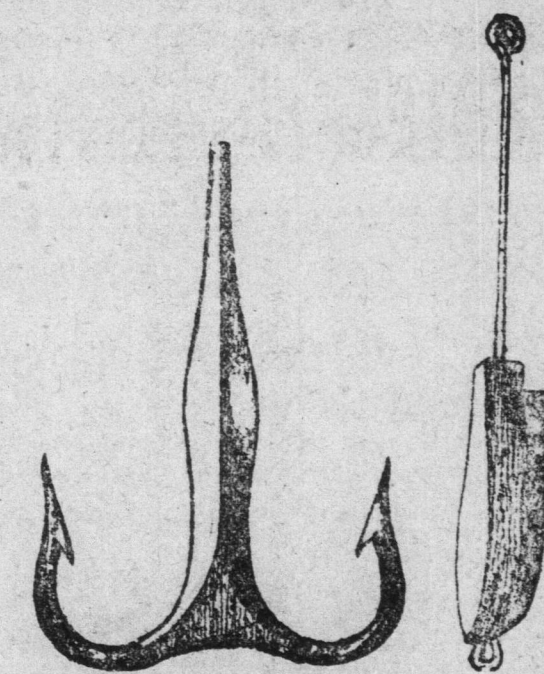

He, however, withdraws from such order the sum of \$4,026.00 now in the hands of the liquidator for subsequent disposition in the winding up of the Company. After the hearing of counsel for both parties, the Court adjourned, taking time to consider judgment.

HENRY GEORGE ADDY.

On Friday, 28th ult., there passed away at St. John, N.B., Henry Geo. Addy, son of the late Rev. John S. Addy, who was one of the pioneers of Methodism in Newfoundland. Mr. S. R. March, who has been in touch with the Addy family for some years, had a telegram from the late Doctor's son, George, who is also an M.D., informing him of the sad occurrence, "he deceased gentleman was born in Newfoundland and would be about 76. He has been practising in St. John, New Brunswick, for nearly 40 years. His father came to this country 10 years ago, and was the first Methodist missionary to visit Green Bay, going there in a schooner owned and commanded by the late Capt. Wm. Knight.—Com.

JAMES YATES.

The death occurred at his home, Gerald Street, Prince Edward Island, March the 17th, of James Yates, aged 78 years. Deceased was a native of Belfast, Ireland, but had been a resident of the island since 1870, going there from St. John's, Nfld. He was a veteran of the Crimean War, having taken part in the siege of Sebastopol as a private of the 62nd regiment, in which he enlisted when a lad of 17. During the siege, he distinguished himself by rescuing an officer, and should have won the Victoria Cross, but this honor passed to another. He received the Sebastopol and Turkish medals, an honorable discharge and a pension. After leaving the 62nd regiment he subsequently enlisted in the Royal Canadian Rifles. This regiment was at Malta in 1854. In the Crimea, in 1855 and Halifax in 1856. He had many interesting reminiscences of a private of the 62nd regiment, to the last. He leaves one son, Alexander, in P.E.I.

to justify himself, often loses his chance for justice.

A man was telling me the other day about a misunderstanding which occurred at his business office. Two young men, of whom he was one, were blamed for a mistake. The fault really lay with the other man. He, himself, was blameless, he said, and he is an exceptionally fair-minded man even about things which concern himself, I believed him. But the other man went to their employer and made explanations which threw the blame on my confidant. "And so, you see," he concluded his story, "I'm in bad."

"But wouldn't your employer believe your side of the case?" I asked. He threw back his head proudly. "I didn't give it to him," he said. "If he couldn't believe in me without my coming to him with explanations, he will have to disbelieve."

Now that is what I call a very unfair attitude. And yet is the point of view which proud people often take. They go through the world demanding that they shall be understood and appreciated without any effort on their

part. They regard such an effort as lowering themselves. They do not realize that this is a very busy world, and if people are going to be understood and appreciated, they've got to come half way.

To withhold an explanation as that man did is to deliberately lay one's self open to misunderstanding. If one of the two parties fails to appear in a court of law, after due warning, the case goes against him by default. The presumption is that he did not have any case, and that is the natural presumption against any man who fails to present his side of such a misunderstanding.

