Special to London Advertiser. Winnipeg, Man., July 14 .- Manitoba is again on the verge of electing a coalition Legislature. With three major parties, Liberals

Farmers and Conservatives, endeavoring to gain control of the Legisnd the remote possibility of any of them doing so, the last days of a three-months election campaign finds political seers already speculating as to the possibilities of a fusion between the Liberals and Farmers following the elections.

When the Norris government was defeated on the floor of the Legislature last March indications were then that the United Farmers of Manitoba would sweep the country.

Four cabinet ministers announced withdrawal from public life, and Premier Norris, along with his chief lieutenant, Hon. C. D. McPherson, minister of public works, was practically to face the Farmer tide

A provincial convention of Lbierals was called by the Dominion Liberal Association, and Norris was indorsed as provincial leader.

Since that time the premier, along with old-time Liberals, have been making an intense battle for suprem acy at the polls, and the result has been that the support which the farmers had reckoned on obtaining has been transferred to the Liberal party.

An accurate forecast as to the out-come of the elections in Manitoba yesterday is somewhat hazardous, owing to the many three-cornered fights and the appearance of new parties into the field. Indications, however, are the United Farmers Manitoba and the Winnipeg wing of the organization, the Progressives will return the largest group to the Legislature, with the Liberal party second in strength, Conservatives third in voting power, with Labor a

Anarchist Fires Three Times At Carriage of Police Prefect of Paris.

ESCAPES FATAL BEATING

Paris, July 14 .- Considerable excitement was caused during the reurn of the presidential cortege from the military review at Longchamps, when an unidentified man fired three times at the carriage of Armand Naudin, police prefect of Paris, which was preceeding the carriage of President Millerand.

The assassin, who was about 20 years old, and appeared demented, was arrested after having been beaten badly by the crowds

He was found to be Gustav Bouvet, an anarchist, well-known to the po-lice, and shot in the belief that it was President Millerand at whom he was aiming. None of the shots took effect.

The dense crowd around was at first terrified by the shots. Then it turned upon the man who had fired them, and he was being beaten to death by the enraged spectators when the police came up and seized

Why No Juvenile Court? ONDON has no juvenile court. That statement could have been made a year ago, when there was agitation and feeling very much in favor of an immediate move. There was little thought that it could be made in the last half of 1922.

There should be no need for presenting facts or figures or reasons. These have been brought forward, piled up, listened to and admitted. The one big thing left is to do it. In the last analysis the case comes down to this: It is either right or wrong for London to have a juven-He court.

The community believes and knows that it is the right thing to do. It might be just as well to ask MAYOR WILSON the plain question:

"Where do you stand on this?" And the same question can be passed around the council board. The mayor has stated publicly

that he approves of the idea. Then why does he not go ahead and show his approval in a tangible way? Action, not approval, is the thing necessary.

So far it has been choked and smothered by approval, and left to die for want of action.

There are cases coming up from week to week which have to be dealt with in the police court because there is no other process open. When the police magistrate gets the case he must be guided by the law, and away from the ordinary police court. It is governed by the law of humanity and brotherhood, and a realization of the fact that effort and patience spent in the redemption of stray boys is the greatest investment any community can make.

Residents of Ontario Little Realize Attractiveness of Georgian Bay District.

BECKONS TO TOURISTS

SEEK TO FOIL ATTEMPT TO EXTRADITE GROSSBERG

Montreal Lawyers Claim Attempt

MONTREAL, July 13 .- "The whole surpose of this case is to fix a preedent to extradite United States itizens from asylum in Canada for violation of the Volstead Prohibiion Law, offences against which are not extraditable," declared J. Stuart Bolin in the extradition court today, fighting attempts to extradite Harry A. Grossberg of Cleveland, Ohio, on forgery and perjury

charges. Mr. N. K. Laflamme, K.C., M.P., who appeared for Mr. Grossberg, with C A. Barnard, K.C., and Mr. Bolin, who was formerly district attorney at Columbus, Ohio, moved that the charges preferred by the United States government, and based on applications for permits for the withdrawal of liquor from government warehouses, be dismissed on the ground that the documents filed in court by J. A. Walsh, K.C., M.P., and B. W. Henderson, assistant district attorney of Cleveland, Ohio, representing the Washington authorities. failed utterly in creating a prima facie case against Mr. Grossberg. The hearing was adjourned.



