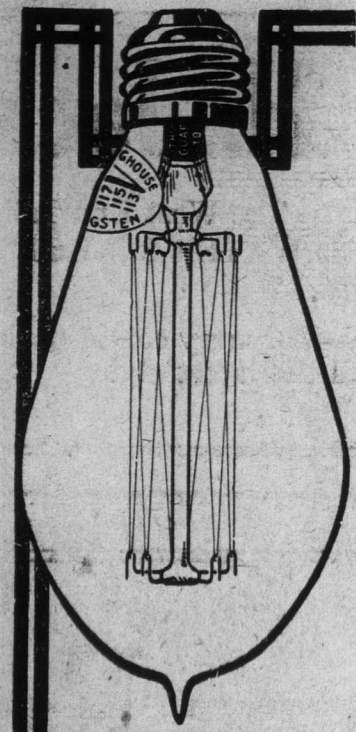

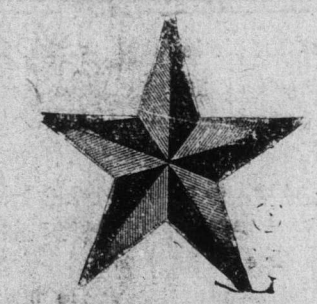

Yesterday's Functions for Duke of Connaught.

Garden Party and Dinner at Government House—Illuminations and Display of Fireworks.

Luncheon With Premier.

Sir Edward and Lady Morris yesterday entertained the Duke of Connaught at luncheon. His Royal Highness was accompanied by His Excellency the Governor, Capt. Watson, of H. M. S. Essex, and their suites. After luncheon the Royal party left for Government House grounds where he was due to inspect the Ambulance Corps.

INSPECTS AMBULANCE CORPS.

At 3.30 p.m. yesterday the three divisions of the St. John Ambulance Brigade, numbering about 80, assembled in Government House grounds where they were inspected by His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught who is Grand Prior of the Order.

Sir William Horwood, President of the local division, H. W. LeMessurier, Chairman, Dr. C. Macpherson, Secretary and District Surgeon, and J. Fenelon, Treasurer, were presented to the Duke by His Excellency the Governor.

His Royal Highness congratulated those present on the establishment of the local branch of the Order, and wished the members every success in their work.

Being the Grand Prior of the Order he was keenly interested in the work of the Brigade at every place he had visited, and hoped that it would flourish here. His Royal Highness then went on to show that the value of such an organization is not fully realized, until during such an emergency as the sealing disaster. Then it was a pleasing feature to note the number of trained nurses and ambulance men whose services were available. At the close of the address His Royal Highness presented Dr. Macpherson with a diploma as Knight of Grace in the Order, of which the following is a copy:—

"Whereas a chapter of the Grand Priory of the Order of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem in England, holden in London, the candidate whose name is hereinafter set forth, was nominated as duly qualified for reception in the said Order, and proof having been made of the qualifications of such candidate in accordance with the statutes and regulations of the Grand Priory, these presents now certify that at a chapter holden in London on the twenty-fifth day of November, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, the said nomination was confirmed and Chas. Macpherson, M. D. C. M., the candidate aforesaid, was duly received as a Knight of Grace in the said Order and is entitled to all the honours and privileges thereunto in any way appertaining. Given under the seal of the said Grand Priory the day and year aforesaid."

The diploma is signed Arthur, Grand Prior (the Duke of Connaught), Herbert Jekyll, Chancellor, and Herbert C. Perrott, Dr. Secretary-General.

At the top is the arms of the Order, the most ancient flag in Europe, a white cross on a red ground, with lions and unicorns, respectively, in the angles.

Beneath is the motto "Pro Fide—Pro utilitate Hominum." At the left side is a sprig of the plant St. John's wort, with a scroll bearing the words Jerusalem and England.

The seal of the Order is appended by a black and white cord the whole being contained in an enamel case.

Following the presentation Dr. Macpherson called for cheers for His Royal Highness, after which the party left.

