TORRENS LAND SYSTEM

At the last meeting of the old county council a motion was made favoring the extension of the Torrens Land system to the whole Province without the expense now necessary to be undertaken by the county council. As at previous sessions, the motion was voted down. It is interesting to note that the attempt to introduce the system into the United States has resulted in failure. The Torrens Land Title Law was passed by the Illinois Legislature in 1855. One of its provisions required an affirmative vote of the county before it could go into effect. It was submitted to the voters of Chicago and Cook county at the election last spring, and was approved by a large majority. It went into effect after a year, and up to the time it was declared unconstitutional 130 certificates of registration had been issued under it. Doubtless many more would have been registered had there not been cases before the courts to set aside the law. Now that it has been declared void all that has been accomplished under it will be returned to the old and complicated system of recording land titles.

THE COMMITTEE'S RECOMMENDATIONS

In the Harvey Case He'd Over Till Next Meeting - Pat Stock Club Grant \$50 to Help Them Out With the Show  
The chair so long occupied by Ald. Scroggie was the only one vacant at the city council meeting Monday evening. The order paper provided the material for talk, but the discussions were less protracted than usual. It was decided to give the Pat Stock Club \$50 in answer to the request of the department, consisting of Dr. Mills, John J. Hobson, Herbert Wright, James Miller and E. R. Bolland. The recommendations of the Special committee for further prosecutions of Edmund Harvey were laid over till the next meeting.

THE FAT STOCK SHOW

Ald. Coffey intimated that a deputation would be sent to the Guelph Fat Stock Club, and suggested that, to suit their convenience, they might be held here. He moved a resolution to that effect. Mr. Mills briefly stated the business of the deputation to ask the council to vote for the Fat Stock Club. The large number of entries in excess of the number of stalls in the exhibition of the county and city as a fat stock centre, the large number of entries from such a gathering, and, while recognizing the liberality of the council in the matter, the fact that the show is a source of revenue to the city, Mr. Hobson seconded Mr. Mills' motion. Ald. Peterson supported his motion, and Mr. Madock would support the motion, but said a word about the high taxes and the necessity of economy. Ald. Taylor was against the grant. He believed the money would be used for feeding the poor, and he would prefer voting it to the city mission. Ald. Nelson was willing to have the money turned over to the Fat Stock Club, but would give his guarantee for the payment of the debt. Ald. Coffey-Ald. Nelson is talking in the same fashion as the newspapers. Mr. Taverner and Mr. Gage were present. The city should have collected the money before they got the water. He would suggest that Ald. Coffey advise the motion that the petition be granted without prejudice to the claim for the back rates.

THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE

LETTER FROM MR. HARDY

Toronto, Nov. 27th, 1896.  
Sir.-Referring to my letter of today by yourself and a committee, I beg to say that the case of Queen v. Harvey, which you say the complaint of the committee appeared to be, I have thereupon transferred to the Minister of Justice as much of your committee as appears to me to be against the learned Judge.  
My attention has been called to the fact that the committee of council have charged the negotiations with Mr. Harvey with a restitution of the moneys wrongfully taken, directed the City Solicitor, Mr. Guthrie, to inform the learned Judge that restitution was made, and that the learned Judge, in the sentence, there can be no doubt, I think, that this information coming from the source it did, weighed with the learned Judge in imposing sentence. It is stated that it was made one of the conditions of restitution by the prisoner's solicitor (and to which the committee of council agreed) that the city solicitor should make this statement at the trial. The learned Judge and the Crown officer would doubtless assume, as the fact was that the information was given at that particular time for that purpose and with intent that it should have such effect, that it should have such effect, might think it should have, having regard to the second point, I have conferred with Mr. Johnson, and he states explicitly that he gave no assistance on behalf of the Crown, unless the sentence, nor was he asked by the learned Judge, would be called upon to express an opinion respecting it. Mr. Peterson, who was the Deputy Attorney General, prior to the trial, that statement would be expressly retained to assist him on the trial and that "no settlement in favour of a restitution of the moneys wrongfully taken, could either secure a withdrawal of the criminal charges, or that anything should be done openly in violation of the law. The department can be no party to an abandonment of its prosecution in consideration of a restitution of the moneys taken, whatever effect this latter act might have upon the mind of the Judge who tried the case in measuring the sentence." I have no reason to believe that Mr. Peterson did not faithfully carry out his instructions. It is further to be observed that the Crown took the usual precaution of instructing eminent counsel, especially to aid in preparing the evidence and to take charge of the trial, and sent an expert auditor some days in advance of the trial to assist in looking into the accounts.

Ald. Coffey said the city solicitor didn't put the condition in the agreement for fun, and if they didn't collect it it is time he didn't know when they could.

Ald. Mahoney and Kennedy moved that the amendment be postponed. The motion was carried.

THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE INLAND REVENUE DEPARTMENT

respecting the administration of food has been published. Out of 1265 samples analyzed only 105 or barely 9 per cent. of the whole have been found to be adulterated. Jams and jellies were the worst adulterated of all the samples examined. Out of 155 samples examined, 25 were adulterated. The attention of the department was for some years directed solely to the inspection of foods and drugs. The scope of its operations was subsequently extended to take in fertilizers and articles of commerce largely used by the farmers of the country. Later in the year, an important agricultural product, such as it is not pure the agriculture in using was frequently unadvised only by the loss of a valuable crop. The results of the past year's operations demonstrated that nearly 30 per cent. of the agricultural requirements of the act, a similar improvement may be noted in all classes of food excepting maple syrup, which was analyzed for the first time and has been found to be, in many cases, adulterated with glucose.

The rink presents a very fine appearance this afternoon. The space has been about all taken up with the animals exhibited in the various classes, and as the visitor enters the rink he is sure to be impressed with the appearance of order and regularity that characterizes the show.

As the visitor enters the building, probably the first thing he will notice is that devoted to the porkers. The old steers are in a very large one, and all the animals shown the choicest of their kind.

The space along the left hand side of the rink is devoted to the cattle. There is a double row of them—some sleek Shorthorns, drowsy Jerseys, and some other kinds. This space, large as it is, however, is not so well filled as the opposite side has been with them also.

In the latter number is a fine herd of Galloways and another particularly fine Shorthorn herd, shown by Mr. Jas. Yule, of Eldersville, and which is the property of the Yule Bros. Among the Shorthorns is a couple of choice heifers, belonging to Mr. Lodge, of Elmira.

A part of the space on the right hand side has been given to the sheep, and the exhibit, though not so large as the swine and the cattle, is very interesting, particularly some Leicester and Shropshire Grades belonging to Messrs. Orr & Elliot, Galt.

A detailed account of the various exhibits to be found at the rink will doubtless be wearisome, suffice it to say that not one poor or inferior animal is to be seen within the walls of that large building. That the show is bound to be a huge success is a foregone conclusion.
