



> HOW TO PREPARE PIGEONS FOR SHOWING

A. W. Barton, of Toronto, Gives Pointers to Bird Farciers.

Pigeons as well as chickens need need bother no one for a healthy flock fair share of attention before going to will pay for its keeping and leave nice a show if we wish to be in the money profit. In selling squabs take the larger ones from two nests in preference to taking both from one. This leaves the female in each nest. As the females are more tender than the males you should always try to have males, you should always try to have birds. Spend as much time as posfor the females which will die.

If you are too fond of your pets to sell the young ones to be killed, you can sell many for pets; but this is not so satisfactory, for it is so hard to tell the sexes, and in the course of time you will find your flock to constitute the sexes are sell to them and feeding them little tit-bits such as hemp or canary seed. Now a many fanciers seem to think it necessary to keep birds intended to show away from the sun. I might say I allow mine free range and find that the sun does them more harm in the spring and early summer than it does in the early fall when they are moulting, and by the time they are through moult the sun does not do them any harm as they stay inside a great deal and what outside air they do get seems to tend to harden the feather and keep the color there. Of course in case of fall fairs or shows held in the early part of September, like the Toronto Industrial, some of the fanciers resort to means that seem crue such as pulling all tail feathers out of Fantails about seven or eight weeks before the show so as to ensure a new tail, otherwise the birds would likely be minus a few tail feathers, through moult, as most pigeons are moulting about this season of the year. It is also customary to pull the bootings of booted birds, but I consider this is one of the worst kinds of cruelty, as the boot feathers, as a rule, are very firmly set, and invariably the bird loses considerable blood as in most cases the foot will bleed when a feather is drawn out of it. Many fanciers do not think of the torture to the birds but to the honor of winning a ticket or ribbon as a fantail weak in tail properties and a booted bird shy in boots would stand little chnce of

winning, hence the practice. Readers of this article who know the variety I breed might say it is one on me, but sooner than torture my pets I would do without the honor of winning the ribbon. Show birds should always be clean and in some lofts in cities it is almost an impossibility to keep them clean. Give your birds a bath about three times a week and if this does not suffice the next best thing to do is wash them. To do this take a little castile soap and boil it in water so that it is about like soft soap or a trifle thinner and take your bird and lather it well but be careful to rub with the webb of the feather, then wash the soap out well with lukewarm water, but be sure to use plenty and not be sparing of running up and down stairs. I have done this from 16 to 62, and there is nothing I enjoy more."] of water to rince the soap out, otherwise the bird will look worse than ever, as the soap will prevent the webb of water to rince the soap out, otherof the feather going in its right place after it is dry. If it is necessary to wash a bird do it at least a week before show time and if one wash does not make it clean do not be afraid to wash it again. In conclusion, I might say a bird that is tame, no matter what variety of the pigeon tribe, will often win over a far superior specimen that is wild and excited, as a bird that is tame will stand up and show off all its best qualities where the other will crouch in the corner of the coop and hide its best qualities and show any poor ones it may have.