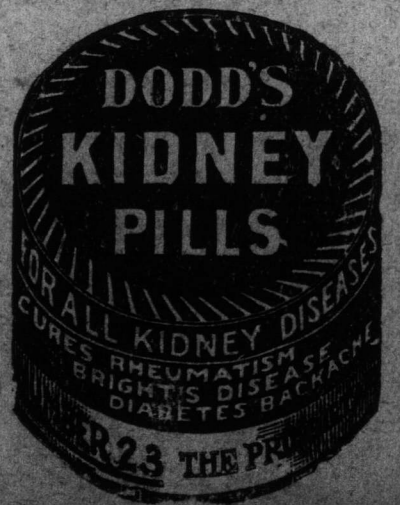

Yesterday's Functions for The Duke of Connaught.

(Continued from 4th page.)
IN HONOR OF GRAND MASTER.

At the Masonic Temple last night, the brethren held an enjoyable smoker in honour of the visit of their Grand Master. The affair was one of the most enjoyable of its kind ever held in the building.

As His Royal Highness passed along Duckworth Street to view the brethren assembled outside and cheered their Grand Master lustily, which the Duke graciously acknowledged. His Royal Highness later viewed the illuminations from Cathedral Street.

As the Essex steamed out the harbour the lights from the Masonic Temple flashed in farewell to the first Grand Master of the Masonic Order, who had entered a Lodge Room in Britain's Oldest Colony.

THE DEPARTURE.

At midnight the Duke went on board H. M. S. Essex which sailed a half an hour later for Quebec.

The Royal visitor had a most pleasant sojourn, though brief, amongst us and he takes with him the heartiest greetings and good wishes of the loyal people of Britain's Oldest Colony beyond the seas.

MESSAGE FROM HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS.

"The Governor desires to convey to all in Newfoundland a very cordial message of farewell from The Duke of Connaught. His Royal Highness was intensely delighted with his reception while among us. The Duke now realises what we mean by a hearty Newfoundland welcome. From first to last wherever His Royal Highness touched land—at Bay of Islands, Blanc Sablon, St. Anthony, Botwood, Grand Falls and St. John's—the reception accorded by the people of Newfoundland has rung genuine. The one real disappointment to His

Royal Highness in the whole trip was his not having been able to land at Bonavista and Trinity. He well knows how keen and loyal and unanimous were the preparations to offer a hearty welcome and let him hear the full-throated cheer of the northern fishermen. But it is the first duty of Officers of the Royal Navy not to imperil the safety of His Majesty's Ships; and it was a wise decision not to risk the cruiser in view of the dense fog last Monday and the number of icebergs adrift in the Bays. The Duke, however, expressed the hope that, as he was unable himself to go ashore at Bonavista and Trinity, the Governor should endeavour to arrange for a special call at these two ports when next an Admiral should visit the coast of Newfoundland with His Majesty's Warships. And we hope that such a call may possibly be made shortly.

"The visit of the Duke of Connaught to our shores was an unequalled success. And the chief reason why we should all be proud of our success in maintaining the old traditions of loyalty and hospitality is that we all worked together. The Governor keenly felt the truth of his words when, at the laying of the foundation stone of the Reid Tuberculosis Sanatorium, he said that for the public good and for the credit of the Old Colony we all work together like a band of brothers.

"It is impossible personally to thank all those who in their several capacities joined in making this Royal visit a memorable occasion. But the Governor gladly seizes this, the earliest occasion of rendering his thanks to all as well as conveying the gracious words of farewell from the Duke. It is through the willing help of the Press that this message of cordial thanks may be most widely carried to the homes of the people."

RICHMOND, N.Y., To-day.
Americans and friends of Ireland from all parts of the States and Canada attended a meeting of Financial Directors here, at which \$100,000 was subscribed for the Irish Volunteer Fund, for use in the movement led by Redmond of the Irish Parliamentary party.

LONDON, To-day.
The main body of the Dominions' Royal Commission will sail for Canada to-day by the Albatross. They will land at Rimouski, from whence they will be conveyed to St. John's Newfoundland by the steamer Earl Grey. The chairman, Lord D. Abernethy, is unable to sail on account of illness, but he hopes to proceed in three weeks. In the meantime Sir Alfred Bateman will preside at the sittings in Newfoundland and the Maritime Provinces.

