GERMANS WITH FINNS MOVING ON PETROGRAD

Cruiser Vindictive Sunk So As To Block Submarine Operations In Second Audacious Foray of British Naval Force-One Motor Launch Lost and Casualties Light.

London, May 10 .- The German submarine base of Ostend, on the Belgian coast, has been blocked as the result of a new raid by British naval forces, the admiralty announces. The obsolete cruiser Vindictive, filled with concrete, has been sunk across the entrance to the harbor. The British lost one motorboat. Their casualties were light.

### SUBS UNABLE TO REACH BASE

London, May 10.—Regarding reports that German submarines have been unable to enter Flemish ports and have had to return to Germany, Reuter's, Limited, says it is unable to obtain confirmation in naval quarters. Photographic and other evidence from Zeebrugge shows that the Bruges Canal is still entirely blocked as a result of the British raid of April 23, and that it cannot be used. The obstructions, it has been found, were better placed than was at first supposed. A.—1. Members of the Mennonite Church, and of other religious denominations, who secured exemption on conscientious grounds, are only entitled under the act to exemption from combatant service. Up until the present they have enjoyed exemption from all military service, but under a recent ruling from Ottawa, those between the ages of 20 and 22 will have their exemptions partially cancelled, and will be held strictly to the provisions of the act, and will be called upon when needed to perform noncombatant service. Even it in category 2, they will be called upon to perform the noncombatant duties usually assigned to B men.

2. They were not barred from voting, but if they voted they thereby made themselves ineligible to obtain exemption from combatant service.

3. Under an order-in-council of August 13, 1873, certain Mennonites came here from Russia on an agreement that they would be exempt from military service. Under an order-in-council of December 6, 1898, certain Doukhobors settled in Southern Manitoba on the same understanding. The people, who came here under these agreements are excepted (not exempted) from the act, in other words the act does not apply to them. They are, however, only in certain colonies in the West, and others of these denominations elsewhere in Canada are not excepted, but must be exempted, or serve.



Scope of Work in London Surprises Even Those in Attendance.

No citizen of London who had the privilege of being present at the inspirational meeting of the Y. W. C. "We shall have to launch out in the work of our association during these strenuous times," declared Mrs. Chas. Leonard, the president. "The Red Triangle campaign, already being so successfully carried on, goes hand in hand with the Blue Triangle or Y. W. C. A. canvass for funds. This time is a time for real service and sacrifice, and we are glad to give it. We may not all go to France, but there is a great field of service here at home. We know that if the girls of our cities are sent out with a true knowledge of Christian principles they will go well prepared to fight all the battles of their life.

Rev. D. C. MacGregor conducted the devotional exercises, and Miss Shoebottom gave a much-appreciated vocal solo.

The reports of the various committees and clubs were read and adopted by those present, C. B. King making the motion of adoption and Capt. Graham seconding it. Both expressed their surprise of the work being done.

Appeal to Londoners.

The report of the finance committee, submitted by Mrs. C. H. Ziegler, was in itself an appeal for financial support from the citizens of London. "The association does not appeal to the public for funds to carry on the boarding houses, which are self-supporting, but it does ask for support in connection with the community work, such as travelers' aid, girls' work, etc.," said Mrs. Ziegler. "Last year the city fell short of the amount asked for in the campaign, and as a result the Y. W. C. A. now carries a deficit, although not so large a one as the previous year. The revenue for the year amounted to \$24, 449.71, double that of last year, with a deficit of \$1,500."

Mrs. Hughes read the report of the boarding houses, which are self-supporting, the Wellington House, boarding 35 girls, and the Central House, on King street, from 40 to 45 women and girls. Since its opening, the Central ing 35 girls, and the Central House, on King street, from 40 to 45 women and girls. Since its opening, the Central House has also accommodated 1,500 transients and has had to turn away transients and has had to turn away many, owing to lack of room. The new quarters have already proved themselves too small, and soon another branching out will have to take place. It is the intention of the association to soon establish an all-night service at the Central House, so that girls arriving at all hours of the night may be accommodated.

5,772 Met at Depot.

