

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LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditious.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along-side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per sere.

Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler wno has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

(Continued from Page 1) impressed early in October with the necessity of giving the greatest possible support to the northern flank of the allies in the effort to outflank the enemy and compel him to evacuate his position. He says that the situation on the Aisne waranted the with-drawal of the British troops from the positions they occupied there, as the enemy had ben weakened by continual attacks and the fortifications of the allies much improved.

Gon French made known his view to Gen. Jofre who agreed with it. The French general staff arranged for the withdrawal of the British, which began on October 3, and was completed on October 19, when the 1st Army Corps, under Gen Sir Douglas Haig, detrained at St. Omer.



It is quite to be expected to hear of a broken morale among the German conscripts, who have gone to their death in recent weeks by thousands in futile attempts to break through the iron lines of the Allies. These reports, as winter ensues, will become more numerous, and they indicate that the Kaiser's machine is cracking from the strain put upon it. On the other hand, in spite of hardship, severe fighting and loss, the spirit of the allied troops is that kind of spirit borne up by the consciousness of right, and it is one of the requisites of a good soldier. With Kitchener now rushing hundreds of thousands of fresh troops to France, there is much to look forward to soon in the land operations where the life blood of the Empire is being shed.

#### CIVIC AFFAIRS

With the approach of the New Year civic affairs naturally begin to command unusual attention, although there is no reason why civic representatives and pepole alike should not the year round take the same degree of interest in the management of municipal business. Just at present the City Council has a problem to face in the matter of retrenchment, and is similarly situated with many other cities and towns throughout Canada. In this respect, however, it might be mentioned that Brantford's credit is unusually high, and were it not for the general situation, there would be no reason to worry whatever about retrenchment of any kind in public

works, official salaries, or otherwise.

It is even said now in official circles that retrenchment is not necessary, and that the city is quite able to pay its way. Not having an adequate eport from the Council committee which recently went into the situation, and which, it is said, has made certain recommendations, it is difficult to see either why or how retrenchment will be effected. This is the problem the aldermen have to settle to-night, and it is said the task is beset with difficulties. If it can be shown that a considerable reduction in the cost of civic service can be effected, and that this money will be applied to giving unemployed work on public necessities, then the plan of retrenchment might be considered laudable. 
