





Goethe, the Emous German author, scholar, and thinkes, c'aimed that "it is the daily data of avery civilized per-son to look upon a good picture, hear a little good masic and commit to memory a few words from some rea-sonable mind." The late Frances E. Willard, in a recent and beautiful tribute to Professor W. P. Jones, her first teacher in the Woman's College of Evanston, lifting, tealises to the value of this work in her own life. She says "He aaked all of us girls to form the habit of com, mitting at least one verse a day from the best poets. 