A thoroughly nice young girl was once caught in a combination of circumstances that looked decidedly bad. Had she been one of those people who think their friends ought to believe in their "wifion" explanation, she would have been badly misjudged. But she was more reasonable than that. She said, "I wouldn't blame my best friend for being suspicious of me under such circumstances. We never really know what anyone will do, and it certainly looks bad on the surface."

So, instead of waiting for people to talk, she went to one of her most gossip-loving friends and told her everything with the proof. The gossip, delighted to have inside information, spread the explanation abroad, and a scandal was averted.

Implicit and unquestioning trust is a rare quality, even among friends. Since we seldom give it, we have no right to expect to receive it.

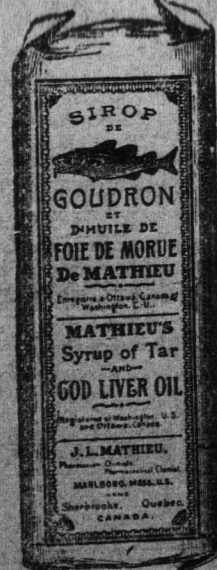

**A Standard Cull.**

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir—A standard cull for our fish must at the present time be considered of paramount importance to our fishermen; but the "Piccotters," otherwise known as the People's Party, have in this, as in many other instances, failed to take any practical steps towards remedying this serious grievance, or even to suggest a workable basis upon which the interests of both parties may be fairly considered. Such, however, in a country like ours ought to be the business of the Government and of especial concern to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries. He has made his last report, and when Mr. Piccott goes off the Colony within the next few months he will leave behind him a record as bare and as barren of results as one can well conceive possible for the head of that department to leave. The electorate are now thoroughly aroused to a knowledge of the duplicity and sincerity of the Morris Government, or the so-called People's Party. The shadowy deals in many departments of the public service have become so notoriously frequent and of such magnitude as to make all self-respecting men pray for the time to arrive when this mischievous and extravagant gang of bootlers may be hurled from office. The Morris Government went into power four years ago, not by any means on their policy of railway extension but through secret agreement with the so-called "Piccotts" to rob the trusting and confiding fisherman of his power through the Ballot Box—that high privilege secured for him by Sir Robert Bond when he had the Ballot Act made the law of this country. Enough men were found in Harbor Grace District to believe that Mr. Piccott "would reject with disdain the vulgar incense of official adulation," but many of the people of that district are now heartily ashamed of the representative they put forward. They are now convinced that the experiment of sending Piccott to Parliament has been a costly one to the Colony generally and Conception Bay in a very particular way. They find the Minister of Marine and Fisheries rotting for every undigested scheme Morris has proposed, which might tend to disturb the happy and halevoyn state of the fishermen of this country, with the disastrous results, as pointed out by Mr. Kent in the House of Assembly, that within five years more than 7,000 men have deserted the fisheries; many of whom have left their island home never to return. Conception Bay and Harbor Grace District are amongst the chief mourners. We ask the pertinent question has Mr. Piccott done anything toward keeping these young men at their chosen occupation? Has he taken any practical steps to secure for the fishermen a "Standard Cull" for his fish, under the direction of his department? What has he done to open new markets for as much as a yaffle of fish? Where are the Bait Depots? This was his business, to develop the fisheries, to standardize the cull to have enacted a measure securing the shipped man or boy or girl a guarantee of his or her wages after a summer's work on the Labrador, and thus encourage them to remain in their own land. He has had the time of his life at the expense of the country he has helped to saddle with an additional burden of eight or ten millions of public debt within four years; but we are not so sure that the fisherman and farmer, and the man who works for a living in Harbor Grace District, have any intention of further providing him with fine clothes, fine linen and a berth at the Crosbie, with Johnnie and Wattie for another four years.

**Scene in the House.**

**The Autocrat's Bluster Fails**

**The Premier grossly insults Mr. Clapp when the latter appeals for justice for his constituents in Saint Barbe's. Mr. Clapp knocks out the Premier by his smart retorts and covers Sir Edward Morris with confusion.**

When the House went into Committee on the Act to Amend the Game and Inland Fisheries Act, of 1910, yesterday, Mr. Clapp called attention to a petition which was of grave and vital importance to 1,500 people on the N. W. Coast. The petition had reference to the extension of the deer law from Pistolet Bay to the Straits of Belle Isle and John d'Bay. He read section 3 of the petition which he believed would impress the committee with its importance to these deserving fishermen. They depend chiefly on the deer for fresh meat but are not allowed to kill them after January 15th. The open season, it said, in summer is closed to them as they are engaged at the fisheries and they had only three months, ending in January, to get fresh meat, and conditions for them were aggravated as the deer go south in winter, and after hard and strenuous hunting many had