The travelers' aid, religious, extension and educational committees reported through Mrs. Henderson. "The worker at the station to protect and warn travelers against undesirable persons, as well as to give them information desired, has assisted an average of 5,772 persons during the year, proving her work invaluable," said this reing her work invaluable, said this report. "Bible classes and prayer meetings are arranged for by the religious committee. The association has a special industrial secretary, Miss Archibald, to look after the industrial young bald, to look after the industrial young women of the city. Senior clubs in the different factories and junior clubs of teen-age girls have been formed. There is also a political club for the grown-ups, which has proved itself most successful. Miss Mona Fitzgerald, physical instructor, has formed many grammarium classes, and swimming physical instructor, has formed many gymnasium classes and swimming classes, 485 girls putting up with the cold and inconveniences of arrangements last winter to take advantage of this branch of the Y. W. C. A. extension work. If the association had a swimming pool and gymnasium of its own, both so badly needed, the work would undoubtedly increase greatly. The general secretary. Miss Luke, gave her report, showing something of what the aims of the association should be. "We must face conditions as they are, not as we think they should be. The struggle of girls to keep straight under the worst conditions is the greatest example of martyrdom of the age. Opportunities for social intercourse between men and women under favorable conditions should be provided. The music and the brilliant lights of places of questionable character entice the young people, and we should not ignore this fact, but be ready to face it and work on a business basis in competition with such places. London must have a women's building where women and girls of all classes will meet and contribute to its support."

Club's Activities.

The report of the "Empire Club," one of many industrial clubs, was most inspiring. It was read by Miss Boyer, the president, and showed what excellent work the girls have been doing in alsocial way among themselves and as Red Cross workers and gardeners. "The Rainbeau," a junior club, composed of 20 girls from 12 to 14 years of age, was ably reported by their president.

Miss Freda Daly of the Western University gave a brief outline of the work being done there. This branch of the Y. W. C. A. was formed only last year and was greatly influenced by the delegation which attended a Y. W. C. A. conference at Toronto.

Miss Slade reported for the Normal School branch, pointing out the success of the work there, and specially mentioning the rural conference arranged by the Y. W. C. A. The High School Girls' Club, perhaps the most flourishing of all, was well represented by Miss Margaret Gemmill, who gave a most interesting account of the work accomplished there of the social spirit created among the girls and of the Inspirational meetings held, of the accomplishment of a clubroom on the third story of the Collegiat

## Our Consumers' League

Indignation is rife among the farmers' wives of the district over the order-inouncil whereby surplus holdings of flour and sugar must be turned over to dealers under penalty of the law. The writer came upon a wrathful little group of country women a few days ago just in time to hear what they had to say

"You are an editress," said one to the writer person, "and the food controller is coming next week. Why don't you get after him. He might listen to

"I'll go to jail," said another, firmly, "before I'll turn over the sugar we have in our sugar bin, just for the purpose of buying it back in small quantities and letting the middleman profit to this extent. Early in March, we did as we have been in the habit of doing for economy's sake, bought one hundred pounds. The greater part of it is left, and we have been depending on it to help in preserving our early fruit and doing the spring preserving of the present. I think it is absolute nonsense to make us cart the sugar back. The rational way would be to allow consumers to keep what they have in stock and prohibit dealers from selling more than a certain amount to each customer after this. Mrs. Dhere, feels exactly the same way about it as I do," said the speaker. Then Mrs. D-spoke for herself.

"For years," she said, "we have bought sugar, flour and things like that in quantity, because it has been much cheaper for us in the long run to buy that way, and also prevented the risk of our running out of supplies. We have a good amount still on hand, and it is just as Miss W--- says, we feel it is imposition to ask us to turn it back to our dealer and, in buying it in small quantitles, pay for the wrapping paper and twine, and the extra cost in general of purchasing in the smaller quantities. We are perfectly willing after this to buy after any rational method the food controller suggests, if it is going to serve the best interests of the country in the war. The part we object to is taking back what we have on hand."

"We have been educated to know that it is more thrifty to buy in larger quantifies," said a city woman, "and I can tell you, we have need of all the thrift we can exercise to make ends meet. When I was a young girl living on the farm we always bought sugar by the barrel, and when I got married I started out housekeeping by buying sugar in hundred-pound lots. Last year the whole song was 'A back-yard garden in every city lot. Eat all you can and can all you can't.' And the eating and canning applied to fruits in season as well as vegetables. Like Jane Wiggins, I filled up all the bottles and jars available to help out the food situation, and have been planning to do the same this year. I wonder what provision I will be allowed in the way of sugar for preserving and canning."

One woman after another, city housewife as well as country housewife, expresses her entire willingness to meet conditions hereafter by buying in quantities permitted by the Government. Not a single one has been found who can see any excuse for the regulation about turning back sugar and flour in stock. As one country woman points out, it will mean giving up a good part of the day for her husband to take it to town at this busy season when so much is depending on the farmer, and when the soldiers and Allies are depending to such an extent upon the crops that are to be.

It begins to look as if "a lively time will be had" by the food controller when he pays his visit to this city, if many of the women of the district come in to hear him and ask him questions, provided they express their opinions as freely to his face as when he is at a safe distance in Ottawa.

