

 A Remarkable Test! Locally made by Messrs. W. & G. RENDELL.  
 To test Solignum as a preservative for Wood against the attacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 4 spruce, about two feet in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the balance clear wood, this was suspended by a wire through the centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, immediately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf (which is the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first) for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time we found some half-dozen small holes, only a very short distance in the clear part of the wood, which shows the liquid had penetrated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly begun boring before coming in contact with it.  
 Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we handle, we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends, leaving the centre third clear; this was in exactly the same place as the piece for the Solignum test for Three Months and Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect but the centre was riddled with worm holes.  
 Both these pieces of wood are to be seen at our Office by those interested in the preservation of Wharf Piles or any other wood work.

The Evening Chit-Chat

There are more things in Heaven and Earth, Horatio. Than are dreamt of in your philosophy. Well, I don't believe there is anything in hypnotism or telepathy or any of those tomfool things. The whole kit and boodle of them are nothing but fakes, gotten up to please a public that's crazy to be faked. With an air of having settled the whole matter, the speaker, a young newspaper man, sat back in his chair and eyed the rest of the group. In the group, besides the young newspaper man, were the man-who-thinks, the writer-man, a professor of psychology and two or three women. They had been discussing the performance of a non-professional hypnotist who was personally known to the professor. At the delivery of the conversational bombshell noted above, the man-who-thinks started to speak, then hit it back, the writer-man lifted his eyebrows, and the professor inquired very mildly, "You have read something that convinced you?" The disbeliever snorted at that. "Well, hardly. Never had time to waste reading that sort of stuff. But I've seen enough about these exposed fakes in the newspapers to convince me it's all nonsense. Take it from me, it's all faking, mighty cleverly done, maybe, but faking just the same." "You are surely a hard and fast materialist, sir," admitted the professor, courteously—he is as noted for his courtesy as his learning—and turned the conversation into other channels. All of which I have related for this reason. The first speaker is a type. A type of ignorance that without having read or studied or investigated any of the phenomena connected with the psychic powers of man, feels qualified to announce boldly that he knows that all supposed manifestations of these powers are fakes, and all people interested in investigating them are fakers. If you bring up the subject of hypnotism or clairvoyance or spirit communication in a group of people you will notice that it is always the ignorant one who speaks up promptly and says he does not believe in anything of that sort. The men and women who are readers and thinkers and who have consequently read something on these subjects, though they may not be believers, do not feel qualified to express such sweeping unbelief. Twenty-five years ago if anyone had told you that a man claimed to be able to send a message from a ship fifty miles out at sea to the land, you would probably have said "He must have some accomplice on the land. It is a trick." To-day—well, you know what I would say, so why take the space to say it? Many manifestations of clairvoyance and hypnotism and telepathy are already being recognized and studied by sober, scientific men. Hypnotism is already an increasingly common medical agent. All the methods and forces of science are being employed to push farther into this unknown realm of man's psychic powers. Who knows but that the black art of yesterday will be the commonplace of to-morrow and telepathy and clairvoyance may seem no more wonderful twenty-five years from now than the wireless telegraph and the moving pictures of to-day? The next time you go to the library suppose instead of bringing home an armful of novels, you get one good scientific book on some of these subjects. If you do I think you will be repaid both in immediate interest and in subsequent breadth of view. I don't promise you will be convinced of anything. But I do think you will be ready to say: "This is a very wonderful world. There are many things in it that I do not fully understand."

Deadly Germs in the Pockets Viennese Scientist Would Prohibit Carrying Handkerchiefs

Vienna, March 29.—An eminent surgeon says the custom of carrying handkerchiefs in pockets should be prohibited by law, and pockets abolished, if necessary to enforce the rule. He would have handkerchiefs carried at the end of strings or flipped over belts, or held in the hand. He says: "A perfectly clean handkerchief will become immediately infected the moment it is put into the pocket. Now, whenever a man blows his nose he naturally draws in a deep breath immediately afterwards, the handkerchief still being held to his face. Consequently he inhales innumerable germs, more or less poisonous, which may bring about serious illness."

