In financial circles it was believed this action would effect a drastic curtailment in the trading operations of such dealers, which would necessarily be reflected in their sales to extravagant consumers. Meanwhile, the wave of price-cutting by department stores and others continued to spread here. The principal reductions are in clothing and shoes, with cuts from 15 up to as high as 70

Head of Force Will Demand Strictest Enforcement of Order.

Dublin, May 20.—Contingents of British cavalry and infantry are arriving in Ireland, but the total number of troops now in the island is still considerably below that of a year ago. Many men then on duty had enlisted for the duration of the war, and have since been demobilized. Troops hitherto have been used mere-as additional police officers, and have not been numerous enough to cope with disturbances. In fights which have occurred at police barracks, the at-tackers have generally been ten times more numerous than the defenders and as they have also been well armed, the contest has been unequal. Soldiers, therefore, have been called in to estab-Government operations are being di-

Government operations are being directed to the maintenance of ordinary law. The wholesale burning of police barracks in the recent past appeared to be mere wantonness on the part of raiders, since many of the buildings had been abandoned by the police, but now it appears these acts were attributable to the foresight of Sinn Fein leaders. It was anticipated that an extension of military activity was contemplated by the government, and that these barracks would be used by detachments of soldiers. Situation Is Considered Extremely Grave—Agreement Does Not Commit Britain To Defend Persia, But Places Upon Empire a Serious Moral Responsibility -- Speculation Rife As To What Next Move Will Be.

London, May 20.—Invasion of Persia and the seizure of the port of Enzeli by the Bolsheviki, with the evacuation of that town by British troops, has created a stir here, and the near eastern position is extremely grave, it is declared in some quarters. Newspapers ask what the British Government is going to do, in view of its agreement with Persia which was concluded last year, and it is remarked that although that convention did not commit Great Britain to defend Persia it laid, upon this country a serious moral responsibility.

Five-cent cash fares and seven limited tickets for a quarter is the settlement in sight for the London street railway situation as the result of an informal meeting of the city council last night. This would add \$146,423 to the income of the company and would give the mean income on the company and would give the men an increase of .07 cents an hour after providing 36,000 for borded indebtedness and

The men would not return to work for the company for 46 cents an hour, and in the event of their striking again, the railway board would refuse to take charge once more,

"It is therefore strictly between the city and the employees that settlement must be made. I thought, too, this afternoon that we could leave it to the company and the men, but I was convinced by the acting manager, A. B. Ingram, that this would be impossible."


The Dominion Railway Board has withdrawn its demand for a station on the London and Port Stanley Railway in the vicinity of the Westminster Hospital pital.



Although common in London during migrations the Tanager and its plain greenish-colored mate retire to the maple and oak woods to build their poorly constructed nest. In some cases the nest is so loosely built it seems a wonder that the eggs do not fall out. The song of the Tanager closely resembles that of a robin, but is given in a hoarse voice. When in the oak woods in summer if you hear a "robin" with a sore throat the chances are it is the Scarlet Tanager.



LABOR COUNCIL HOT ATTACK MADE ON ORGANIZER BY **BACKS STRIKERS** TO THE LIMIT

Resolutions were passed calling on the Government to reinstate in seniority rights all Grand Trunk employees who were taken off the pension list for striking in 1916; asking that foodstuffs be not exported while there is a scarcity in Calada; and indorsing the resolution of the Guelph Labor Council calling for the compulsory establishment by manufacturers of salesrooms, where consumers can purchase at wholesale rates or a slight advance. The Guelph resolution charges that from 50 to 100 per cent is added to the prices of necessities by the profits of wholesalers, jobbers, retailers and other middlement.



Last year Windsor built 1.100 new homes, and this year will build 1,500. He contended that to provide homes which can be easily purchased is the best way to retard radical labor agitation. It is better for a city to have a population of home-owners than homerenters. Agitators are in the game for what they can get out of it, but the man who owns a home and therefore has a stake in the community is slower has a stake in the community is slower to follow the agitator. The home-owner stabilizes industry and maintains a proper proportion of male and female






