"A HELPLESS COWARD"

The Western Chronicle in its leading editorial of May 1st, argues that Mr. Borden, the Premier of Canada, is a helpless coward. A Liberal member of parliament, during one of the weeks in which the blockades barred the progress of parliamentary work, advanced about the same sentiment. No leader of the history of Canada, has ever shown more patience in parliament than has Premier Borden. He and his party, awaited patiently day and night, the end of the antics by which the party led by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, sought to prevent an honorable return for the money paid by Canadians for the transaction of their business. Subsequently Mr. Borden sought to amend the rules of the House of Commons, so as to prevent a continuance of such senseless obstruction. If that showed a lack of courage, then the late Mr. Gladstone was a coward. Canada has today rules less stringent, than those in force in any federal legislature on earth. Canada was the last among sane legislative bodies, to make House rules so as that a body of insane, fanatical, envious, disloyal politicians, could not continue to obstruct the business of the country. Mr. Borden, the Premier was the man who moved this amendment of the rules of the House. Such individual as the Hon. William Pugsley, of wide historic eminence, F. B. Carvell, the bluffing bullie, the nasty Neely, the notorious Emerson, and a bunch of somewhat more respectable members of parliament, called Mr. Borden every name the English language could produce in their anger, he sat absolutely calm. His supporters obeyed his influence and also remained quiet. Did Mr. Borden show any cowardice in his unparalleled patience and gentlemanly bearing?

The Western Chronicle is the personal organ of Sir Fred Borden, and H. H. Wickwire. We would like to know if the former, Sir Fred Borden, has any cause for saying that his cousin, R. L. Borden, is a coward? As for what Mr. Wickwire thinks of Premier Borden, we do not imagine anyone cares as it don't count. Sir Frederick Borden knows that his cousin is no coward, there may be among Sir Fred's relatives a coward or two, but if he thinks Premier Borden is a coward, let him come out over his own name and say so, and not skulk behind one of his hirelings. No one ever accused Sir Wilfrid Laurier, of being a coward, and yet he and his party sought to bring in a closure bill, and hadn't the force of character to do so. Every one of his leading newspaper organs said that when parliament assembled after the election of Sept., 1911, that they expected to win, a closure bill would be introduced. It was necessary to both parties that such a bill should go into effect, and to the courage of Hon. R. L. Borden, we are indebted for this amendment to the rules of the House of Commons, so that the business of that Chamber at least, can be transacted without the obstruction of a bunch of irresponsibles. A conspiracy was concocted during the summer of 1912, by which an election was to be forced by obstruction in parliament. Its publicity always followed any visit of Sir Fred Borden, in his less attractive first Lieutenant, to any part of the country. It only happened to be upon the navy question that this great revolution occurred. At present this same bunch of conspirators, are promising an election, because the opposition in parliament will refuse supply. Did anyone ever hear of such an enthusiastic desire for an election. No federal election will occur until the Borden Government gets good and ready. A refusal to grant supply cannot possibly, and will not, add to, or diminish, the years and months before Premier Borden and his government will appeal to the people. The antics of such politicians as the present opposition at Ottawa, and the canned products of their literature producing machine at the same place, is simply amusing to the Borden Government. Those people who follow

that class of reading are going to be awfully deluded, and they will live to be very old men before any change of government. Many of their fondest hopes are blasted because of their following after so persistently, the absolute lies of their party organs.

Obituary

Judson Foster

Mr Judson Foster, an aged and respected resident of Hampton, passed away on Thursday, the 24th inst. He was born in Cornwallis on the 29th of Dec 1845, and moved at the age of four years to Hampton, with his father, who survived him at the age of 102 years. His school days were spent in Hampton. At the age of fourteen years he went to sea became captain at the age of twenty nine years and altogether spent twenty-one years as a seaman. Forty-five years on Dec. 30 last, he was married to Miss Lavinia daughter of Mr. Eaton Chute, who now mourns the loss of a kind and considerate husband. The issue of this marriage was eleven children, six of whom are living two daughters and four sons. The daughters are Emma, now residing in Lynn, and Bessie residing in New York. The sons are Arthur DeW. Linden H., Herbert and Harry. In 1869 Mr. Foster joined the Masons and twelve years ago he identified himself with the Baptist Church. He took an active part in political life and was regarded by all with whom he associated as a conscientious, fair minded man. The funeral, which took place on Sunday afternoon, was very largely attended, many not able to gain entrance to the church. The final service at the grave was conducted by Rothsay Lodge of Freemasons. —Monitor.

