## FOG AND STORM BALK MAURETANIA

World's Biggest Liner Arrives at New York on Maiden Trip.

New York, Nov. 22.-Poking her nose through a dense fog, which hid even he mast tops from the sight of those on deck, the biggest and most luxurious ship ever launched safely finished her maiden voyage today, when at 11:03 o'clock this morning the Cunard liner turbine steamship Mauretania, anchored off the Sandy Hook lightship, five days five hours and ten minutes from Queenstown, bearing \$12,500,000 in gold for the west. She struggled against tempestuous weather to beat the world's trans-Atlantic record of four days, 18 hours and 49 minutes, held by her sister ship, the Lusitania.

Head winds and heavy cross seas paffled her, but she won the right to one blue ribbon. On Thursday, Nov 21, Captain Pritchard drove the huge ship 624 knots, 671 miles, which is six knots better than the best day's run of the Lusitania, and leads all marine

Though the new liner demonstrated a capacity for greater speed by day under favorable conditions than the Lusitania has thus far proved herself canable of an uncommonly stormy passage and fog off this coast combined to make her time 10 hours and 30 minutes more than that established by her sister ship. But Captain Pritchard believes that with fair weather he can beat the Lusitania from coast to coast.

The Mauretania is 792 feet in length over all, two feet longer than the Lusitania; has a beam of 88 feet, a depth of hold of 80 feet; is 155 feet high from keel to funnel tops and 216 feet from keel to masthead; draws 37 feet and 6 inches of water (mean estimate); has a tonnage displacement of 45,000, an indicated horsepower of 70,000; was launched on the Tyne (England) Sept. 20, 1906; carries a crew of 800 odd officers and men; has accommodations for 550 passengers in the first-class cabins, 500 in the second class, and 1,300 in steerage, and cost approximately \$7,500,000.

The \$12,500,000 in gold brought by the Mauretania is said to be the largest consignment of specie ever carried by a ship.

We refer for proof of our right to do this to the mention by the then admiral of Virginia, including New England, of "turkies" in a list of game creatures abounding in the back street? in Massachusetts. This was in 1630. or thereabouts.

A chronicler of a date nearly fifty years later remarks upon the superior size of the turkey in New England above that of "our English turkey."

The game-bird was "our English turkey" by then, forsooth!

He had been domesticated in Spain a hundred and fifty years earlier, having been carried thither by the conquerors of Mexico. He roamed this western continent in savage freedom centuries earlier, supplying the red men with food and feathers. His territory stretched from the Atlantic to the Pacific and from Hudson's bay to the Gulf of Mexico.

In the dearth of domestic animals that prevailed in the colonies of Plymouth and Massachusetts Bay our turkey was treasure trove, as the first Thanksgiving Day established in their new homes became an honored anniversary.

From the beginning of the ob-Bervance of the religious and domestic festival, the big and savory bird took prominence. To this day, if the thrifty New Englander who raises poultry for the market cannot afford to his household frequent indulgence in what represents "spot cash" to his saving soul, he would as soon think of staying away from church on the last Thursday in Nowember as refusing to kill the finest gobbler of his flock for his Thanksgiving dinner.

#### SAVED FOR HOLIDAYS

'A Massachusetts millionaire told me one Thanksgiving Day that, although he was brought up on a farm where hundreds of fowls were raised yearly for the Boston market, he and the rest of the Family "never tasted turkey except at Thanksgiving and Christmas the dripping pan below the roast.

"And the two came so near together!" he said, a retrospective gleam that was childlike in wistfulness coming to his eyes. "It was

an awfully long stretch between!" I fear me that hundreds of children who knew the taste of the national bird at holiday season before prices began to climb, like Jack's beanstalk, until they are clean out of the sight of folk who do not wear gold-mounted glasses, will get not so much as a whiff of hot turkey

Might it not be well for the tender-hearted mother who could not brook the suggestion of such a deprivation for her own brood, to encourage them to save up candy and toy money betimes for the purchase of Thanksgiving poultry, be it only a hen turkey, for the poor children

I shall tell you how to make the best of the hen presently.

In the desperate hope that every housewife of our clan may be permitted to cook a gobbler for her very own flock for the festival, begin we our recipes with one for preparing his majesty for the joy-

Roast Turkey.

If you draw the bird yourself, be careful not to break the gall-bag. With turkeys at thirty-odd cents per pound, it would be a sname to embitter one inch

When the inside has been emptied, wash well with cold water to which you have added a teaspoonful of baking soda. Do this with the second rinsing water. The first should be clear.

Shake the fowl up and down and sidewise while the soda water is within him to make sure it reaches every crevice. The incipient stage of decomposition is acid, and the soda corrects it. If the fowl be perfectly fresh, the washing will do no harm. Then rinse as thoroughly with clean, cold water.