**Not a Pound of Venison**  
when the close season was upon them. St. Barbe was differently situated from Districts like Burgeo and LaPelle and Fortune Bay; they had open communication with St. John's while the N. W. Coast was closed for 8 out of the 12 months, practically shut off from all contact with the outside world. The deer began to go south about the month of October with the first snow fall and return in April. During these months, as the petition relates, the

past. Permission if granted, as requested, to kill the deer would not mean in the remotest manner the extermination of the deer. The Premier and members of the House, said Mr. Clapp, would not like to have their children brought up on salt meat all the year round, then why should these people, isolated 8 months, be deprived of fresh meat. When he saw a petition

**Affecting the Vitality of the Men, Women and Children**

of the place it was his duty to demand that a remedy be provided for this great grievance. He (Mr. Clapp) regarded the depriving of these people from following up the deer for six weeks after January 31st as a crime. Their avocation of fishing prevented them from following the deer before the 31st of January. An extension of the six weeks would afford the fishermen the opportunity they required. On many occasions he had spoken of the grievance but all to no purpose. It behoves the Government to show their earnestness as to their talk of blighting put consumption if they began in his district, and enable the people to get fresh meat when they required it and when Providence sent it to them.

Mr. Bennett here spoke at some length about the necessity for preserving our foxes which will soon become one of our greatest assets. Mr. Clapp moved an amendment to the Bill as follows:

"That it shall be lawful for the residents of St. Barbe to kill caribou during the close season, after the 31st of January, for 6 weeks where bona fide required for food for themselves and their families."

The Minister of Justice said that instead of bringing this amendment before the House he should put the matter before the Game Board to be dealt with or bring it in in the shape of a Bill. He said the same thought applied to Bonavista Bay, but the people knew that they could get a deer now when they could satisfy the authorities that they wanted it for sickness or other good and sufficient reason.

Mr. Clapp denied there was any similarity in conditions as between Bonavista and St. Barbe. He alluded to what had been in the hands of the Game Board for 12 months and he had urged the case on them and the absolute necessity for permitting the people to secure this meat (and also in this House) but without result. He was again attempting to have fair play meted out to these people, and if the petition was not put in a paper basket by the Board it was an outrage. Was the Colony to become a deer park or close preserve for a few outsiders who were better circumstanced than our own people? This is the time and place to show fair play to the fishermen of St. Barbe, and if the House threw out his amendment, he at least had done his duty by the men he represented and whose rights he would strive for under all circumstances no matter how adverse.

The Premier (Sir Edward Morris) held that the people could whenever they liked kill deer if they wanted them at any time and taxed Mr. Clapp with wishing to exterminate the deer and his amendment would impel people from all parts to go to St. Barbe and kill indiscriminately. He had to tell the people that they could get a deer when they wanted them when he was down there last year. They were ignorant of the law and he taxed Mr. Clapp with ignorance of the law as he was not aware that they could kill seals before the 10th of March. Quickly came the retort from Mr. Clapp that perhaps he had like others "forgot the law."

Then began a scene seldom witnessed in a Legislative Assembly. The Premier who exhibited much acrobatic in his remarks, completely lost his temper if he did not lose his head, and again charged Mr. Clapp with ignorance of the law and that he was not of much account, or words to that effect. Then said Mr. Clapp "you are a fine simile of me."

The Premier hotly replied and in the course of his observations said that Mr. Clapp never earned a cent, to which he retorted that what he earned he earned it honestly. Then the Premier said: "If I thought I was a facsimile of you I would bury myself alive."

Mr. Clapp hit this off neatly by rejoicing:—"Don't hurry, you will be buried and put out of sight for ever by the people next November."

Sir Edward then said he would be at the obsequies of the party as well as Mr. Clapp. The Premier then the latter asked him if he would take a bet on it and he was met with the retort, that the money he (Premier) had got to be earned. Mr. Clapp said that "everyone could tell what money he (Premier) earned." When the latter retorted that he (Mr. Clapp) had never earned a dollar in his life, and more he never would because he was not capable of earning it. "You are the missing link," said Sir Edward, "you are nearer the missing link," he continued, "than anyone else I know of." Mr. Clapp retorted and said, "You would make an excellent scarecrow for my back-garden."

