Edison's Talking Pictures.

At last Wolfville is going to have an opportunity of witnessing the latest and probably the greatest achievement of Thomas A. Edison, the Kinetophone, or 'Talking Pictures.'

Mr. Edison first introduced his new 'Talkies,' as they are already termed in slang, last February, since which time they have been shown in all the great cities of the world, in the leading vaudeville theatres at a big price of admission. Their success has been phenomenal and all records for attendance have been broken wherever they have been shown.

The Edison pictures are the only genuine talking pictures so far produced. That is, the only ones in which the record of voice and action is taken simultaneously. By this method, and by this method only, can talking pictures be successfully made.

The result is so perfect that the pictures are really weird and uncanny so much so, in fact, that the audience becomes oblivious to the fact that they are witnessing a mechanical production and are held by the interest in the subjects.

The Edison picture first shown in that of a lecturer who explains the details of the Kinetophone and it illustrates his points by various examples of different recording. For instance he drops a plate upon the floor and the crash is heard at the exact instant. Additional tests consist of vocalists, musical instruments, barking dogs, etc.

After the lecture you are carried through a series of entertainment consisting of drama, comedy, light and grand opera, etc. Such an entertainment as could not be shown by the living actors in any theatre, on account of the enormous expense involved.

On Thursday afternoon, while three men were at work repairing one of the Highhill buildings, the staging gave way, Ray Duncan was thrown to the ground, about thirty feet, falling face downward among a lot of rocks.

He was picked up in an unconscious condition and taken to the P. M. Hospital, his injuries being of such a serious nature that his recovery was not looked for. Everything possible was done for him by his medical attendant, but the poor fellow failed to rally, and on Sunday night passed away. He was a married man and leaves a wife and young family, for whom the deepest sympathy is felt. The other men on the staging managed to break the fall in some way and escaped injury.

The funeral was held on July 1st at two o'clock. Rev. G. C. F. Kierstead officiated at the service at the grave and was assisted by Rev. W. M. Ryan. The casket attended in a body.—Hants Journal.
