Whe ne awoke in the morning he found hat he had contracted a crick in the back and an attack of hay fever, which nindered him in his work, for whenver he started out to explore some hing he would be interrupted by series of sneezes which sounded like the exhaust from a motor truck. He thereupon invented the Virginia che root and opened a chain of cigar stores in London, which gave him ar independent income and enabled him to discover the Irish potato on th shores of North Carolina. He later discovered the secret entrance to quiet dungeon in the Tower of London where he devoted his life to literature becoming quite a proficient speller Lord Raleigh did most of his discover ing around home, generally sending red-necked substitutes to the front while he stayed in London and mar ried several of the queen's maids of noncur. Queen Elizabeth finally got ired of having him hanging around the kitchen and sentenced him to be beheaded at sunrise with a dull axe despite the fact that Raleigh had ruined a new \$12 cravenette by spreading Raleigh was discovered several times at the urgent request of the divorcee and finally his alimony ate up his patrimony, so that at his death his estate consisted of a quill pen and a safety razor. The Medical Press

ND THE REMARKABLE EXPERI-MENTS WITH BOVRIL ON HUMAN