Mr. Clapp now resumed his speech and said that he was sorry to see a man occupying the position of Premier losing his temper and hurling remarks across the floors of the House which would disgrace the precincts of a low dyke. He (Mr. Clapp) had answered him in his own language because it was not fair to the Opposition to have them should be attacked and black-garbed every time they spoke in the interests of their constituents. He reiterated what he had said before and showed how the people after being fined in many cases, so poor were they, had to borrow the money to pay it and the Premier's assertion that the deer would be exterminated if his (Mr. Clapp's) amendment carried would put the people of White Bay wanted the same thing. He was met with the Premier's abuse when he advocated the rights and defended the interests of his constituents, but his abuse was like water on a duck's back to him (Mr. Clapp), and he put his amendment before the House to show the people that they were not mere wind, brag or so much explosive gas. Were the Government to take the money to stave, it was absurd on the face of it to say that people from other places would flock to St. Barbe to kill deer as the place was the best of the district.

Mr. Morrison had said he believed in keeping the deer for the people, then let the Government show their honesty and purpose by putting through an amendment proposed by him (Mr. Clapp). The people knew what they wanted, and Rev. Mr. Richards, the missionary of the district who had written Bryan, declaring one of the greatest dangers in the forcible feeding as practised in prison is the absence of proper antiseptic instruments.

**Cable News.**

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day. The suffragettes are continuing their campaign of retaliation against the camping of Mrs. Pankhurst to a term imprisonment last night and succeeded in destroying another large country house by fire. As in most previous cases of kind, the residence which is situated in Charlewood, Buckinghamshire, was unoccupied, but being prepared for the reception of tenants. The loss is estimated at ten thousand. Cards bearing inscription "Votes for women" and other Suffragette mottoes were found on the grounds. There are no arrests. The police believe some recent criminal acts, attributed to suffragettes, principally attempts to destroy railway property, were the work of men engaged by the women. All railway stations and tunnels are being patrolled in order to prevent those miscreants from damaging them. Miss Scott Troy, Californian suffragette, forwarded to the City of State Bryan at Washington samples of instruments of torture used for the forcible feeding of suffragettes. An accompanying note explained that samples do not contain metallic tip which all women say are used in prison. Why was it that so many famous Englishmen first saw the light of day one hundred years ago, might be a very difficult matter to explain, but from the years 1800 to 1815 were really very memorable years in the existence of the British Nation, when Nelson and Wellington were fighting for the existence of the country against Napoleon and his ambitions, and no doubt the boys of that period were taught to think imperially, and there was good reason for the saying, that it was England that saved Europe at that crisis.

But to come nearer home, Thursday last, the third of April, was the one hundredth anniversary of the birth of Captain Azariah Munden, at Brigus, and we venture to say that not a harder or sterner character of the typical Newfoundlander could be found anywhere. As our old friend Captain Henry Thomey would say, "Captain Munden was my ideal, and it was my hope always to come next to him."

It is a great pity that no proper record was kept of the sealing catches in the old brig, but we can take Captain Thomey's word for it, that Captain Munden held the record among a galaxy of famous commanders in Conception Bay from 1830 to 1870.

He was fifty years a sailing master as his tombstone will testify. He often had a word about the brig 'Highlander,' no doubt the remembrance of his early manhood, as this was the first ship in which he took charge, but he is better remembered with the 'Four Brothers,' 'Three Sisters,' 'Atlas,' 'Alert,' and 'Atlanta.'

His ideas were progressive, and if he had his way Harbor Grace would have had the first Newfoundland steamer ever going to the seal fishery, but as the old firm of Puntun & Munn had been so successful with sailing ships, and had so much money invested in them, it was several years before they invested in steam, but when they did it was a compliment to Captain Munden, that they called her the 'Commodore.' In the 'Commodore' his success was greater than ever, and in 1872 he brought in the greatest record voyage to that date, numbering 31,314 seals, the weight of 655 tons, which for tonnage of vessel has never been surpassed and never likely to be.

The following year when Captain Munden went to Aberdeen to supervise the construction of a new steamer for Puntun & Munn, that was to beat every other ship, John Munn told him to christen her the 'Admiral.' The compliment was again being forced on him, but he would not have it, he said, he thought it was pride on his part, and his name for the new steamer was the 'Vanguard.'