WASHINGTON, To-day.
Carbajal, successor of Huerta as Provisional President of Mexico, yesterday advised the States Government informally that he intended to retire in favor of General Carranza. Carbajal wishes only that a general amnesty be proclaimed. A message from the States Department instructed him to urge upon Carranza, the belief of the States that further fighting was useless on account of Carbajal Government intending to surrender its power. Carranza is urged also to give a guarantee for the protection of lives and property of those who had supported Huerta. Mr. Shillman counselled likewise against the execution of prisoners or any other atrocities, which spite and revenge might arouse in the conquering army. The States makes its position clear with respect to recognition under the terms of a protocol signed at Niagara Falls. Recognition will be extended to the Government resulting from an agreement between the two Mexican factions.

Our Royal Guest.

The Duke of Connaught has departed from Newfoundland and left behind him a pleasant memory of his visit. Gentle in bearing, unaffected in accent, plain of speech, he carries himself as a good old English gentleman of royal stock. Newfoundland honoured his coming as a son of Victoria, a brother of Edward, the uncle of the King, a Field Marshal of the Army and the Governor General of Canada. She honours him the more after having seen him, shared his smile, noticed his tact, and seen how simple and unaffected a scion of the Royal House can be.

Newfoundland has had many such visits. The visit of King Edward as Prince of Wales is within the memory of many. The visit of King George when Duke of Cornwall is within the memory of many more. These visits with that of the Duke of Connaught all tend to strengthen the affection of the people for the Royal family, and this is as it should be, for loyalty to the King is the chief link which binds the widely scattered Dominions and Dependencies of the Empire together. As our memory of the royal visit is pleasant, so may be the recollections of His Royal Highness. The weather proved favourable and citizens did their best to live up to the occasion and succeeded.

Sagona Back.

The s.s. Sagona, Capt. Kennedy, arrived from the northward at 11 p.m. yesterday. The ship was as far north as Cook's Harbor and reports very little improvement in the fishery along the coast. On Monday last, traps operating from Goose Cove to Cook's Harbor secured fine hauls, one of them taking 60 quintals and the others averaging from 10 to 20 qts. On Tuesday the traps in the same section were hauled for only 25 fish. The Sagona brought a small freight and these passengers: Melin Noah, D. Noah and 2 in steerage.

POLICE COURT.—Only one prisoner appeared in Court to-day, a drunk and disorderly who was released. Yesterday there was only one prisoner also. This speaks well despite the celebrations that took place.

Dies in Attempt to Rescue Child.

Montreal, Que., July 13.—Exceptionally tragic were the deaths of Mrs. Wm. Demers, 1618, St. Dominique street, Montreal, and her two-year-old daughter yesterday. The child's death occurred first. She stuck a lighted feather in an oil can there was an explosion and the little girl was dead in a short time. The mother was an invalid, having been operated upon recently. In attempting to save her child she over exerted herself, the wound was re-opened, and she died three hours afterwards in the hospital.

Halt by Wives Make Homes Happy.

Geneva, July 11.—Health certificates for brides is the demand of the Swiss Society of Public Utility for Women, an influential organization having branches in the chief cities of Switzerland. The aim of the society is to obtain healthy wives and children in order to better the race and also make for the happiness of the home. It has hopes that later the Government will take a hand in the agitation and require a certificate of health from both the bride and the bridegroom before sanctioning a marriage. The society, which is working very quietly, is strongly supported by the medical profession and the university profession.

Stephano Beat Digby to Halifax.

When the Red Cross liner Stephano arrived at Halifax from St. John's, Nfld., at five o'clock yesterday morning, her officers were much elated over the fact that they had knocked three and one-half hours from the time of the Furness liner Digby, with which they had raced from port to port. The Digby left St. John's at 1.30 p.m. Saturday, and the Stephano sailed at 3.15 p.m., arriving at Halifax at 5 a.m. Monday morning, the Digby arriving two hours later. The Stephano passed her rival at 9 a.m. Sunday, and the two ships kept within sight of each other the rest of the voyage.

Considerable betting was done on both ships, the second engineer winning the pool among the officers of the Stephano.

The Stephano had 85 saloon passengers, 35 of whom embarked at Halifax. The Florizel which arrived in at noon from New York had 105 passengers, 13 of whom were for Halifax, and 80 of whom were round trippers to St. John's.

Next week the Stephano is booked to bring up Lieutenant Porte and party with the airship that is to attempt the transatlantic flight.—Chronicle, July 14.