For white kid slippers which cannot be cleaned successfully after having been previously cleaned, buy a 10-cent tube of ivory black are paint. To one-half cupful of gasoline add enough paint to make fluid consistency of cream. Apply evenly with small brush, allow to dry thoroughly, and then polish with any good shoe paste. This does not harden leather and will not wash or rub off.

If the pipe leading to the kitchen sink becomes clogged, it will pay you to secure a short piece of rubber hose (one which will reach from the faucet to the pipe in the sink). Attach this to the kitchen faucet. Then press the other end against the perforated plate above the drain pipe, wrapping an old cloth around the tube so as to cover all the holes in the plate. When the water is turned on the full force of the water will go straight through the pipe and remove whatever has clogged it. This white oiled paper spread under the child's plate at the table and extending a little way beyond will protect the tablecloth. This will not be very noticeable especially if it is bought in sheets, and the pieces are cut and laid smoothly on the cloth. When a piece of paper is soiled it may be thrown away or burned, and a fresh piece substituted.

Household Notes.

To take the odor of fish or onions from cooking utensils, boil a little vinegar in them after washing them; then rinse thoroughly. Vinegar will take shoe blacking from clothing, and, if the hands become chapped or feel rough after having them in water, rinse them well and apply a little vinegar, letting it dry on.

"The proper way to wash and dry wooleens, flannels," etc., says a large manufacturer of woollen goods, is to wash them in lukewarm water and pure soap and to hang the garments on the line dripping wet without wringing out at all. If dried in this way the shrinkage will be so slight as to be almost unnoticeable. If you wish to cut a piece of glass and have no glass cutter, try this method. Take a file and mark the glass in the desired shape. Lay a piece of common wrapping twine, which has been soaked in coal oil, along this line. Then stand the glass up edgewise and set fire to the twine. The heat will break the glass where it is marked.

To wash chamolis gloves and keep them soft, first put the gloves on hands, using lukewarm water and pure soap. Wash in this lather until the gloves are thoroughly cleansed, then rinse in clear water of the same temperature, just before taking off the gloves cover them again with a lather.

#### American Tariff.

Special to Evening Telegram, WASHINGTON, To-Day.

There are two tariff measures which the Democratic House expects to pass in advance of the general legislation introduced. The Canadian Reciprocity measure follows identical lines with the McCall Bill passed last session, except a clause authorizing the President to continue negotiations for reciprocity on Canadian articles not covered by the pending agreement. The other measure is a Bill to put on the free list one hundred articles now dutiable under the general tariff. Both measures will receive early consideration. The Free List Bill is designed to placate farmers for agricultural losses, which they feel they will sustain under the Canadian agreement, but it contains also some food stuffs and boots and shoes. The Reciprocity Bill is expected on Friday and an effort will be made to pass it as early as possible. The articles designated by the Bill for the Free List would make a difference compared with the revenue from the present duties of less than a million and a half of dollars.

#### The Labrador Arrived at Channel

Messrs. Jas. Baird, Ltd. had a wire to-day saying that the s.s. Labrador had arrived at Channel at 8.30 this morning with 12,500 prime young hays and reporting all well. The ship will land those of her crew belonging to that section up there and will then come on to St. John's.

SYDNEY, N.S., April 12.  
Prospects for a shipbuilding plant here are bright. Dominion letters patent have just been granted to a company with a capital of \$10,000,000. The sites will be in Sydney harbor. The letters patent were issued to Sir Henry Pellatt, of Toronto; Sir Chas. Ellis, of Clyde Bank, Scotland; Sir Alex. Grace, Fairfield, and A. C. Ross, of Sydney. The company will carry on business under the name of the Canadian Shipbuilding and Dock Company. Tenders for the construction of the first home-built ships for the Canadian Navy will be opened on May 1st. If the new company get the contract, work on the plant will at once employ, when completed, ten thousand men.