The height of his command was in the old steamer 'Commodore,' and then age and infirmities came on him, and as his old sailors often said, "It was a pity he ever grew old." Many a racy story is told about him, and he carried out his part around Brigus, as did the fishing admirals in the days of old, who were called the Lords of the Harbor, although at times there were some rebellious subjects.

Perhaps no story related about him is more typical of his knowledge of the seals and that fishery, than the following:

It was the year 1871, he had forced the 'Commodore' up into White Bay, apart from all the fleet. When he found her jammed, and could get no farther, he sent Watchers of Watch out to look for the seals. They returned that night with the information that there was not a seal to be found in White Bay, and no use wasting time there. He told them that was not what he thought, or he would not have wasted so much time in forcing the 'Commodore' where she was. In the morning he told the Masters of Watch to go out again and not to return until they brought him green boughs from the shore. They were back again before evening not with spruce boughs, but each man had his tow of seals, and a load for the strainer was assured. That was the kind of skipper the men liked to serve under, who knew his own mind, and studied his business.

Many of us are proud of our hardy old Vikings who built up the country, but in speaking of them we hear too often of their faults, never thinking that Nelson, whom we all adore, had his failings.

The seal fishery is brought down to a science now, when steamers like the 'Stephano' can bring in 36,000 seals in seventeen days, but the romance of the sealers will always be bound up with the old brig, that for fifty years held sway in this country.

None of Queen Elizabeth's Admirals dared more than did our sealing captains in the days of old, and we should instill into the hearts of our youth the remembrance of our illustrious dead, and not let them think that all the great men were born in our country.

## Pockets.

## At the House.

YESTERDAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

Outside of the debate and excitement consequent upon the discussion of the amendment to the Game Board Act, the principal item of yesterday's proceedings was the Dental Bill promulgated in the Upper House and sent down for the concurrence of the Assembly.

Mr. Howley strenuously objected to the provisions of the Bill, which he held enabled any person to come in here and practice dentistry without examination. It was most unjust to our people to recognize this principle and he showed how stringent the laws of the provinces were and those of the States and England in protecting their own subjects in this matter. Mr. Downey, Mr. Kent and Mr. Bennett followed in opposition to the measure, and the Premier qualified his objection by saying that thousands around the country suffered from affections of the teeth but could get no help, and an indifferent dentist were better than none at all.

The Bill was then referred to the following Select Committee: The Premier, and Messrs. Howley, Kent, Bennett and Earle.

Mr. Kent's excellent speech on the Budget continued until 10 p.m., and we hope to be able to publish it in Tuesday's issue of the Telegram.

To-day the water is being pumped out of the ship and she will sail to-night or to-morrow with coal for Botwood at which place there is a shortage of coal just now.

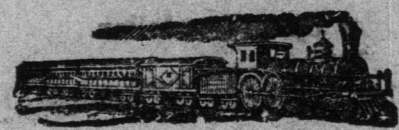

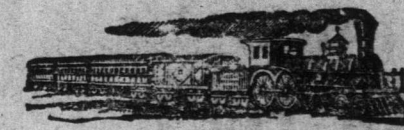

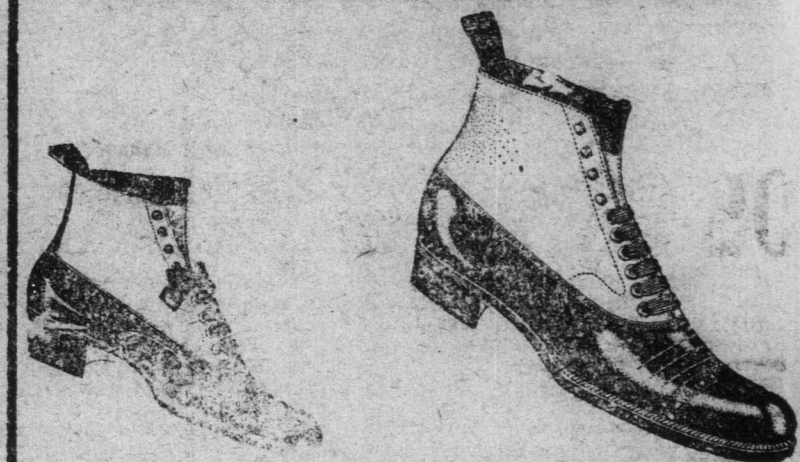