Rhodes No Dude.

Cecil Rhodes was not much of a dresser. When Premier of Cape Colony, he usually wore a flannel suit which badly wanted cleaning and a dilapidated slouch hat. His successor in office, Sir Gordon Sprigg, who wore a black frock coat even in the hottest weather, once made an effort to enforce the wearing of "respectable" dark clothes in the Cape Parliament. But Rhodes would not have it. He said in Parliament that if he could not help to legislate in comfortable clothes, he would not help at all, and he thought that members would agree with him. They did.

Pepper Colors Canaries

Till recently the dinner-table was the only place pepper was to be found in use. But it has been discovered that there is nothing to compare with it for giving a brilliant color to canaries.

It has almost a magical effect in making a canary golden as a buttercup or saffron as a crocus. The pepper should be given when the bird is moulting.

The exhibitor who first discovered accidentally the wonderful effect of pepper on the color of canaries' feathers reaped in first prizes by the score, and there was a good deal of suspicion that his results were due to skilful dyeing, till he made his secret public.

Now, practically every owner of show birds knows the magical virtues of the pepper pot.

Mother is Drowned Trying to Save Boy.

Montreal, July 13.—Mrs. William J. Laverly, 430 Mance Street, Montreal, was drowned at Balmoral yesterday while trying to save her 11 year old son from drowning. The boy had been using water wings in the water, but the wings got out of place and he was in imminent danger of his life. He was saved by Dr. and Mrs. Meighen of Montreal. His mother's body was recovered and brought to this city last night.

Ulster War Hysteria.

As Shown by Leading Financial Journal.

New York, April 2.—A cable from London to the Journal of Commerce says:—

The London Economist, in support of its contention that the "civil war" talk is largely hysteria, prints a table of price of leading Ulster securities showing present prices as compared with February 14. The list comprises municipal, bank, railway and industrial securities, all but one of which shows advances ranging from 1/4 in Great Northern Railway debentures to 4 points in Belfast and County Down Railway ordinary.

The one exception to the general advance is Yorkshire flax securities, the ordinary and preferred of which are unchanged, while the debentures are one per cent. low.

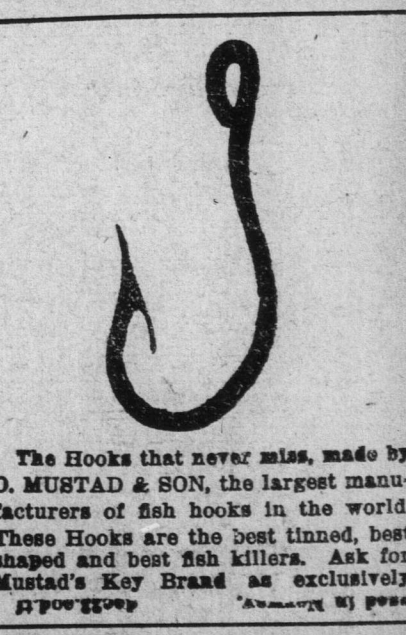

Costa Rica.

Author of "Al Good Old S'wash." Costa Rica is a free and unharnessed republic which used to get a little publicity in the foreign news until Mexico came along and hogged the whole show.

The name "Costa Rica" signifies "Rich Coast." It was named by the Spaniards, who conquered the country in 1530 and then hunted for gold patiently for 150 years with so little success that the name became a Caribbean joke. However, the Banana shippers came along about thirty years ago and have made more money since that time than the Spaniards made out of the land in three centuries. If the Spaniards had used more hoes and less picks in their labors in the new world, Spain might to-day be congested with millionaires.

Costa Rica is a small country, about as large as Vermont and New Hampshire and even more bumpy in surface. It is equipped with three climates torrid, temperate, and cold. On the seacoast, rain falls by feet instead of inches and anything more than a coat of tan is uncomfortable. Half way up the mountains people brag like Michiganers about sleeping under blankets at night, while on the summits of the 11,000 foot mountains the chibitans and frosted ears are not uncommon. Much of Costa Rica's soil has been blown out of its volcanoes and in this soil, fine coffee and some very irascible and feverish patriots are raised.

The chief business of Costa Rica is to furnish bananas for the United States and Europe. Its next most strenuous occupation is getting extensions of its public debt. Costa Rica has borrowed most successfully from England and has refrained from paying interest on its debts with almost equal success.