### BABY SAVING REAL WAR SERVICE.

a few days ago by a repatriated Canadian officer, the first to reach this city after a long term of imprisonment in Germany. Germany, the efficient, is one country which fully recognizes the importance of conservation of its manpower. Since the army coming on each year of approximately 500,000 young men means so much to Germany in holding on in the war, it isn't by any means surprising that Germany, the efficient, has been giving efficient attention to the conservation of its child life during the years of war. England is tion to the conservation of its child life during the years of war. England is becoming thoroughly aroused to the importance of definite efforts along the same lines, and up-to-the-minute United States is making baby saving a big feature of its war work. Baby saving, over across the line, indeed, is given a leading place as a branch of war service. All over the United States, moreover. the first week in June is to be observed as "Baby Week," when exhibits will be held, and a nation-wide campaign launched to educate the public, concerning the importance of saving the babies, building up the nation, and repairing the wastage of war. Apropos the fact that the first week in June is to be observed as "Baby Week" in the United States, it is an interesting co-incidence that the London Child Welfare Association has decided upon the last day of that week, Saturday, June 8, as the date on which to hold a Child Welfare tag day, and has received permission from the civic Powers That Be accordingly.

## WHAT LONDON HAS DONE.

London made a magnificent start in the direction of child saving with the big Child Welfare Exhibit of the week of February 10 to 16, which aroused interest not only throughout the city, but attracted attention all over Western Ontario. Following the exhibit, a weekly clinic for sick children was promptly organized, thanks to Dr. Tillmann, who had charge of the clinic of welfare week and other doctors associated with him who had become fully alive to such a need in London. Victoria Hospital offered quarters there for the clinic and the assistance of nurses. Good service has been rendered, but, more and more doctors and nurses have been impressed by the inadequacy of the machinery to cope with the situation. It has been like attempting to heat a house with a raif sized furnace. When a furnace not nearly large enough for he house is installed much fuel is used up, not to say wasted, for very little return in the way The units of heat energy used up are entirely out of proportion to the results achieved.

In order to make the sick children clinics effective, the imperative need has made itself felt of a nurse to follow up cases, show mothers how to carry out the doctors' instructions, give advice regarding the general care of patients and to reach cases which would not otherwise have the clinic brought to The nurse is needed for educational work, and it is to raise funds to secure this nurse that the tag day is being held.

## IS A NURSE NEEDED?

"Is the nurse really much needed?" was asked of one of the doctors who has had much to do with the child welfare movement here. "Without the nurse," said the doctor, "we are about in the same position as surgeon with his arms cut off at the elbows."

If democracy means anything, it should mean an equal chance for every-one, an equal chance for recovery in sickness through proper medical care and intelligent nursing, an equal chance for the poor little poor child and the poor little rich child to have adenoids detected and removed and the other defects set right which might otherwise shorten the lives or prevent poor little poor child and poor little rich child from growing up healthy-bodied, alert-minded men and women and useful members of society. Some day, the state is going to make its own the responsibility of the care of the physical welfare of its

citizens. A start in this direction has been made through medical inspection of schools and school dentists and nurses, through the establishment of depart-

ments of public health. Why should children be sick if it is possible to keep them well? That is another question which is being raised by the scientific people who have been conducting the sick baby clinic. Important as this sick baby clinic is, they realize that it is of still more importance to have a "well baby" clinic, to which children of pre-school age can be brought as were the little ones under three to the clinic of exhibit week. The need of a clinic for apparently well babies was fully demonstrated by the fact that of more than five hundred brought to the clinic in the six days, very few had their cards marked absolutely "perfect." All sorts of little minor defects were detected and some real big ones which required attention. Mothers from out of town who brought in their children have been especially generous in expressing appreciation. One community, within ten miles of London, has been so impressed with the wisdom of keeping children well that inquiries have been made concerning the possibility of securing a doctor from London, experienced along the lines of Child Welfare clinics, to go out once a month and hold a well baby clinic for the community. This is just one evidence of the way London's exhibit in February has set people thinking and acting in different parts of Western Ontario.