WILL ENFORCE RAIL WAGE CUT

Canadian Roads Reduce Shop Crafts 5 to 9 Cents An Hour Sunday.

Ask Employees To Accept Scale Pending Further Consideration of Rates.

MONTREAL. July 13 .- (By Canadian Press.)-Wage reductions of from 5 cents to 9 cents an hour to members of the federated shop crafts will be put into effect Sunday next following notices to that effect given

30 days ago. Railways affected, and upon which he above notice will be posted tomorrow include the Canadian Pacific Railway, Grand Trunk Railway, C N. R., Q. C. R., T. and No. O., Sydney and Louisburg Railway, Edmonton Dunvegan and British Columbia Railway, and Esquimalt and Nanaimo

Railway.

The order will affect about 40,-000 men in the Canadian railways.
The Railway Association of Canada expressly stated in conference between the representatives of the ailways and of the employees early his month that the above rates of pay should be adopted without prejudice, pending further consideration and subject to further negotiations on 30 days' notice from either party to the other.

This proposition was not accepted on behalf of the employees, and in a further communication addressed to employees' representatives on July 10, it was proposed that any rates of pay finally agreed upon would be effective July 16, 1922, and that adjustments would be made accord-

To this the employees' committee replied June 11, saying the proposal was not acceptable and "unless your committee is prepared to postpone the putting into action of the proposed decrease in rates of pay they will proceed to call for a board of

This failure to reach an agreement was finally met by the present order making wage revisions effective next Sunday and leaving the question of later adjustments open.

In the matter of wage reductions the railways are following the example of the United States Railways and are also meeting the reduced freight rates which have lately been put into effect.

The point of view of the men in regard to the reduction is expressed as follows:

"The men's committee replies by bringing to the notice of the associa-tion clause 57 of the industrial disputes' investigation act, which requires that in the event of proposed wage changes resulting in dispute, until the dispute has been finally dealt with by a board and a copy of its report has been delivered through the registrar to both parties affected, neither of these parties shall alter conditions of employment with re-







DEFERS AWARD IN G. T. R. CASE

Lord Birkenhead Announces Judgment Reserved When Arguments Concluded.

SURE APPEAL SUCCESSFUL

Counsel For Shareholders Confident Arbitration On Value Will Be Reheard.

LONDON, July 13 .- (By Canadian Press Cable) .- "Their lordships will take time to consider what advice to tender his majesty." The lord chancellor, Lord Birkenhead, in this way announced this afternoon upon conclusion of argument, that the privy council had reserved judgment regarding the appeal of the shareholders of the Grand Trunk against the award of arbitration in connection with the value of the preference and common stocks of the railway upon its acquisition by the Canadian gov-

The opinion among counsel is that their lordships will probably allow the appeal on the ground that the judgment of Sir Walter Cassels included matter from the Drayton-Acworth report, and also because of the rejection of evidence concerning re-

roduction value. It was plain, however, during the closing stages of the proceedings that their lordships were fully impressed with the gravity of rehearing the arbitration. This was especially evident when Sir John Simon, on behalf of the Grand Trunk Railway in his final address, again referred to the Cassels judgment.

Claim Matter Grave. Lord Carson asked: "Supposing we come to the conclusion that Sir Walter Cassels was wrong and we refer the matter back; what will happen then? Will Sir Walter Cassels give another judgment eliminating certain portions of his previous judgment, and relying on other facts? It is a very grave matter, you see.

Sir John Simon replied: at all shut my eyes to the fact that rehearing of the arbitration is very serious undertaking, but if there be a complaint on a point of aw having some substance behind it am sure the fact of setting it right will entail considerable time, labor and expense, but will not deflect your lordships' judgment."