Costa Rica holds the world's championship for seceding. South Carolina not excepted. In 1821 it seceded from Spain after a hard fight. Two years later it seceded from Mexico and in 1848 it took its doll things and went away from the United States of Central America. Later on it retired from the Greater Republic of Central America. However, Costa Rica has always governed itself with great success having had no revolutions worth mentioning. It has about 400,000 people and a gunboat large enough to furnish sleeping accommodations for its admiral.

The capital of Costa Rica is San Jose, which can be reached by railroad if the traveler is in no hurry or by mule track if he is pressed for time.

Grand Falls Welcomes H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught.

Saturday, July 11th, was observed as a general holiday in Grand Falls in honor of the visit of H.R.H. the Duke of Connaught.

The beautiful weather that had prevailed for ten days previously still continued, and no more ideal day could be imagined.

The great influx of visitors, put accommodation at a premium, and added quite perceptibly to the resident population, and all alike turned out in the true "old-fashioned" holiday spirit to do honor to the royal visit expected in the afternoon.

On all sides could be seen great displays of bunting; scarcely a house but boasted flags of all kinds, and the constantly passing groups, plentifully sprinkled with bright hued costumes of the ladies, flags gaily streaming and flapping in the breeze, all against a background of blue sky and fresh green trees, formed a scene that would not soon be forgotten, and certainly was a becoming signification of the loyalty and welcome that awaited the Duke.

The L.O.A. held in the forenoon a monster parade, the ranks of which were considerably swelled by brethren from the surrounding villages. The Salvation Army band was in attendance and entertained their progress with very appropriate selections, adding not a little to the effect and success of the affair.

A very interesting cricket match was played at 10 a.m., at which a large number of spectators were present. In the early afternoon there was a baseball match between married and single, which drew a much larger crowd and was thoroughly enjoyed. Both players and spectators carried on lively bits of chaff, and often "gems of repartee" delighted the "non-combatants," all given and taken in the utmost good humor and increasing immensely the success of the evening.

At four o'clock, standard time, the big mill whistle announced the approach of the royal train, and the entire population repaired to the Paper Storage Building, in front of which a platform had been erected. Here in a square enclosure, which was magnificently bedecked with the standards of all nations, in the centre practically of Grand Falls, with the Mills to the west and the town to the east, the young and the old awaited the arrival. Heartiest cheering greeted the appearance of the train around the curve, and when His Royal Highness appeared on the platform the solemn and beautiful strains of the National Anthem accompanied by the G. F. band arose from the assembled throng. H.R.H. the Duke, then thanked the people for their enthusiastic welcome, and for the splendid decorations, and proceeded by train to the Grand Falls House, Lord Northcliffe's residence, where a reception was held, at which about one hundred and twenty people were present.

At a dinner later on in the evening there were H.R.H. the Duke, H. E. the Governor and Lady Davidson, the Lord Bishop of Newfoundland, Hon. E. T. McGrath, Mr. and Mrs. Jones and Dr. and Mrs. Chamberlain.

On the athletic grounds a football match was arranged between Botwood and Grand Falls, which drew a record crowd. The visiting team acquitted themselves very creditably, but went down to defeat after a very interesting game.

When darkness began to descend, the electrical decorations were lighted. At the entrance to the G. F. House an arch had been erected and very tastefully decorated with many colored lights; it was very effective in its pretty surroundings.

On one of the piers in the river could be seen a huge display of colored electric lamps, representing two ensigns crossed, surmounting the word "Welcome" erected in red and yellow lights alternately. This was a most delightful sight. Every detail was thrown back from the surface of the river as from a mirror, and the various lights on the Boom and piers still further enhanced the brilliant spectacle, making it one of fascinating beauty. Then, nearly half a mile away, and about two hundred feet from the ground, hung on the Acid Tower a large "A" fifty feet long surmounted by a coronet formed of red and yellow lights.

The brilliance of the design made the surrounding darkness seem deeper and completely obscured the supports, so that the scheme of decoration looked as if it were suspended from the skies. H.R.H. was particularly pleased with this thing, and remarked that it was the first time he had seen the combination of his initial and the coronet displayed to such great effect.

