## ASQUITH'S SCATHING INDICTMENT OF GERMANS BURNING OF LOUVAIN SHAMELESS HOLOCAUST PERFORMED BY A BLIND, BARBARIC VENGEANCE

## In Historic Speech in Guildhall He Calls Upon Every Able-Bodied Man in Great Britain to Come to Help of His Country

"I will not say more," he said, because I think we should bear in mind that we are at the present time watching the fluctuations of fortune in the early stages of what is going to be a protracted struggle. We must cultivate patience, endurance and steadfastness, and everyone must do his or her appropriate part in the common

London, Sept. 4.—1:15 p.m.—In the historic Guildhall of London, Premier Asquith today started the crusade to stimulate enlistment under the British flag, which he intends to push throughout the country. He is calling upon every able-bodied Britain of military age to come to the help of his country in the

The Premier opened his Guildhall address with the heartening announcement that up to today between 250,000 and 300,000 recruits had responded to the call of Lord Kitchener, the secretary of war.

#### THE DOVE OF PEACE DEPARTED.

Speaking with great emotion the Premier called attention to the fact that it was just three and one-half years ago that he had spoken in the Guildhall on the occasion of the decision of the two English-speaking nations of the world to settle their differences by arbitration without resorting to armaments. "No one was then sanguine enough to think, or even hope, that the era of war was at an end." The Premier continued: "But Despite Assurances of Victory in Berlin, no one anticipated such a terrible spectacle as confronts us today, at a time when we thought we were confident in the secur-



# CORRESPONDENTS IN THE WAR ZONE

Newspapermen Forced To Abandon Work With Armies -Richard Harding Davis Caught Four Times.

NEW YORK, Sept. 3.-Richard Harding Davis cables to the Tribune, from London, as follows:

"This war has seen the end of war correspondents. Of several, that came near being true in every sense of the word. The trouble was that, unable to obtain credentials, they tried without them to see the fighting, and in consequence were ar-

"No prejudice or favoritism was shown. Every army in turn arrested every correspondent. I was arrested by the Belgians, the French, the Germans and ven by the Dutch. But by the time we reached Holland was so sick for sleep that all I emember of that journey is Gerald Morgan dragging me out of the railroad carriage, handing me my tickets and shaking me into wakefulness. When we reached the gangplank of the English boat at Flushing, he exclaimed. 'Thank God, we are now free from arrest.' I asked, have we been arrested.' 'For two days,' said 'You were taken across Gerald. Holland by that gendarme who carried your valise.' Throughout my broken slumbers I had thought the gendarme was a railroad porter. Capt. Fortescue First Arrested.

'The American correspondent who first scored an arrest was Capt. Granville Fortescue, of Washington, and who, during President Roosevelt's administration was military aide at the White House. He was the first man to see any fighting and get his story back to

New York, "With the Belgian army he was very popular and, banking on this, when the French arrived at Namur, Capt. Fortescue walked to meet the French general, saying genially to him: 'Welcome to our city.' To this the French general arrested: 'Who the devil are you?" and not being satisfied with Fortescue's reply, the general, in accordance with the rules that the French to Paris under arrest.

"Fortescue protested in vain. finally was taken to Paris, and led before the chief of police, who said a mistake had been made and offered to give Fortescue an ample apology. Fortescue returned to London.



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



## Some Cooking Hints

'Mixed Pickles.' - The mixed pickles, show-chow, higdum, and pickles which enough of any one kind to put up alone which have not been cooked will hard- Green tomatoes, nearly ripe cucumbers with all seeds removed, cabbage onions, green peppers and whatever other Advertiser Patterns material usually used for pickles, should be chopped, or run through a chopping machine, sprinkled freely with salt materials), and left to stand over night; then the juice, or brine, should be thoroughly drained off, and enough spiced vinegar preared to well cover the

> Another well-liked pickle of our mothers' time, is made as follows: For the liquid pickle, put to each gallon of strong cider vinegar four ounces of curry powder, four ounces of good ground mustard, three ounces bruised ginger, two ounces turmeric, eight ounces of garlic (the last two slightly baked in the oven), one-fourth pound of salt and two drachms of cayenne pepper. Keep this where the vinegar will just be at the simmering point for several hours. Put into the jars sliced cucumbers, sliced onions, button on ons, cauliflower pulled apart, broccoli French beans, nasturtium seeds, capsicum, large small chopped lemons. All the vegetables should be parboiled salted water (leaving out the capsicum or red pepper) drained and dried; then over the pickle materials pour the hot liquid pickle. Look after this just as you would other pickles, keeping weighted down under the liquid. For lifting pickle cut of the jar to serve. a wooden spoon should always be used. This can be left tied to the jar.