NEW YORK, April 12.  
The London correspondent of the Tribune cables: "The storm which had been raised by the discovery that officials of the Treasury had advised several large companies to withhold payment of income tax until after the close of the financial year, shows signs of abating. There cannot be any question that the object of robbing the Sinking Fund was to provide funds to meet the heavy expenditure of the current year. It is now shown that as a result of the Treasury's action income tax receipts for the first week of April totalled £3,394,000, whereas for the corresponding week of last year the amount was only £179,000."

Fears are felt for the safety of an expedition, under the Deputy Commissioner of the Military Police, which set out to punish the tribesmen who murdered Noel Williams, a British official, with his party on the frontier of Assam. There has been no news from the party since it left. It is feared that the whole party were caught in an ambush and killed.

CORFU, April 12.  
The German Emperor is now residing here. He was informed to-day of the discovery, near the monastery of St. Theodore, of his relics of the sixth century before Christ by workmen engaged in the excavations. The Emperor spent the day watching the work, and became so interested that he remained on the scene of operations without lunching. Before he left he presented the workmen with considerable money.

It is stated that the Bishop of Portugal have been instructed by the Pope to accept the separation of Church and State. The Government has been notified of the acceptance of the new situation.


### Ships Discharging.

**The Adventure's Trip.**

The s.s. Adventure, Capt. Jacob Kean, which arrived here at 1.30 p.m. yesterday, has 26,000 seals on board. The catch consists of 23,000 young and old seals and 3,000 old and young hoods. The Adventure struck the seals first on the 16th March, a few miles to the E.N.E. of the Funks, and after steaming along struck the northern patch, and that evening and night secured about 5,000 seals. On the 17th 8,000 were accounted for, and on the 19th over 9,000 were killed, with the Florizel not so far away and getting her share in the patch. Sunday, the 19th, the ship "burnt down," and Monday, the 20th, 2,000 more were taken. Next day the ship struck the old fat. About 500 were slaughtered and then the ship steamed away north, killing 1,000 belemnites in a few days. About 1,500 old hoods were secured shortly afterwards, and after that the ship steamed down to Grois Islands and saw the Bella-venture, but did not speak to her. The Erik when last seen hailed for 12,000 seals and on Monday last was picking up some hoods. The Adventure bore up for home Tuesday morning and had a good run to port. All are well on board.

**Can't Search for Body.**

Owing to the inclement weather which has prevailed since Monday no search could be made for the body of the boy, Vincent Murphy, who was drowned off the South Battery, Sunday afternoon. Just before the accident occurred Mr. Samuel Ebsary, of the South Side, with a couple of friends, was out in his motor boat, and in coming in through the Narrows saw the boys down near the shore, and the remark was passed on board that if the lads were not careful an accident would occur. Shortly after passing the Battery they heard the cries of those on shore, put their boat about and came at full speed to ward the scene. On nearing the place they saw the lad's cap floating in the water and little farther away saw his head appear over the surface. Those on the boat tried to grasp the boy but it was going so quickly that they missed him, and when they turned to come towards the spot where he was seen he had disappeared for the last time. Mr. Ebsary and his friends were greatly overcome in witnessing the poor little chap's sad fate.

**An Old-Time Project.**

We have had sent to us a reprint of the Boston Sunday Herald of March 29th, 1863. It is a war number and its make-up and extent are much different from the fellow Sunday numbers of to-day. Moreover, in extent it no way rivals the 56 page papers of to-day, as its space is limited to four pages. There is in it a curious project for collecting European news from passing steamers at Cape Race, for these were of course the days before the laying of transatlantic cables. The extract runs as follows:—

"Another new scheme has just been broached in England, where somebody is apparently making a good thing out of English credulity. It is this: A certain individual has proposed to form a company, said company to build a large lightship, to be anchored off Cape Race, in the track of the European steamers. This lightship is to have a steamer for a tender and also a yacht. The object is to intercept the steamers as they come from Europe, obtain the latest markets and other commercial news for the benefit of speculators, and forward it by telegraph to private customers. The individual projecting this scheme has written a letter to Peter Cooper, Esq., President of the Newfoundland Telegraph, for permission to land a submarine telegraph cable at Cape Race for the purpose of lightship. Of course the permission will be granted—oh, yes! The request is coupled with an implied threat that if not allowed so to do, they will land it at St. Pierre, Martinique, and thence to Cape Breton. The main object, of course, of all this is to circumvent the Associated Press from furnishing the whole commercial public simultaneously, as it has been doing for years, with the latest market and other news from Europe. The whole thing is the creation of Fred Gisborne, and doubtless he will succeed—in replenishing his depleted pockets."

