EDITORIAL NOTES.

Every Canadian ought to be convinced of the advisability of selecting Manitoba and our own North-West if his mind is once made up to move from this province to a prairie country. The past season has brought into greater prominence the advantages of Manitoba over any of the adjoining States. While Minnesota was swept by terrible hurricanes, Manitoba, enjoying five washings, was unscathed. Menominee settled in Nebraska secured only two bushels of wheat in the year, while their countrymen in British territory reaped from 30 to 40 bushels.

The American grain dealers are looking to Russia as a market for a considerable share of the wheat export. Conflicting reports are in circulation as to how far the Russian harvest has proved a failure, but of late gloomy anticipations have been in the ascendant, and it is feared that a large portion of the wheat districts in Eastern Russia will take place this year. It is asserted that Dictator Melnikoff contemplates putting an embargo on all wheat exportation, the municipal governments of the South of Russia having petitioned for a measure of prohibition. Wheat for exportation has been already imported, and doubtless more will follow.

An elaborate computation of the wheat crop of the United Kingdom has been made by the London Times on the basis of the latest returns. The Orchard Caterpillar. In some parts this caterpillar is of quite destructive to the foliage of fruit trees, and has injured their growth by stripping the branches bare. To prevent a repetition of the trouble next season, the caterpillar should be destroyed by practical growers. The secret of the recuperative power displayed by France is found in the fact that nearly two-thirds of the population are agriculturists. The total rural population is about 28,000,000, of whom 20,000,000 are directly engaged in agriculture. Like most farmers, while agreeing with the general principle of legislation in regard to the land, they were not in favour of obtaining it. But in the main they were a unit on several points, as for instance they were all in favour of the removal of the land law; the abolition of distress; greater simplification in the transfer of property; and less expense in the conveyance of the property would necessarily be incurred by the eldest son. Both gentlemen were in favour of compensation to tenants for improvements, and expressed the opinion that farmers should, if possible, own their farms. There are, no doubt, excellent suggestions, but some of them are not to be carried out in the old land. Many farms cannot be purchased for any sum, while for the most part the land is in the hands of a few large proprietors.

NOVEMBER ON THE FARM.

By the chilly winds and cold snow flakes of November, the farmer is reminded that winter is close at hand, and that preparations for it must be hurried up. If he is one of the men who take time to the fore, look and not by the tail, his main harvest is now finished. His corn is in his barn, his potatoes in the cellar, and his apples marked or stored for the use of the family and stock. Possibly the cabbages and turnips may still be in the field, as these vegetables are rather improved than damaged by the October frost, but they should not be left to the frost of November. The best method of storing cabbages and turnips is in pits or trenches. Covered with a foot of earth they come out in the spring as fresh and crisp as when put into the ground. Cabbage is even more crisp in the spring than in the fall, for the earth bleaches and renders tender even grass.
