STORICAL NAVAL CATASTRO-PHES.

The Maine was not the first United States ship of war to meet dearraction in time of peace. An article by Frederick Stansbury in The Illustrated American attates that on June 4th, 1829, the Benalogos, which was known as Fulton II., was destroyed by an explosion in the harbor of New York. Twenty-four persons were killed and nineteen wounded. The mystery of the explosion was never cleared up. There were numerous surmises, and suspicion rested for a while on a gunner's mate who had been flogged on the day of the catastrophe for a breach of discipline. Some people in elined to the opinion that the accident was caused, by carelessly exposed gunpowder, of which there were several barrels on board. The Demalogos was interesting as being the first steam war vessel ever constructed. She was to have been used in the war of 1812, but was not completed in time. Somewhat later in the century the United States warship Wasp put to sea and was never again heard of. Her fate can only be conjectured. Doctor Holmes, either in the Antocrat or the Professor, tells most graphically how for years, in the New England seaport, every time he heard the firing of cannot he thought sprung into his mind, "Here toznes the Wasp!" 

Windsor Council Discusses the Natural Gas Question.

At the Windsor, council meeting last night the question of the exportation of natural gas occupied most of the time of the aldermen. After the routine had been disposed of the mayor address-

of the aldermen. After the routine had been disposed of the mayor addressed the council on the outcome of his last visit to Ottawa. He stated that the deputation from Essex county had presented its claims against further exportation of gas. He said it had been shown that, according to the resources of other fields, the Essex supply would soon be exhausted should the exportatation to Detroit be continued.

W. F. McSween, of Leanington, said that about 130 persone, who owned property where the gas fields are situated, had leased their lands to the Ontario Natoral Gas Co. He said they would be willing to form part of a deputation to wait on the government to ask that the further exportation of gas be prohibited; in other words, that the charter of the Detroit Construction Co. be canceled by the government. He asked the city of Windsor to assist other municipalities throughout the county in sending a deputation to Ottawa in regard to the gas question, and to contribute about \$200 towards this object. He was followed by several members of Windsor board of trade. It is expected that Windsor will contribute its share towards send a deputation.