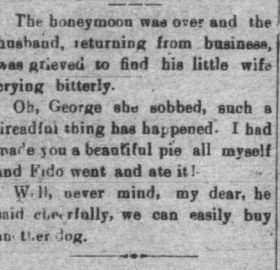

Good Season For Black Foxes

Managing Director of the Tuplin Farm is in the City

C. L. Grant of Prince Edward Island, Managing Director of the Tuplin Black Fox Corporation with Head office at Halifax and ranch at New Anson P. E. I., was in the City yesterday and in the course of an interview with The Morning Chronicle gave many exceedingly interesting accounts of the black fox industry in that Province.

Mr Grant's trip to the City was for the purpose of reporting to the head office of the Company the prospects for the future. He said that the present season had been a good breeding one. Mr Tuplin had reported seven litters to date from eleven pens, and the prospects were excellent that there would be a litter in every pen.

In the past the average to a litter has been 3 1/2. Nine pairs had last year 33 pups, and that season was not considered good for breeding. One of the Tuplin females which had four last year had six this year. The black fox industry generally has had an excellent season.

Speaking directly of the Tuplin Company, Mr Grant said there had been sales made of young foxes in Boston, New York and all over Canada to Vancouver, with inquiries, from Russia and Japan.

"Some of our stock was sold early at the market price of the time. Yesterday we sold three additional pairs at much higher prices. In this connection I may say that sales have been made in Russia and Japan, which goes to prove the world wide interest which the industry in Prince Edward Island has created. Another fact of this interest is that taken by the Press, both New York and Montreal papers and magazines have published special articles regarding the industry's development."

Four-fifths of the silver black in captivity are on Prince Edward Island, the total number being about 300. The other one fifth are principally held in New Brunswick and Quebec. In their native haunts they are now confined to Alaska and the northern parts of Canada.

Mr Grant was very enthusiastic about the prospects for the coming year. "So far as we can judge," he said, "this year's increase is over sold, the people inquiring for them now will have to wait until 1914."

S. S. Prince Albert arrived on Sunday from Yarmouth and commences her Summer's work between Parrsboro—Kingsport—Wolfville today. She has been painted and the machinery overhauled and is in first class condition.

Returns From His Duties in Great Britain

Mr. John N. Chute, the representative in Great Britain of the United Fruit Companies of Nova Scotia, Limited, arrived at his Berwick home last Saturday accompanied by Mrs. Chute.

The officials of the company express themselves as highly satisfied with the work done by Mr. Chute. In their reports they have pointed out how savings effected by their representative in the disposal of apples have paid his salary and ex-

penses several times over. They further point out that not alone in such savings has Mr. Chute's work proven valuable, for he has collected information and obtained business connections which will prove highly advantageous to the co-operatives in future years.

In an interview on Monday Mr. Chute said that from now on Nova Scotia fruit growers must prepare themselves to meet the keenest competition in the apple markets of Europe. The strongest competition during the past season came from Oregon apples. The western fruit reached the European market packed attractively. The fruit itself was excellent and the quality standard kept high. With the Oregon apples no undesirable varieties were sent, the trade chiefly centering on Oregon Newtons. The result of such perfection, meant, said Mr. Chute, easy marketing and the highest prices, and a name was being made for the fruit that was a great advertisement in itself.

"We can grow as good apples," declared Mr. Chute, "as they do in Oregon, but we have not yet adopted the methods of packing used by the westerners and our growers have not realized the necessity of paying more attention to quality. We have a big fight on our hands if we are to continue successful apple growing in Nova Scotia and the sooner we realize this and act accordingly the better it will be for all of us."

Mr. Chute gave many instances of the value of co-operation but claims there is much to be done in order to make sure for the grower a greater amount of the price paid by the consumer for the product. He points out many savings that could be made if the growers had better market arrangements on the other side and would keep hold of the apples until they passed into the hands of the retailers.

Another point on which our growers are weak is advertising. Mr. Chute says the California Fruit Grower's Association spent \$150,000 in advertising in the British markets last season and considered the money profitably spent. There should be, in the opinion of Mr. Chute, a systematic advertising campaign for the Nova Scotia product, pointing out not only the excellencies of our apples but giving various ways in which the fruit can be used. But above all the product must be up to the advertising.—Register

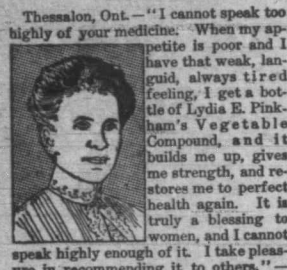

The Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Co., Ltd., is the successor of the earliest colliery company that mined in Nova Scotia, and this company was also the first to manufacture steel in Canada. From a small pioneering concern, the business has grown into an industry of enormous dimensions and importance. The employees at the various works aggregate over 6,500, and the output of bituminous coal per annum is 900,000 tons. In all, five collieries are operated at Sydney Mines, Cape Breton, and of the total output 600,000 tons are sold and delivered in the various parts of the St. Lawrence, the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland, 70,000 tons are shipped as bunkers and the balance of 230,000 tons is used in the company's own furnaces and steel plant at Cape Breton.