Sunday morning, the Royal guest and party attended Divine Service in the Church of England here, at which the sermon was delivered by His Lordship Bishop Jones.

At five o'clock the train departed for Botwood, and brought to an end what was, according to his own statement, one of the most interesting episodes of H.R.H.'s present tour.

His admiration was excited by the ideal site of the mills and the town, the healthy and beautiful environment, the practical and well designed town with its comfortable dwellings, and every modern accessory to comfort and happiness. He commented on the happy appearance of the community and the general air of prosperity everywhere so apparent, and the wholesome enthusiasm that imbued their life.

There is no doubt that his visit to Grand Falls was to him a revelation of what can be accomplished in a few short years in what was formerly a wilderness; the excellence of the organized plan on which things are worked, and the great progress that had been made in such a short space of time was a source of astonishment which he graciously returned as a compliment.

He was particularly impressed with the evident sincerity of the welcome accorded, and the manifestations of delight and loyalty on the part of all, and we hope will bring with him pleasant memories of his short visit to Grand Falls, the pioneer town of the interior.—O.P.

Special to Evening Telegram

PUERTO, Mexico, To-day.

Senora Huerta, with two sons and their wives and two unmarried daughters, and Senora Blanquet, the wife of the War Minister and other distinguished refugees, arrived here by special train this morning. The women of the party boarded the British cruiser Bristol, shortly before noon, and should there be at least evidence of disturbance, something which now seems remote, the men of the party will be quartered, either on the British cruiser Bristol, or the German cruiser Dresden. The railway yard was filled with soldiers when the train arrived. Preceding the special was a military train with troops and another military train guarded the special from the rear. Along side the track the Mexican ship Zeragoza, has taken a position in the river. A short distance out, the cruiser Bristol, which had arrived a few hours previous, was moored; beyond the Bristol the German cruiser Dresden, which came into the river to be present, just before the arrival of the train. It is announced here unofficially, that another British warship is on her way here from Vera Cruz and it is reported both the British and German vessels will play parts in the removal from Mexico of the Huerta and Blanquet families. The arrival of the ex-President and ex-War Minister is looked for to-morrow morning. It is expected they will ask the Dresden and Bristol to carry refugees to some neutral port where they can transfer to regular steamers for Europe.

MONTERREY, Mexico, To-day.

Fighting by the Constitutionalists is over in Mexico, if the plans announced here to-day by Carranza go into effect. General Carranza declared his main object now would be to conduct negotiations for the Constitutionalists to enter Mexico City and establish their Government without further bloodshed or damage to property.

LONDON, To-day.

In a twenty-round heavyweight fight between Carpentier (France), and Gunboat Smith (America), Carpentier won in the sixth round on a foul.

Germany Urged to Erect Granarie

Berlin, July 8.—An article appearing in the Prussian Year Book from the pen of Professor Carl Ballo, states that in the event of war under present conditions the German population in the west part of the country would be face to face with famine and starvation in a short time, as the ordinary necessities of life would reach impossible prices.

In the first year of the war the consumption of meat and milk would be reduced 80 per cent. Professor Ballo advises the Germans to erect large granaries in the industrial centres and keep a year's supplies there in times of peace.

Canada May Be Total Loss.

Montreal, July 13.—On a jagged reef that juts out into the St. Lawrence River four miles below Cape Chatte (75 miles east of Father Point) the coasting steamer Canada, owned by the Gaspe and Bay Chaleur Shipping Co. of Montreal, is resting today. She ran ashore there at four o'clock yesterday morning in a dense fog that enveloped the river. She is in a bad position, and there is a prospect that she will prove a total loss. All of her passengers, which numbered one hundred, have been landed at Cape Chatte where they will remain until Wednesday afternoon, when they will be taken off by the Gaspesian, sister ship to the Canada. The Gaspesian will leave Campbellton, this afternoon, and ought to be at Cape Chatte, if all goes well, late Wednesday afternoon.

The Canada was valued at \$50,000, and is insured for two-thirds of her estimated worth. She ran formerly between Sydney and St. Pierre, Mi-quelon. She is a steel steamer built in 1893. In addition to her first and second class passengers she did a large freight trade. The larger part of this consisted of fish.