## HER HAND TO THE GO-CART.

Since London has given the lead, the eyes of outside places will naturally be turned to London to see what comes next. London's reputation in connection with the successful Child Welfare Exhibit of the past winter has gone far and wide in Ontario, and traveled to distant provinces which are writing down to the Forest City to see how such things are done. Having put her hand to the plow or more properly speaking, the perambulator in this case, London isn't going to fall short in her splendid task of saving little lives from ruthless slaughter, not wilful murder, but destruction through ignorance, lack of proper home or medical care, lack of proper food or because of the wrong kind of food, or because of the lack of a Child Welfare nurse. The fair summer-time is the time when the visits of the Little White Hearse multiply, and hearts and homes are bereft because of the little blossoms which perish. Now is the time to prepare to meet with the big summer offensive of the enemies of babyhood, the pare to meet with the big summer offensive of the elemes of babyhood, the enemies which claim as their victims one in every ten children born in London before the milestone of the first birthday is reached. ## LOYD GEORGE IN THE HOUSE

Motion For Committee To **Investigate Charges Lost** by 293 to 106.

THE PREMIER IS CHEERED

Quotes Papers To Prove He Got His Facts From Gen. Maurice.

London, May 9.—The Lloyd George ministry has won vindication in the British Parliament at a time when defeat would have meant a Government crisis. A motion by former Premier Asquith asking for the appointment of a special committee to investigate sensational charges made by Major-Gen. Frederick B. Maurice, published earlier in the week, was voted down by a vote of 293 to 106.

Stirred by the imminence of a cabinet crisis, the people of London crowded the public galleries long before the debate opened. The diplomatic and peers' galleries also were thronged. Immediately after the introduction of Mr. Asquith's motion the premier took the floor and spoke in defence of the Government. He refuted the charges of Gen. Maurice, and declared that statements made in his recent speech, to which Maurice's charges referred, were made on information received from Gen. Maurice's department of the war office. He showed also by documentary evidence that the extension of the British line was made because of pressure exerted by France, and that the defision was taken on the advice of the military authorities, in agreement with Field Marshal Haig, the war cabi-

the delision was taken on the advice of the military authorities, in agreement with Field Marshal Haig, the war cabi-net having interfered in no way in the matter, although it approved of the

matter, although it approved of the dispositions.

When the premier left the House he was loudly cheered.

While Mr. Asquith disavowed any intent to put the present Government to a crucial test, it was felt that in the event of an adverse vote the Lloyd George cabinet would have quit office. Mr. Lloyd George asserted the figures which he had given were taken from official records at the war office. Since that time he had made inquiries on this point, he added, and the figures were not inaccurate. vere not inaccurate.

Breach of Discipline.

"Gen. Maurice made a flagrant breach of discipline. Mr. Asquith should have deprecated it. If his motion is carried, Mr. Asquith will again be responsible for the conduct of the war."

Lloyd George quoted a document from Maurice's department issued nine days after the premier's speech confirming. Maurice's department issued nine days after the premier's speech, confirming that the combatant strength of the British army was greater in January, 1918, than in January, 1917. Regarding the extension of the front, the premier said, Maurice was at Versailles, although not present in the chamber. The extension was never discussed there, Lloyd George said, it being already an accomplished fact.

Lloyd George said the statement regarding three British divisions being in Egypt was made at a Cabinet meeting. Maurice, he said, was present, but did not correct him.

ENDS MAURICE'S CAREER.

The principal point of the premier's defence was that the disputed statements had been based on information furnished by Major-Gen. Maurice's department of the war office, and that Major-Gen. Maurice never had questioned them while he was in daily conference with the cabinet. He said that Gen. Maurice had ceased to hold office "for good or bad reasons."

Personal feeling between the former premier and his successor was evident, and it appears to increase progressively with each of the clashes incident to their positions as head of the Government and lead of the contract of th ENDS MAURICE'S CAREER. their positions as head of the Government and leader of the Opposition.

## QUERIES REGARDING MILITARY SERVICE

Send in Your Problems and They Will Be Answered From Official Information by The Advertiser.

A. F. Q.—I am 21 years old, category A, exempted as a farmer. This exemption having been cancelled, am I entitled to exemption because of having one brother killed at the front? If so, where and when would I apply for it?

A.—After reporting for service, you can apply for leave of absence through your commanding officer, and if approved by the minister of militia you will get it.

D. E. Q.—A young man, Britishborn, went to the United States and took out first papers. He was drafted over there, and got the privilege of Joining the British army. After two months in it, he was rejected. He then went back to Canada, and went farming. Is he still liable to the United States draft and can he be taken back?

A.—If, when the convention agreement between the United States and Canadian governments goes into effect, he were called upon to enlist here or return to his own country (assuming that he is now a citizen of the United States) and if he were able to show that he was unfit for service here, it is unlikely that he would be required to go likely that he would be required to go back.

O. B. Q.—1. I am exempted, and over 23, and my exemption is still good. Can I enlist in the artillery and get leave to work on the farm for a while? or a while?
2. What is the address of the 63rd Battery?
A.—I. Yes, though if you are in cate-