The blast furnace, open hearth steel furnaces (including Harmet and engineering workshops which are at New Glasgow the total output is 100,000 tons per day.

The utmost interest was displayed in these works by those members of the party representing kindred trades, it being regarded by them as one of the most important points of the whole tour. In view of the vast expansion going on all over the Dominion, it was apparent to the expert visitors what an excellent outlook the company had.

A Great Aid To Farmers

Mr. W. W. Hubbard, Superintendent of the Dominion Government Experimental Farm near Fredericton, in a recent interview gave the following facts about the N. B. farm, which he may purchase for about 200 acres of the farm, which comprises 460 acres in all, have now been cleared, and 25 acres is in readiness for corn, potato and root crops this year. Another 100 acres will be cleared and the remainder left in forest for the present. The farm now employs about twenty men, and during the summer this number will be increased to fifty or sixty.

The work of building barns to house 100 head of cattle, 25 horses, an extensive piggery and a poultry plant will be started at once. The raising of heavy horses and general live stock will be specialized in from the first and a general investigation of the best varieties of crops for the New Brunswick climatic and soil conditions will be conducted.

It is possible that before long a quantity of seed may be available for distribution. Mr. Hubbard is of the opinion that the establishment of an experimental farm to serve the needs of New Brunswick alone will impart a great impetus to the agricultural industry in this province.

International Horticultural Congress Ghent, Belgium, 1913.

An international horticultural congress will be held at Ghent in 1913 at the same time as the great battle of flowers. The congress will include five sections, viz.: 1 floriculture and the special processes of forcing plants; 2 fruit growing; 3 market gardening; 4 science and popularization; horticultural engineering; 5 horticultural economy (trade, transport, association).

A national dairy and cold storage congress will be held at Ghent during the International Exhibition of 1913.

See Benefit to Canada

New Tariff Likely to Increase Trade

Comparatively few expressions of opinion could be secured from Boston business men on the Tariff bill introduced in the House of Representatives.

The principal exception was in the case of men who have an interest in the development of trade between New England and Canada and the Maritime Provinces. Such men as John F. Masters and George William Bentley had a great deal to say, and that very enthusiastic, holding that this was even better than reciprocity.

One other point of view expressed was that the bill would probably not become a law in its present shape, and that therefore comment of any kind now was rather useless.

Gov. Foss, when asked his opinion of the tariff bill last evening, said: I have been so busy that I have had no time to look at the tariff bill and for that reason I do not care to make any comment.

John Masters, superintendent of the Boston & Yarmouth Steamship Company, said: "If the tariff bill as reported in Congress today becomes law, it will, certainly lead to a great revival of trade in natural products between this country and Canada—more particularly between Boston and the Maritime Provinces. It will restore to a large extent the prosperous days of the old reciprocity treaty with Canada. As I view it, the greatest benefit will come to the Maritime Provinces and New England—particularly to the port of Boston, for the effect of the removal of the duty from such food staples as fish, potatoes, dairy and agricultural products must at once

serve to stimulate the raising and export of these commodities to the New England markets.

Aside from the consideration of the effect as to farm products, the lowering of duties in many lines of manufactured goods, notably steel rails and lumber, will undoubtedly react to stimulate and expand Canadian industries, such as the smelting works and rolling mills at Sydney, C B and elsewhere in the Eastern Provinces.

While I doubt if the proposed reductions in food products will immediately affect the cost of these articles in the Boston markets, they will have a wholesome tendency in checking the further rise in the price of meats, eggs and butter. As a port of entry Boston must it seems derive immense benefit from the importation of free coal pulp, the manufactures of iron and it is my opinion that sailing vessels will increase in number and the present steamship lines will receive a great impetus in augmented freight and passenger traffic.

Equally important is the fact that the proposed new Tariff bill will tend to create a kinder political feeling in Canada towards the United States, for Canadians will now receive virtually all that the reciprocity treaty proposed by President Taft offered them without being asked for the present at least for an equivalent in exchange. In the larger sense, it will tend to strengthen and solidify friendly feeling between the United States and Great Britain.

I believe such towns as Yarmouth, Halifax, St John, the chief maritime seaports, if the proposed bill becomes law, will immediately feel a vital revival from the prospect of increased commerce in natural products of all kinds with New England States.

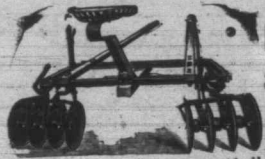
