A Man Shot Near Prescott.

A serious shooting affair occurred at Maple Ridge, about three miles from Prescott, on Friday, 12th inst. 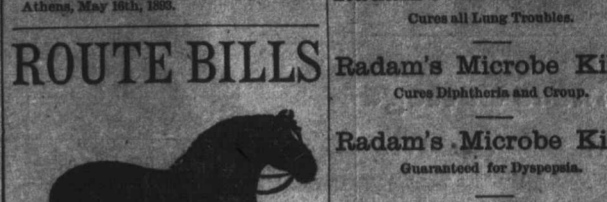