For a plain stuffing crumble stale bread and season with butter, pepper, salt, and, if you like them, sweet herbs. I do not fancy the flavor they impart to the flesh, but tastes vary in this re-Fill the craw until it is as plump as in

life, and bind a tape about the skin at the neck to keep it in shape. Next, stuff the body generously. Nearly everybody likes the stuffing of roast turkey. Sew up the aperture through which the filling was done; bind the legs and

wings to the sides with soft twine and lay the monarch in the covered roaster. Pour over him a large cup of boiling water into which a tablespoonful of butter has been stirred; put on the cover of the roaster, and cook in a good oven rather moderately for half an hour, that the heat may penetrate to the inside of the body before the skin tightens

into a crust. Keep the skin soft by frequent bastings, at first with butter and hot water, and for the last hour with the gravy in

Some cooks dredge the turkey with flour when it goes into the roaster; others when it is half done; others not at all. Allow ten minutes to the pound in roasting, and if you suspect that the fowl is tough, double the quantity of hot water poured over it, cover tightly

and steam slowly into tenderness. Boil the giblets in a little water, and chop them. Take the turkey up when done, transfer to a covered platter and keep hot over boiling water while you thicken the gravy in the roaster with browned flour, and when this has been stirred smooth, add the minced giblets. Boil up once, and turn into a gravy

Chestnut Stuffing for Turkey. Boil Spanish chestnuts-a quart will be enough-and shell and skin them. Mash them to a smooth paste with two

tablespoonfuls of butter, and season to taste with salt and butter. This is a delicious accessory to the Oyster Stuffing for Turkey.

Prepare the bread stuffing as in the first recipe, adding twenty-five rather small oysters, minced. Some prefer to mix the small oysters whole through the bread stuffing, filling the turkey with it as usual.

Ready for Over

To Cook a Hen Turkey. She is seldom as fat as a gobbler, and never as large. She may be made quite as palatable by adding half a pound of sausage meat, cooked and cold, crumbled fine and mixed with bread stuffing. Then cover the entire body of the bird with thin slices of fat salt pork, not smoked. Bind this in place with soft pack-thread; lay the fowl in the covered roaster and pour over her a great cupful of boiling water. Cover and roast twelve minutes to the pound. At the end of an hour clip the threads, remove the pork, laying it beside the turkey; dredge with browned flour and brown finely.

Garnish with crisp scrolls of bacon. Do not add them to the giblet gravy. "May good digestion wait on appetite, And health on both!"

#### Care of a Burnt Saucepan

T TNLESS absolutely necessary do not scrape a burnt saucepan; fill it with cold water, in which a little piece of washing soap has been put, and let it boil slowly on the back of the stove until the water is almost boiled away. Refill and boil again. Then clean with a good kitchen soap and a stiff scrubbing brush.

Have ready a quart of sifted flour into which you have sifted twice a teaspoonful of baking soda.

Add this to the batter alternately with the stiffened whites of three eggs. Mix well, beating the batter upward with long strokes and bake in two cards, or in small tins. Wash over with white of egg while the cakes are hot.

You may, if you like, leave out the ginger and substitute mace for the cinnamon,

Clean the ears, tongue and feet of a full-grown pig: cover with coid water, slightly salted, and boil until the flesh will fall from the bones. Strip it off; chop with the skinned tongue; season with salt, pepper, sage, sweet marjoram, a little powdered cloves and half a cup of vinegar.

When the seasoning is thoroughly incorporated with the meat and the seasoning is piquant and to your taste, pack hard in moulds and bowls.

How to Clean a Few House-

hold Utensils T IS not sufficient to wash receptacles of various sorts, not dishes,

with water and perhaps soap; any one who has thoroughly washed out a supposedly "clean" deep flower vase will testify to that. Therefore, a few hints on the subject are perhaps in or-der. For these same vases, for instance, the best thing is to mix a gill of vin and a tablespoonful of rock salt, and pour into the vase, shaking well, and allow it to stand a little while. Then shake well again and rinse with clear water.

For washing bottles or vinegar cruets, save eggshells in a paper bag. them fine, put into the cruets warm, soapy water and shake well. This will clean and not scratch the finest When a baking pan gets burned in using, put a little water and ashes in it, and the burned surface will come

off easily without necessitating scraping. This will not injure the dish. For or-This will not injure the dish. For ordinary frying pans rub well with a hard crust of bread and wash in hot water. This, too, avoids scraping, which is likely to cause future burning.





It is safe to say, however, that so far as speed and power are concerned, it will be a long time before the Lusitania and Mauretania are exceeded, for in addition to the great first cost of such large power and high speed, the increased cost of coal will prevent, or at least greatly delay, any considerable increase in speed. It may be noted that there has been during recent years, and until the advent of the Lucitania and Mauretania a reaction against the tendency to increase the speed of passenger vessels and the size of cargo-carrying vessels. Most of the Atlantic steamers have been of the intermediate type, that is to say, of moderate speed, from 15 to 20 knots. Some ten years ago a considerable number of cargo vessels carrying 11,000 to 12,000 tons were built; more recently the vessels built have seldom exceeded 9,000 to 10,000 tons dead weight capacity. One reason for this is the falling off both in the export of goods from Europe to America, and in the export of grain and produce from America.

There is one trade, however, in which there must shortly be an increase both in size and in speed. Practically all the fastest Atlantic passenger steamers sail in and out of New York. The time is coming when Canada must have steamships running direct to her own ports of equal speed to the New York liners, and of equal comfort.
