THE "BANCROFT LOCAL."

Although considerable has been said and written in reference to this stamp, and although its spurious character has been fully written up in the "Stamp Collector's Monthly Gazette" published in this city some years ago, yet as we have up to the present time advocated its collection, we now willingly give space to the following from the pen of an able subscriber: - About the year 1865 a couple of gentlemen identified with stamp collecting in the city of Montreal, called upon Mr. Bancroft the owner of an Express, which bore his name, in Great St. James' St. and obtained permission from that gentlemen to use his name in connection with a forthcoming local stamp; which they were about to issue. The furore for "locals" was then at its height, and the collection which did not contain at least 300 or 400 United States Locals, passed for hardly any account at all. The "Bancroft" was a real stamp in no proper sense of the word. It was a purely manufactured article, made to sell only, and had no real existence as a legitimate "local" in anyway. Like the famous New Brunswick Local "Baldwin's Railroad Postage two-pence," and the equally infamous "Fenian Stamp," it was the coinage of the brain of an over-Sute sharp stamp dealer. Mr. Bancroft must not be held in any way responsible ir the dodge, for dodge it certainly cas, and the only object aimed at in hits nificent "get up."

existence at all; was the one desiderative to fleece Philatelists, and in this humane desire the manufacturers were only partly successful. The stamp was in existence but a short time, never in use, and one day the Government stepped in and forbade its issue. Those on hand were destroyed, by order; but as is usually the case, some were held over, and these no doubt are the ones that are in the market. They are spurious stamps, fit only to be preserved as curiosities of their publicity.

A system of sixpenny postal telegrams is soon to be established in this Kingdom.

JAMAICA.

To the *Philatelist* (English) belongs the honor of first heralding a new halfpenny stamp for this Island. The color is Carmine on White.

MAURITIUS.

The Canadian Philatelist announces two new envelopes for the Mauritius 10d. rose, and 1s. 8d. blue; also a 10d. adhesive in "Morocco color and Gold."

PERSIA.



The annexed cut represents the new set of stamps recently struck for this Government, from a die prepared some seven years ago, but not used until the present.

NEW ZEALAND.

A new set of stamps are in preparation and will consist of the following values. 1d. 2d. 3d. 4d. 6d. and 1s. The colors are not yet definitely known.

RUSSIA. — Locals.

A Local stamp for the district of Boguchar has just come to hand from our St. Petersburg correspondent. The value is 6 kop, black on white. In reference to this local the *Stamp Collector's Magazine* says, "As a postmark it would pass muster but as a stamp it is nowhere."

Local envelopes for Fatejh have also made their appearance, of the following denominations,—4 kop deep blue, and 6 kop carmine.

SWEDEN.

New envelopes and post-cards of the value of 10 ore, are soon to be issued. The two values -- 9 and 17 ore — wanted to complete the set of adhesives, are announced.

TRINIDAD.

We are in receipt of the 1 shilling stamp of this Island struck in Yellow.

UNITED STATES.

We clip the following telegram from a St. John daily: —

NEW YORK, NOV. 18.

A Washington despatch states that the Postmaster-General will recommend the postal telegraph system, the abolition of the franking privelege, and consolidation of the New York and Brooklyn Post Offices.

THE POSTAGE STAMP TRADE.—It has been generally supposed, by Philatelists at least, that since the demise of the "Stamp Collector's Gazette" and the retirement of its editor, Geo. Stewart, Jr., Esq., from the trade, that stamp collecting in the Maritime Provinces had completely died out. This is a grand mistake however, as the large trade at present done by the Foreign Stamp Co, will amply prove. Mr. W. H Bruce, correspondent of the company, has shown us an order received this week from a German firm amounting to The business done by \$110.00 gold. this firm for the month of October amounts in the aggregate to over \$200. - St. John Telegraph, Nov. 20.

THE FRANCO-AMERICAN POSTAL TREATY.—In regard to this treaty a new difficulty has arisen, and one which like all the rest, arises from French 'redtapeism,' and the difficulty of getting through the Circumlocution Office. In Cabinet council M. Thiers acknowledged the very large deficits in the postal revenue, and reluctantly confessed that there had to be a change. M. de Remusat has favoured a treaty with the United States, and a large reduction of the present rates, on the broad ground of modern progress, and M. Thiers finally came to the same view, on the ground of the importance of the Commercial interests between the two coun-Anything tending to increase the means of intercommunication would tend to increase the general revenue arising from taxes on commerce.—Paris Correspondence New York Times.

The first steamer of the new British Pacific Mail Company will leave Hong Kong for San Francisco about the first of January. The company has secured American agents in both San Francisco and Hong Kong, and seems determined to make a strong effort to succeed in the Pacific carrying trade.