## MILITIA MINISTER LANDS VOLUNTEERS

Would Rawhide Those Who Accuse Officers or Men of Cowardice.

PROMPT ANSWER TO CALL

Ten Thousand More Than Required Already at Valcartier Camp.

[Canadian Press.]

OTTAWA, Sept. 3 .- Col. the Hon. Sam Hughes, minister of militia and defence, issued the following statement tonight:

"Many splendid officers throughout the country are being annoyed by contemptible insinuations against the courage and zeal of many officers and men in the service who cannot get to the

"The British Government, in response to the offer of Canada to assist, agreed to accept 22,500 men. The Government of Canada transmitted that call to the militia of the country. The Minister of Militia laid down at the very outset-(a)-That every man must go volun-

(b)-That he, the Minister of Militia, and his officers would not ask, and have not asked, any man to go unless he volunteered.

(c)-That no man would go who was not physically well qualified. (d)—That no man would go whose wife or family objected. 75,000 Volunteers.

"There are 75,000 regularly enrolled volunteers in Canada, and 700,000 men who have had considerable training in past years.

"The response to the call is shown in the fact that where 22,500 men were asked for, there are today on the grounds at Valcartier upwards of 32,000 men, besides the Princess Patricia Regiment, 1,000 men, and the regiment at Bermuda, 1,000 men, all practically ready to take the field.

"There are today upwards of one thousand officers more than are wanted at Valcartier, gentlemen occupying the highest positions in the business and political affairs of the country, anxiously seeking positions which they cannot

Thousands Were Refused. "There are thousands more at home who have applied and been refused. "It is an easy matter for every coward who could not be dragged to the front with logging chains, or who could not be induced under any conditions to go, to sneer at these officers and men of the force who wish to go, but cannot

possibly go. "The Minister of Militia has, personally, refused thousands of officers the privilege of going for various reasons. Some were physically unfit, some had large families and others would have

left their families in distress.
"These officers and men may be required later, but for the first contingent none such are taken, Over 40,000 Under

"In response to the call for 22,500 men, there are today at Valcartier, within three weeks of the issue of the call, 32,000 men, that is about ten thousand more than are wanted, or were asked for, in the field, besides 6,600 men in service garrisoning fortresses, bridges, public works, etc., throughout the Dominion, 1,000 men in the Princess Patricia's Regiment, and 1,000 going to Bermuda, a total under arms today of 40,600 men, second to none in the world. In addition to all these, there are 150,000 men at their homes who have volunteered, and who are ready to march at a moment's

notice." Would Rawhide Critics.

Colonel Hughes also said: "It has been somewhat of a puzzle to the Minister of Militia and Defence why officers who have been insulted throughout the country by a few cowardly critics did not rawhide them as did Major Sam Sharpe, M.P., of Ux-

"Major Sharpe, long ago, wired to the Minister volunteering to go. He was notified of the conditions, but, in spite of all opposition, persisted in his offer to go, and is now in camp. It has been learned that Major Sharpe might not pass the medical requirements, but in spite of everything he insisted upon going into the camp in the hope that he may serve at the front.

"He has the blessing of the Minister of Militia and Defence for rawhiding the cowardly critic. Others similarly situated will also have it. A coward is impervious to any decent treatment, the only way to reach him is by means of

LONDON, Sept. 3.-9:50.-The official bureau issues a further statement of British casualties as follows: Killed: 18 officers, 62 other ranks. Wounded: 78 officers, 312 other

Missing: 86 officers, 4,672 other

The official bureau explains that the missing mentioned in the list of casualties are men not accounted for and include unwounded prisoners and stragglers as well as men killed or wounded

As regards the other ranks it is said that 2.682 are returned as having been sent back to their base as infit, and that a large proportion of these would be included in the number shown as missing in this and the the previous return from general headquarters.

In the report of the casualties returned today the names of officers were given. Only their next of kin have been informed and their names will be published as soon as possible. No names of the men of other ranks have been received as yet, but a number of wounded already have been brought home.
