





William Hunter, veteran London South livery proprietor, has ten such vehicles stored away and states that he has been offered \$100 by various junk dealers for them.

"They insist, however, that I burn all the wood off before they will take them," said Mr. Hunter. "I just couldn't do it and still have the cabs on hand. Equipment worth \$9,000 in 1900 will bring but \$100 now. That gives you some idea of what the automobile industry has done to the livery business.

#### **GREAT CANADIAN ARTIST BEGAN AS SIGN-PAINTER**

Walker Picture Recently Sold for \$18,000-First Painting Was Listowel Orange Banner

ORATIO WALKER, the noted Canadian artist who has lived most of his life among the habitants of Quebec, though born in Ontario, furnishes a peculiar contradiction. His first venture in art was to paint an Orange banner. This was at the age of twelve, and he received for the work the great sum of one hundred dollars. That was in his native town of Listowel. Many years later a Walker picture sold for \$18,000, a high price even nowadays during a painter's lifetime, but that was little beside the reward of \$100 for a boy of 12.

"For many days I was the hero of the town, as I drew on my fortune and treated the boys and girls to the best the little stores could offer," says the artist of the incident.

The banner was painted on order for the local Orange lodge. On one side was King Billy on his white horse, on the other a crown, crossed swords and open Bible.

Denny McManus made the painting possible. He was a servant in the Walker home, and befriended the lively youth through many a scrape. When the order came to paint the banner, Denny wanted to help. So he borrowed a white horse such as King Billy might have ridden, and posed for the boy artist. After a sitting he would go about town and report on the progress that had been made.

When at last it was delivered to the lodge and the money paid, Denny was the proudest man in town. "I told you so," was his message, in effect, but spoken at greater length and with an Irish accent that belonged to some parts of the Huron tract, and thereafter the traducers were silent.

#### FIGHTS CROWN'S BATTLE WITH THE AID OF HUMOR

D. L. McCarthy, K.C., Prosecuting in the Famous Home Bank Trials a Clever Strategist

HE fighting counsel" is the title by which they know him in the profeswhich they know him in the profession—D. L. McCarthy, K. C., special crown prosecutor in the trials of the Home Bank directors and officers who have been charged with making, using and approving of false returns concerning the bank's finances.

His fighting proclivities are honestly inherited from a line of Celtic ancestors, for his father was the late Dalton McCarthy, one of Canada's most famous parliamentarians and known to the oldtimers as "the equal righter." But there are other sides to his picturesque personality than his combativeness. His conduct of the Home Bank cases has brought some of those other characteristics to light, and have increased the fame of a lawyer who was already one of the best known and most highly reputed at the Canadian bar.

Perhaps it was these very characteristics that moved the attorney general of Ontario to pick D. L. McCarthy for crown counsel in this most notable series of trials. There has been nothing like them before in the history of Canadian courts. The first of the cases began on September 9 last and they are likely to last for a few weeks yet. Two officers and six directors are on the list of the arraigned.

First and foremost of the McCarthy characteristics is a certain bull-dog tenacity. He sticks to his point either until it is clearly made or it is seen that it cannot be made. He has words that have an acid flavor or he can pass a pleasantry with the most courteous. He is somewhat of a legal strategist. Opponents have found that when he is examining or cross examining a witness he will quite casually ask certain questions and get seemingly casual answers. There is an utter absence of emphasis on these questions that rather throws his friend the enemy off the scent. But the importance of them comes boldly to light in the succeeding argument when D. L. McCarthy picks out those casual words and ties to them the great significance that they have. His strategy lies in the fact that he conceals their importance until the

Sometimes there is a barb of satire or sarcasm in some of his quips, but for the most part they are good-humored jests. He has even been known to indulge in the pun. One of his most quoted retorts was in the C. F. Smith case when Gordon Waldron, K.C., was the opposing lawyer, and a crown witness was on the stand. Mr. Waldron objected to the evidence being accepted and between every answer he voiced his protest with the phrase "I object." It came with such regular and monotonous regularity that finally the slightly exasperated crown counsel remarked to the judge. 'My friend stands there ticking like a clock with his I ob-

Another sample of his humor came when J A. Austin, who looked after the Home Bank fleet, was on the stand and was relating the facts as to the rum running voyages of the Vaudreuil between Glasgow and New York. The ship was of course at this time in the possession of the Home Bank.