Peet has charge of the boat at night, and with him are Messrs. Curry, A. Murray, M. Murray and Wm. Lewis. The men on board belonging to St. John's were sent out some creature comforts by their friends ashore last night and were glad to get them. Tuesday night and yesterday morning the men suffering from small pox were landed, some at the King's wharf and others at Woods' dock in Hoytestown, and they were taken away to the Hospital in the fever ambulance. The three ladies who were on the ship were released from quarantine yesterday, having been vaccinated, and the men who are to go to the Dundee store on the South Side will be sent there today. The place has been fitted up well, stores being placed in it, while sails were put around to break drafts and they have ample furniture and bedding for their needs. In the present cold and stormy weather the men who are at work on the launch have a duty to perform which entails much hardship, especially at night.

**Received Bad Fall.**

While Mr. Winstborough, of the Royal Storks, was proceeding down Prescott Street at 2 p.m. yesterday he slipped on the snow and fell heavily to the ground hurting his back severely. He proceeded to work but later had to return home and get the attention of a doctor.

**Streets Running With Champagne.**

Special to Evening Telegram. PARIS, To-Day.

The French Government is disturbed over the riots in the champagne district of Marne. Instructions have been issued to commanders of troops in disturbed regions to preserve order and save property. Dameric is a scene of desolation. The streets are literally running with mud, and within a stone's throw of the red banner floating over the City Hall stand the ruins of six houses of wine merchants demolished by the mob. At Reuilly in the department of Marne, the commanding officer of the district has concentrated several thousand troops and not only in this town but at other threatened points in the vicinity with the object of preventing further destruction of wine property. The troops are preparing to meet the advancing manifestants.

**Died on the Ranger.**

The young man, Jacob Preston, who died on the Ranger, Sunday, April 9th, caught a chill by falling in the water a few days previous. The Ranger put a flag in the rigging when the S. S. Adventure came in sight. Dr. Cron who was on the latter ship went on board and on examining the body told the captain that the deceased died from the effects of a chill. The Adventure's Marconi man was asked to send the news home and the Boathie picked up the message and this is how the report spread that one of the Adventure's crew had died. The ship's carpenter made a coffin and the body will be brought in for interment at Pool's Island. Deceased was only 23 years of age and was of a delicate constitution.

**University Debate.**

In the debate between Sackville University and Dalhousie College which took place a short time ago, the Dalhousie trio were declared winners by one point. The award of the judges, however, was qualified by the statement that Sackville had produced the best arguments, while Dalhousie had won on oratory. The leader of the Sackville trio was Mr. N. Guy, a Newfoundland, and Divinity student of the N. F. Conference.

**Trade With Belgium.**

The s.s. Spica, which arrived here Tuesday night from Ghent, in coming in off this coast had particularly stormy weather, and Monday had snow with thick fog later in the evening. Tuesday morning she had a blizzard with a mountainous sea running. One of the plates, it is thought, became started and a deal of water entered No. 3 hold. The hull will be examined to find the cause of the leak when the ship is discharged. The ship is a fine one, built at Frederickstadt 5 years ago and will go from here to Nova Scotia to load either lumber or plaster for the Southern States. The captain says that owing to the construction of a large canal the Ghent is now open to western commerce and will take a deal of trade from Antwerp. The business people of Ghent look forward to a great increase of trade between their city and Canadian and U. S. ports.

**Harvest of Herring on the Pacific.**

A Seattle report says that fishermen off Whidby Island are reaping a harvest by enormous catches of herring, which they are taking by fish scooped to King and Winslow's fish dock at West Seattle. The catch has run as high as 300 tons a day. The fish are bought by Okamoto Bros., fish brokers, who are salting and packing the herring. They expect to salt away 1,000 tons this season for export to the Orient. The herring are left in salt for eight or ten days, when they are dried and packed in boxes holding 400 pounds each. It requires about 100 pounds fresh herring to produce 60 pounds of dried herring. The fish are taken off Whidby Island in beach seines, and the prevailing price received by the fishermen is \$5 a ton.

