LYNDHURST FAIR

Fine Weather—Good Program—and Interesting Exhibits.

Lyndhurst Fair, the first of the local trio, was held on Thursday and Friday last. Thursday forenoon witnessed the arrival of a fine exhibit of goods for the hall, and these were very attractively displayed by the directors in charge.

Fine weather prevailed on Friday, and shortly after dinner the gate receipts indicated a fair measure of success in that important department. The hall was first visited, and it proved a rallying place for visitors, particularly ladies, all day. The showing in grain, roots and vegetables was comparatively small, but the ladies had done their part well and so the hall presented as usual a very inviting appearance. In domestic as well as in Ladies' Work excellent exhibits were made. A beautiful and appetizing display of pastry was shown and fine samples of honey, fruit, etc.

The Karn piano was "King" of the hall, and, manipulated by the deft fingers of Miss Addie White, a popular and skilled musician, it gave forth merry music that was very much enjoyed by all. Mr. G. L. Riches, agent for the Karn in this district, had the pleasure of meeting and greeting a large number of old friends on this occasion. A gramophone exhibited by Mr. Quinn of Lansdowne also attracted considerable attention.

In the cattle, sheep and swine classes some excellent animals were shown, but the number was far below what it should be in such a progressive farming section. This fair is just what the members (not alone the officers) make it, and they should resolve that the live stock classes next year shall be filled to overflowing.

There was a good showing of horses, and the prize was constantly surrounded by an interested throng. Mr. Stonehouse of Port Perry, one of the government circuit judges, assisted in picking out the prize-winners and his judgment, backed with good reasons, was accepted by the many experienced horsemen present.

In the poultry department, Sim Manhardt of Athens made a great display and captured the bulk of the prizes. His Rose-Comb Rhode Island Reds received much favorable comment. Elevated benches on which to place the cages would add very much to the appearance of this part of the exhibition.

Opponents of horse racing at fairs say it could not exist without the fair to support it; and the resort is at once made that the fair couldn't live without the races. Experience has proven that there is a large measure of truth in both these statements. Certain it is that the trials of speed at Lyndhurst draw out a crowd that probably would not go near a "purely agricultural" show. We are pleased to learn that the fair was financially as well as socially a success. The careful, capable work of the Secretary, Mr. Ziba Jackson, ensured the smooth running of all parts, and from a first contact with the affable and courteous Mr. White at the entrance, through all departments and in the presence of the genial President Mr. R. J. Wood, the visitor was made to feel welcome. And this goes a long way towards coloring one's opinion of a fair.

The exhibit at Lyndhurst, though weak in spots, was on the whole very creditable, and the programme gave every satisfaction.

FALL ASSIZE COURT

There were no criminal cases at the High Court of Justice held in Brockville last week, and His Lordship Mr. Justice Britton received the customary white gloves.

Imerson v. Leeder—This was an action brought by Chas. J. Imerson of Yonge against Delbert Leeder for the seduction of his daughter, Ella Blanche, claiming damages of \$1,500. Leeder did not defend the action, and on the evidence of the father and daughter judgment against him was given for \$1,350.

Chester Lockwood of Bastard was successful in having set aside a conveyance of real estate unintentionally made by him in 1903.

Doyle v. Shaver—This was an action brought by Margaret Doyle, widow residing in Brockville, against Albert E. Shaver, grocer also of Brockville to recover \$1,500 damages for the seduction of her daughter Mary Doyle, who was for several years a clerk employed in the store of the defendant, and who, it is alleged, was seduced by the defendant. Verdict for \$1,000 in favor of plaintiff.

The case of Suffel v. Brown was one in which a keen interest was taken by many throughout the county. Damages to the extent of \$2,500 were asked by plaintiff. The Times thus summarizes the case: Mr. Hanna, counsel for Suffel, stated that in December Mrs. Suffel while making purchases at the defendant's store went with one of the clerks of the store for the purpose of examining some goods that she desired to purchase. In that warehouse portion which was dimly lighted there was an open cellarway leading to the basement section of the store and this open cellarway was partially covered by two pieces of plank over which the clerk and Mrs. Suffel would have to pass to reach the goods sought for. In attempting to pass over this plank covering Mrs. Suffel fell to the basement beneath and suffered very severe injuries. She was for a long time unconscious and was obliged to remain in Delta eight days before her physical condition was sufficiently improved to permit her to be removed to her own home, three miles distant from the village.

The maintenance of this open cellarway in the place where it was the plaintiffs counsel contended was gross negligence on the part of the defendant. Mr. and Mrs. Suffel gave evidence and medical testimony was submitted. Mr. Brown gave testimony that was described as very frank and full, making no effort to conceal anything. Miss Claudia Wilson, who was waiting upon Mrs. Suffel at the time of the accident gave clear and positive testimony. The jury, after over an hour's consideration, gave a verdict in favor of the defendant.

Mr. Suffel's costs in the case will be heavy, as there were a large number of witnesses.

A Hoss on Both of Them

A horse race is proverbially uncertain, and the same element of doubt seems to hover over the deliberations of the judges in the fall fair prize rings. This was exemplified at Lyndhurst on Friday. A bunch of thoroughbred horsemen, among whom were Deb Landon and Stearns Ransom, were watching the show of carriage horses. All were agreed that Jim Mitchell of Frankville had a good team of bays and understood just how to show them. The fact that after circling the little ring, Jim (one-time owner of "Sweet Violet") always brought his team to a standstill with their fore feet on rising ground was referred to as evidence of genius. Other outfits were closely scanned and expert criticism was handed out in a beautiful spirit of tea-meeting unanimity. It was not until it came to naming the winners that a difference of opinion arose. Stearns said, in a no-doubt-about-it way, "Jim will get first." But Deb had become enamored of a pair of dark iron greys that were always halted in the wrong place, and he said the red ticket would go to them. Refreshments were staked on the issue, and when the red ticket was finally passed over to a black team that neither had counted "in it," the bettors were given the horrible laugh by their friends, and all immediately adjourned to the ginger-pop and cider emporium. Hosses is hosses and likewise judges is judges, and the man who lies down for pleasant dreams on a dead-sure red-ticket cinch is likely to be rudely awakened.

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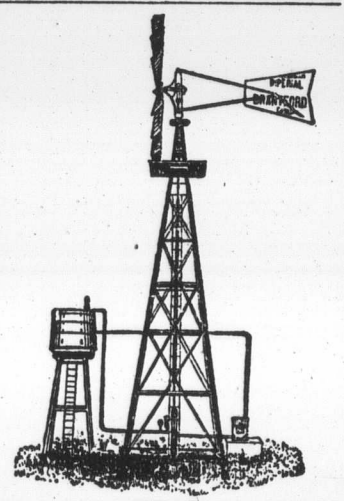
