critics have missed the main point They have been stirring up a teapot tempest over the distribution of Niagara power between the two countries, and ignoring the tremendous importance of the provision for the settlement of future disputes.

It would be foolish to quarrel with the United States over Niagara power. The Americans, by building a canal two or three miles above the Falls, as one of their chartered corporations sought to do, could divert the whole river, and completely destroy the cataract. Another company on the American side sought permission to change the channel by blasting so as to divert the greater share of the water to the American side. If the development were not limited by the consent of both countries there would be a mad competition in which the Falls would not only disappear, but the bulk of the water be purloined by the United States. The present treaty provides for a division of the water for power purposes in the proportion of 9 to 5 in Canada's favor. As the Dominion Government has taken authority to prohibit the export of power to the United States, the whole development on the Canadian side will be available for this country when it is demanded.

There is now before parliament a measure covering the fourth of the commission's recommendations-that is, providing for a flat increase of \$150 in the civil servants' salaries, which, in view of the increased cost of living, the commission considered abnecessary. As Hon. Mr. Fisher pointed out when introducing the measure, the increase in the salaries of civil servants has been very slight since the scale was arranged over half a century ago. Since that time not only has the cost of the necessaries of life immeasurably risen, but the work and responsibilities imposed upon members of the service have been augmented.

The salary increases now contemplated apply only to the inside service at Ottawa only, but the Government is not unresponsive to the claims of the outside service. Sir Wilfrid Laurfer pointed out during the debate, that no government has ever yet undertaken such a task as to reform at once both the outside and the inside service. In Great Britain and the United States they proceed by stages, and that is what the Dominion Government is doing. It has undertaken to reform the inside service, reserving the power to do the same with the outside. This it will begin soon as possible after it has got through with the inside departments. When the plans of the Government. have been fully carried out members of both the inside and outside service will no longer be subject to party "pull," and at the same time will be required to gain and hold positions in the service on merit alone.





The appeal is dismissed with costs. It is understood that the judgment affects the old Grand Junction Railway to the extent that it may also be liable to carry at two cents.

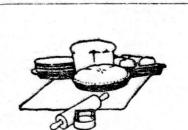



## SCOUR EUROPE

Suspect Russian Police Allowed Him to Kill to Avert

Suspicion.

London, Feb. 17. - Russian revoluionary organizations-their branches, and some of the great personages of at least, in London, Paris and Geneva, where secrecy is not so imperative as on the Czar's soil-give it out openly that terrorist agents are scouring Europe for Eugene Philippovitch Azef the supposed Nihilist leader whom the central committee of the revolutionary socialist party recently denounced as a police spy.

Confidence is expressed that sooner or later he will be found. If he is, though the revolutionists don't expressly say so, no one doubts that he will be killed at once.

The missing man has been reported a dozen different cities. One account was that he hid for a time in the Russian embassy in Paris. A later story is that he has gone to America and the probabilities are that the terrorists are looking for him there, too. to the revolutionists, realized that it must have some way of spying on the terrorists, that this could only be effectively done through a member of the organization and that, to enable him to work unsuspected, he must be allowed to plan and occasionally to carry out political murders.

For nine years, it is asserted, this was Azef's occupation. A number of his assassination plots were successes, Sometimes, it is assumed, the police failed to act promptly enough upon suggestions he gave them. It is susdeliberately permitted someone to be slain to shield Azef from the exposure which must follow the invariable frustration of conspiracies in which he was involved.

Hundreds of arrests and scores of executions of political agitators are the lives of the Grand Duke Sergius, Minister Plehve and Gov. Bogdanovitch are said to have been only a few of those in which he figured prominently. On the other hand, he is given credit for wrecking several plots against the Czar by timely warnings to the police.