**Texas Sprinter Beaten**

New York, April 3.—Gwyn Henry, the Texas sprinter and holder of the national amateur record for 220 yards, was defeated in that event and in a 100 yards dash at the hands of James Rosenberger of the Irish-American A. C., at the Thirtieth Regiment Armoury in Brooklyn Saturday night.

In the 100 yards event Rosenberger finished 4 yards ahead of the Texan in 10 1/5 seconds. In the 220 yards event Rosenberger finished 3 yards ahead of Henry. The time was 22 4/5 seconds, equalling the indoor record.

**Dog's Chase of Rabbit Unearths Stolen Money.**

Tampa, Fla., April 6.—A dog chasing a rabbit in the woods in Hernando county had a large part in finding part of the \$10,000 recently stolen from a registered mail pouch between Tampa and Tarpon Springs on the night of March 23. Four thousand dollars was recovered to-day by Post Office Inspector Jones and Deputy-Sheriff Bell.

Bell heard that a boy named Cicero Horace, 15 years old, was spending large bills freely at Brooksville, and he had the boy arrested. Horace said that while hunting recently his dog chased a rabbit into a hollow pine log, that he thrust his hand into the opening and drew out not only the rabbit but a sack filled with bills. Just then a negro came up and made him give up half the money. Then the boy proceeded to bury most of his half and to spend the remainder.

He showed detectives where he had buried \$4,000, and they dug it up. Later the boy's mother said that it was his father who had hunted the rabbit and found the money and divided with a negro, a work train cook named Anderson. Anderson and the elder Horace are missing.

Mall Clerk J. J. Abbett, of the Tampa Northern railroad, was under suspicion. It happened that the found log where the money was found was near his house, so he was arrested as a suspect. He was brought here to-night and regained his liberty by furnishing \$5,000 bail.

**The Head of Oliver Cromwell.**

Exhibited at Public Meeting at London.

London, April 6.—The reputed head of Oliver Cromwell was exhibited last evening at a meeting of the Royal Archaeological Society at Burlington House. The Rev. H. R. Wilkinson said the head had been in his family for three generations and in that time had never been previously exhibited in public. The tradition was that the skull had been blown off in Westminster Hall and was picked up by a squire, who had it, and only confessed on his deathbed to his wife that he had it in his keeping. It passed into the possession of the Cambridgeshire family of Russell, and came to Sam Russell, a needy actor. Then it was sold to Cox, the proprietor of the museum in Spring Gardens, and was transferred by him to three persons, who exhibited it in Bond Street. Next it came into the hands of the Rev. Mr. Wilkinson's grandfather.

Sir Henry Howerth said that the evidence seemed to make it extremely probable that the head shown was really that of the protector.

Prof. Boyd Dawkins did not think he heard of a more complete chain of circumstance.

**Billion Disease Germs**

Lost, Strayed or Stolen at New York.

New York, April 6.—A squad of New York policemen are out to-day searching for a billion disease germs, lost, strayed or stolen during the last 24 hours from the Research Laboratory of the Willard Parker Hospital on East 106th street. The germs had been injected in the course of an experiment into the bodies of four goats, which were then tied up to browse in the backyard of the laboratory. An hour or two later the goats disappeared. The hospital authorities fear that they have become captives in the hands of neighboring east side families. The use of their milk for drinking or cooking will be certain to result in a serious epidemic.

One of the goats, according to the police statement, is loaded with smallpox germs, another is inoculated with diphtheria, a third, carries millions of the things that make scarlet fever, while the fourth is loaded with whooping cough.

London, April 5.—In the House of Commons this afternoon, Mr. Asquith said the question of combining the judicial functions of the House of Lords and the Privy Council into a court of appeal of the whole empire will be discussed at the Imperial Conference.




