

Belleville on the Bay of Quinte

ELLEVILLE city is situated on the Bay of Quinte, an arm of Lake Ontario, at the Southern extremity of Hastings county. It is the centre of trade for a large agricultural and mining district. The Moira river, which passes through the city, furnishes power for mills and manufacturing.

Belleville's population is about ten thousand. It is noted for its handsome residences. It is pure and clean, as well as beautiful, and has the lowest death rate recorded in the province. From its beautiful surroundings it has become very popular as a summer resort. The Bay of Quinte is a paradise for the angler, the yachtsman and oarsman, while the district to the north is a veritable hunters' elysium.

Belleville is the centre and point of entrance for the ever growing mining industries of Eastern Ontario. It is 220 miles west of Montreal, and 113 miles east of Toronto, on the main line of the Grand Trunk Railway. A branch of this road runs north to Madoc, crossing the C. P. R. at Ivanhoe. 



In the adjoining sules room (south side is the stock of stoves, tin and graniteware, gas stoves and fixtures,


