





The international situation of Bulgaria which is reported serious, may have some effect on the campaign. A military conspiracy against King Ferdinand, Athens despatches say, has been unearthed, and the leaders have been shot. Many inhabitants of Bulgaria are said to be still loyal to Russia, and are showing disinclination to join the colors.

Roumanians, too, are displaying some uneasiness as to the inactivity of their Government. An agitation in favor of the Allies is being carried on, according to unofficial reports, by influential leaders. The Allies, however, are depending on their own resources and arranging to throw into the Balkans as many men as can be spared. At present they cannot weaken other fronts, as the Germans are showing considerable activity. The latter made still another counter attack in the attempt to recapture La Courtine, in Champagne, which the French recently took from them. Strong German patrols heralding an attack were also observed in Loos region, but were dispersed. The Germans continue their attacks against the Russians in Riga and Dvinsk district and claim to have penetrated the vasion of the northern portions of Russian positions near the railway line north of Dvinsk. In this, salt is somewhat of an exception, for most substances dissolve much more easily Jesus. when water is hot. Heat is nothing more nor less than an increase in the speed with which the molecules are

As dissolving, a piece of sugar means that the sugar enters into the tiny spaces between the molecules of the water, the more quickly they-are moving, the easier it is for the sugar to get in. For, it must be remember level, and after that put in two, three



Make cucumber pickles by first preparing a brine that will float an egg. Into this brine put the cucumbers as you gather them each day, place over them a china plate, and on top of the plate a stone sufficiently heavy to keep the cucumbers under the brine. As the water from the cucumbers will weaken the brine, add salt each time so that there is always a little undissolved all the time. Care should be taken not to break the skin of the cucumber, as this will cause them to soften. When they are thoroughly pickled and you want to use them, take out enough for several servings, soak them in water, boil them tender and put them into vinegar and they are ready to eat.

Coupons to Curb Swede Thirst.

Stockholm, Sept. 29.-Although the government has attempted nothing so drastic as Russia's total prohibition of alcoholic liquors, since the beginning of the war Sweden has also been grappling with the drink problem, with a system of her own devising and with results which have become noticeable.

The essential feature of this system is the "Bratt Book," named for Dr. Ivan Bratt, the inventor and also the administrator of the plan. Starting in Stockholm, it has been extended to thirty-one of Sweden's 100 administrative departments, and on Jan. 1, 1916, will go into effect throughout

the country. Dr. Bratt's plan is to interfere as little as possible with the moderate drinker, and at the same time make it impossible for him to become a drunkard. He is assailed with equal vehemence on both sides, by those who believe him too mild and those who believe him too strict, but his bitterest critics admit that his plan

Any respectable citizen of Stockholm may, on application, obtain a book built on the same general lines as a railway mileage book, the measure, however, being liquid instead of lineal. No known drunkard has a chance of obtaining one. The possessor is entitled to use this book and purchase one litre of stimulant every

When the thirsty citizen presents his book and calls for a drink the dealer tears out a coupon and at the same time stamps the date on the next coupon below. No man has a chance to buy his litre without showing his book, nor then if the date in it is less than five days old. 





The Good Genius of the Sick Room.

in the sick room. When children are convalescent but still confined to one room, it is highly necessary, if the much-dreaded chill is to be avoided, to keep its temperature at a steady level. This is impossible where coal is the fuel, but a gas fire can be so easily and accurately regulated that the required degree of warmth can be obtained without difficulty.

FINISHING SCHOOLS.

When a girl is too refined or too exclusive or too stupid to be sent to a public school any longer, her fond parents send her to a finishing school. These schools are so named because

and tear of his atmosphere. Private schools are very strict in discipline, and it really seems a pity that so many efficient guards are wasted on nice young ladies all over our land while desperate criminals are leaking from their prisons on every hand. In the best private schools parents are only allowed to see their daughters once a year, and then only if their influence is deemed desirable by the head jailer.

The life of a girl in a private school is very arduous. She must rise at seven and manicure for an hour, after which she must go to chapel and thence to breakfast, where her father is fined for everything she drops. After breakfast she must study dancing, drawing, sitting down in a fluent and graceful manner, the names of the apostles, dramatic criticism, French for both hands and face, piano playing, shoulder shrugging, small talking, eyebrow elevating, gown wearing, father taming, housework, dodging, and many other useful sciences. She is also allowed half an hour a day in which to think, though in the best schools this is considered ill-bred.

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
