

Woods His Life,

Happened at the Corner of Colborne and Dundas Streets.

Woods Badly Injured—His Buggy Completely Demolished - The Horse Breaks Its Leg and Has to Be Shot.

A trolley accident which nearly cost an old man his life and resulted in the death of a valuable horse and the complete demolition of a buggy, occurred at the corner of Dundas and Colborne streets shortly after one o'clock this afternoon.

Strange as it may seem, the horse was freed from the buggy without receiving anything more than a cut on the hind leg. It galloped west on Dundas street, and in passing a rig at the corner of Waterloo it ran into a tie post and broke its right fore leg. It was shortly afterward shot and re-moved to the boneyard.
