**IMMIGRANTS.**—Upwards of 1,600 immigrants for the Northwest were landed at Halifax and sent forward on Sunday last.

At the first meeting in Moncton over which the Dorchester commander presided, in her earnest supplication she asked for the Lord be with her sister during her stay in "God forsaken Dorchester."

**ST. JOSEPH'S COLLEGE.**—Two very sad deaths have occurred within a few days at St. Joseph's. Both were sons of Mr. Hugh Neale of St. John and were among the brightest and most popular of the students. Diphtheria was the cause of death and another young man is now confined with the malady.

**A COMING TREAT.**—The ladies of St. Paul's church, assisted by other talent, have in preparation a concert to be given in the near future, which promises to be of more than ordinary interest. Beside a number of musical and literary selections, a representation in tableaux of Scott's Lady of the Lake will be given, with full scenery and handsome costumes. **THE LATEST CASE.**—The charge of incest against Alonzo Wood by his daughter Leonora Wood was taken up on Tuesday morning. The complainant who has been confined in the county jail since last week was put on the stand but no new evidence bearing on the case was introduced. A statement from justice Wills of Pictou concerning the charge brought before him previously, was read and corroborated in every particular the girl's version of the affair. The accused made a statement setting forth that the girl was a particularly bad one, but he does not deny the charge. Wood was sent up for trial and has elected to be tried by the Special Jury. ### Local Matters.

The Joggins Railway and Coal company have secured a contract for the supplying of the C. P. R. with 20,000 tons of coal.

The Kerr Vegetable Evaporating Co., Canning, have an order of \$2,000 worth of goods for Alaska, to be shipped within a month.

The body of George McLeod, aged 23, a Nova Scotian, who was killed by a railroad accident at Boston, on January 27th last, was taken through to Pictou, N. S. for burial.

Mr. James Baird, of Joggins, is sending to the Chicago exhibition a model of a railway frog and switch which he invented and has patented. The device is in use at Moncton and Moncton and gives satisfaction.

A man named Whetten, of Salisbury, passed through St. John the other day, in a very much broken up condition. He was at work in the woods at Dead River, Maine, and on January 27th last his leg was broken and his ankle badly crushed. He has no use of the leg.

Francis Lapointe, a trapper, of Johnville, was found dead last week at the door of an old lumber camp in the Miramichi woods. The deceased had been absent from home about three weeks, and was only found by accident by a hunter, named Higgins. Mr. Lapointe was a quiet, industrious man, and by his benevolence was much thought of by his neighbors. (Gleaner.)

The Moncton city solicitors have prepared a petition to be sent to Frederick against the bill sent up by the county council of Westmorland to compel the city to pay police costs. It is based on the supposition that the county is put to large expense for the support of criminals sent from Moncton, but it is shown that the city annually pays into the county treasury a very large sum, for which it receives no corresponding benefits. It is the least of criminals.

Says a Montreal despatch: The Record foundry and machine company, of Moncton N. B., have leased a large store at 1901 Notre Dame street, opposite the Balmoral hotel, and in one of the best business localities in Montreal. Here they will open up wholesale and retail branches of the business and will send out travellers throughout Quebec and Ontario. Messrs Joshua Peters, the Moncton manager, Alfred E. Peters, his brother, and George F. Atkinson, are at present in Montreal, making the arrangements. Mr. Atkinson will be the Montreal manager of the firm.

Wallace Steeves, a well-to-do middle-aged farmer of Lower Covendale, Albert Co., and brother of N. Steeves shoe merchant of St. John, was found dead in the woods near his place on Saturday morning. He had gone to the woods on Friday afternoon to gather spruce buds to make a spring tonic. He did not return to his home, but he was thought he would turn up all right, until it got too late to make a search. Yesterday morning Mrs. Steeves became thoroughly alarmed and notified the neighbors, who turned out and discovered Mr. Steeves lying dead under a tree. His temple was considerably bruised and he had apparently fallen from the limb of a tree, striking his head on a sharp stub or stump in the ground. This is the only explanation of the fatality that can be given. Mr. Steeves had been in the best of health for some time, and was greatly troubled by the death of children recently, which gave rise to the suspicion that he might have committed suicide, but there was no reason to suppose that the sad affair was due to this accidental. Mr. Steeves had one of the best orchards on the river, yielding over 200 barrels of apples each year, and he was in very independent circumstances.—Times.
