness morphine was
given for relief, and she unwittingly
became a slave to it. By the advice
of our village doctor I took her to an
institution, but she became partially
an imbecile. We tried again, but
with the same result.

“She is now a poor, spent, humiliat-
ed, sorrowful, helpless, and
useless being. Our misery is gone and our
res spent in a useless fight.”
