London, Dec. 10 .- One of the gravest and primeval forces assert themselves,

Smith, attorney general, in a speech at Liverpool yesterday. He added that he was engaged in preparing a memorandum on the subject for the war cabinet.

"America has rendered brilliant service in the cause of civilization," Sir Frederick said, "and Great Britain is bound to approach the conference with a determination to concede everything possible to American sentiment and American views, having regard for national security and existence of the Empire

# WON WITHOUT HELP OF WOMEN SAYS DAVID LLOYD GEORGE

British Premier Tells of Magnificent Work Done by Members of the Gentler Sex When Millions Answered the

London, Dec. 10—(Canadian Press, via Reuter's).—Premier Lloyd George, in the course of the address he delivered to the women's meeting yesterday at the Albert Hall, said that when undertaking to organize industries for war one of his first acts was to call on women to help. They had done their part magnificently. Over 1,000,000 women had been engaged in manufacturing munitions of war in the United Kingdom, while 360,000 women answered appeals to take men's places and do work on the land. Later, when it was necessary to appeal to the women folk for the auxiliary services of the army and tavy 220,000 women, inclusive of the fibrising services, joined up, wille scores of thousands of women had been helping in the civil services. Without the help of the women the Allies could not have won the war.

## CHILE'S REPLY IS REGARDED AS A REFUSAL TO U.S.

American Mediation Offer Appears Not To Be Acceptable.

ARGENTINA'S PROPOSAL

Tacna-Arica Question Is Now Considered Definitely

Buenos Ayres, Dec. 10 .- The reply of Chile to the offer of President Wilson to mediate in the controversy between Chile and Peru is flooked upon by Chilean newspapers as a refusal to accept American mediation. The American note said that President Wilson was "ready to attend any suggestion made by Chile."

On the other hand. President Irigoyen of Argentina sent a note to Chile in which he said he offers mediation "in order to definitely arrange the Tacna-Arica problem."

Pispatches from Chile indicate that there is a tendency in that country to accept the Argentina offer and refuse the American. Chilean statesmen insist that the question should be settled according to the treaty of Ancon. A special dispatch to La Nacion from Santiago says: "All efforts at mediation are nearer failure than success. Chile probably will accept the good offices of friendly nations toward fulfilling the treaty of Ancon, but will not allow other nations to study and decide the Tacna-Arica question which Chile considers definitely closed.

"I spoke to the English minister of agriculture, and asked him what he wanted from Canada, and that was his reply. Britain needs meat. Hog raising has been, or will be stopped at the end of the present year. No hog feed can be bought or sold after the first of January, 1919, in the British Isles, and this means that the mother country will be looking to Canada and the States for pork."

for pork." Britain Never To Feed Self. Dr. Creelman declared that contrary to the belief of a number of Britain's most prominent agriculturists, the right little, tight little islands would never be self-sustaining. Cattle in England.

The beef types of cattle had been well kept up during the war. In the south of England, the milking type of Shorthorn was a general favorite. He was surprised at the prices that prevailed at some of the sales that he had attended. At one sale young bull calves had sold at \$5,000 each. Business was always brisk at these sales. The farmers were getting 54 cents a gallon for milk and didn't have to deliver it. The hardest proposition that the milkfor milk and didn't have to deliver it. The hardest proposition that the milkmen had to face was the shortage of concentrates. The ration in Great Britain was but five pounds per day, while Canadian farmers were feeding 30 pounds. The dairy industry needed some 153.000 tons of concentrates and it was expected that the demand would be met.

n dealing with the horse situation, Dr. Creelman made his listeners gasp with the statement that good horses brought from \$500 to \$750 at the present brought from \$500 to \$750 at the present time. It was hoped that the serious shortage would be relieved by army horses, while the farmers were looking with longing eyes to Canada and the United States for help as soon as transportation facilities became more regu-