Von Reuter, who was transferred from Zaborn, Alsace, after the recent conflict between soldiers and civilians there.

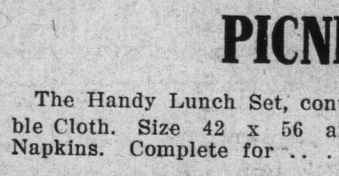

NEWS BY CABLE.

Special to the Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, July 16. President Wilson is suffering from an attack of indigestion, and has been compelled to cancel all engagements.

MONTREAL, July 16. The statement of Claim by the Canadian Pacific Railway in its \$2,000,000 action against the former owners of the s.s. Storstad, has been filed.

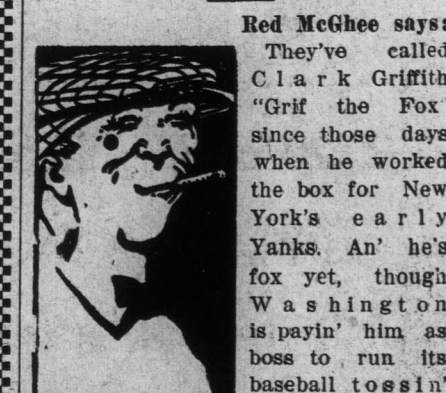
PARIS, July 16. How two military aeroplanes destroyed with bombs the mountain stronghold of the Riata tribesmen in the Taza region of Morocco, is described in despatches received here. The attacking parties carried four bombs. They discovered the hiding place, and dropped the bombs with such precision that the camp was destroyed, and many of the tribesmen were killed. The aviators made maps showing the position of the enemy, which enabled General Gouraud to round up those natives who had escaped death by the bombs.

NEW YORK, July 16. The passenger and freight service between New York and San Francisco through the Panama Canal, will be established early in 1915 by the International Mercantile Marine Co. The steamers Finland and Kronland, of 22,000 tons, American built, and flying the American flag, now of the Red Star Line, will be put on the new Panama Pacific line, sailing once in three weeks. It is contemplated that the journey will be made in 16 days, with a call at Los Angeles or San Diego.

MEXICO CITY, July 16. The change of Government whereby General Huerta has turned over the Provisional Presidency to Francisco Carranza, was calmly received by the populace. Beside the demonstration made in honor of Carranza, when he was leaving the Chamber of Deputies, after taking the oath, no other outbursts of importance occurred. There were a few shouts in the streets of "Down with Huerta," but the police promptly stopped all such demonstrations. Huerta, who remained in the capital for some hours after his resignation, is in flight and probably on his way to Puerto Mexico to join his family and friends who left for that port yesterday.

WASHINGTON, July 16. The United States Government today instructed the American Consul at Santiago, to inform Carranza that if he arrived at a peaceful agreement with the Carranza Government for the transfer of power at Mexico City, recognition would be extended to the resultant administration. Should Carranza refuse a complete settlement of the internal conflict by diplomatic means, and insist on a forcible entry into Mexico City recognition would be deferred until there is a legal election. American forces, according to present plans, will not be withdrawn from Vera Cruz, until the Government is recognized. This determination has been reached by Wilson and Bryan, after the view point of the South American mediators had been laid before them.

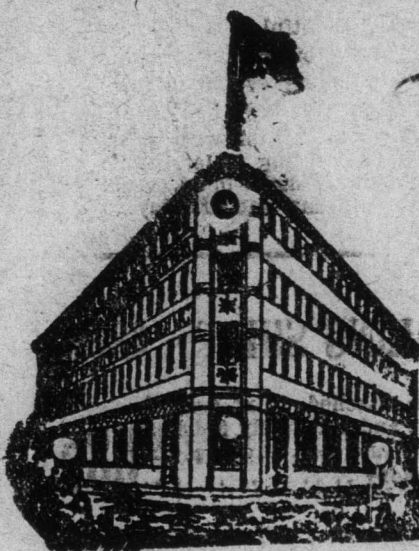

Fishermen should use these Jiggers and jig them with swivels same style as in Norway, then the Jigger acts like a minnow and when spinning attracts the fish, so that instead of jigging they really snap the Jigger and in this manner you never fail to catch them. Ordinary leads can be used, but the Norwegian style seems more simple and easily made. Our fishermen should try this great Norwegian fish killer.
