



### The Responsibilities of Peace.

That "Peace hath her victories no less renowned than war" is accepted as a truism. And it is equally true that Peace has her responsibilities as well. Newfoundland accepted and fulfilled her responsibilities to the Empire during the war, and now that the struggle is over she is burdened with the responsibilities of Peace, the fulfilment of which are of as much importance as those of war. A whole shipload of some of the responsibilities of peace is due to arrive in this port within a few days, and we are of opinion that these are the quality of responsibilities that we are delighted to welcome, and to accept in placing, in such a way that the future shall not accuse us of neglect or say that we missed any opportunity of showing our gratitude for the men who fought and the men who worked. By the men who worked, we mean the Foresters, those of our forces who, incapacitated from the profession of arms, by some physical or constitutional defect, took up the axe and saw and supplied building material for bridges, hutments,, and the thousand and one demands for squared timber and sawn lumber made on them by the War Office and other Government departments. Our obligations to them are not to be minimized. The worls, which they performed has been assessed at its true value and when the whole story is written the Forestry Battalion from Newfoundland will have its place in the records. The officers and men are returning home with a feeling of duty well done Their work though not so spectacular been of no small importance in aiding the decision of victory, and their performance has been of such a nature that it has brought forth the encomiums of those in authority, who have repeatedly stated that there Corporation Co., is at present in the were no men more adaptable to any labour calling for the use of tools than the boys from Newfoundland. over the world on its merits. The success from a point of view of modern surgery and medicine depended on the staff selected.

He outlined his experiences with many small hospitals, their difficulties, dangers and possibilities. The great trouble with St. John's hospital was its resemblance to the Pool of Siloam, as far as Green Bay was concerned. While others stepped into the pool before him, he was left to suffer and die on the bank.

If the patients in that hospital paid for their treatment only as large a percentage as they do at St. Anthony, the money would give an annual upkeep to the Green Bay hospital without expense to the colony. But he quite agreed the bays had an absolute right to that part of their own taxes that was alienated for a hospital in the south.



The English report invariably fin-

dinary extent of words of one syllable. It has little of the elaborate and round-about way of saying things that French has. English goes straight to the point, as it were.

For example, here we talk about an "earthquake," two syllables compared with the French tremblement de terre, five syllables.

An example of the terseness of English would be a phrase like "I have been to the house and have now come back," every word a single syllable. In a telegram this would be just as intelligible in the form "Been house, now back." In any other European

the Burglar.

In how drastic a manner may a man treat a burglar who resists capture? It cannot be said that the law is quite clear on the point. In defence of his person or of property actually in his possession a man may use such violence as is reasonably necessary; it varies, of course, with the circumstances. But he must not use unnecessary violence for more purpos-

A peaceful trespasser must be requested to depart in peace, and only on his refusal can force be used to remove him, but a violent or an armed trespasser can be removed without such a request.

As a general rule, however, it is not lawful to kill even a person assaulting one or stealing one's goods; unless one's life is in danger such an act is at best manslaughter. Possibly in the defence of one's home the use of firearms is justifiable, even if no violence to the person is threatened, but this is very doubtful.

### Many New Ways of Travel

The whole perspective of travel has been altered by the war. A British

night bombing pilot was in Dover about noon, returning from leave. He reached his squadron in France at 4.30 in the afternoon. At 6 o'clock he was told that he had to fly to Namur, 120 miles behind the then lines between Brussels and Aix-la-Chapelle. He arrived at Namur at 10.15, successfully bombed the railway bridge, and landed at his own airdrome a little after 12. So, in one day, he was on leave and on duty in or over London, Dover, Dunkirk, Ghent, Brussels, Namur, Charleroi, Roulers and Courtrai, and accomplish a task of notable military importance. On another occasion an observer started at one c'clock in the morning in a bembing machine to attack the raiway junction at Lichtewelde, in Belgium. He successfully bombed his objective, returned to bed and went on leave at eight o'clock in the morning. In that day he flew over the lines in an airplane, drove in a motor car to the docks, crossed the Channel in a destroyer, landed in a motor boat went in a four-wheeler to the station, took a train to London, and reached home by means of a "tube," a moving stairway and a taxicab.
