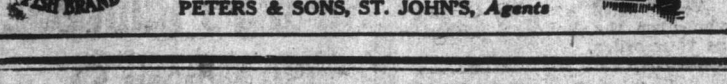

Banks Exerting Financial Pressure.

Reduction in Prices Expected As a Result -- General Brusiloff Military Dictator of Russia-- Bolsheviks Invade Persia-- Law and Order to be Restored in Ireland -- Queen Alexandra Improving.

DOWAGER QUEEN ALEXANDRA BETTER.

LONDON, May 19. The grave rumors concerning the condition of Dowager Queen Alexandra, who has been suffering from a bronchial cold, were set at rest this morning by one of her secretaries, who told the Associated Press that the Queen was so much improved she would be able to get about as usual if the weather was milder. Queen Alexandra has been confined to Marlborough House for the past three weeks.

SILK CHEAPER IN CALIFORNIA.

FRESNO, Calif., May 19. General reductions on silk goods of twenty to twenty-five per cent. were announced by retailers in advertisements published to-day.

TURNED DOWN PETITIONS FROM STRIKERS.

CHICAGO, May 19. The United States Railway Labor Board to-day flatly refused to hear petitions for increased wages presented by John Grunau, President of the Chicago Yardmen's Association, and officers of other organization which went on strike recently in defiance of orders from the National Railroad Brotherhoods.

CARRANZA AGAIN CAPTURED.

HOUSTON, Texas, May 19. General Carranza has been captured by revolutionary forces and has been given safe conduct to Vera Cruz, provided he leaves Mexico at once, according to unofficial messages received to-day by a local newspaper. The report could not be confirmed.

REMOVAL OF MILITARY COUP IN RUSSIA.

LONDON, May 19. General Brusiloff, former Commander-in-Chief of the Russian army under the Imperial Regime, has for the time being virtually assumed the supreme authority formerly wielded in the Russian Soviet Government by Nikolai Lenin and other peoples'

commissaries, according to a statement printed this morning by the Daily Telegraph. This would seem to confirm a recent despatch to the Associated Press that the military authorities in Russia were about to assume the powers formerly in the hands of civilian officials of the Bolshevik regime in Moscow. Rumors that a military coup had been sprung at the Russian capital have been current for several days.

SEVEN KILLED IN PISTOL FIGHT.

CHARLESTON, W. Va., May 19. Seven men were killed in a pistol battle to-night between private detectives and coal miners at the Norfolk and Western railroad station at Matewan, W. Va., according to a report received at the office of Governor John Cornwall here.

BOLSHEVIKI FORCES IN PERSIA.

LONDON, May 19. Bolshevik forces landed from thirteen ships near Enzelli, in Persia, on the Caspian Sea, yesterday. It was learned here to-day. The officer in charge at Enzelli was compelled to accept the Bolshevik terms owing to the superiority of the Bolsheviks and the same night the British evacuated Enzelli.

BANKS FORCE DOWN PRICES.

NEW YORK, May 19. Pursuant to their pledge to the Federal Reserve Board leading banking interests of this city to-day extended their campaign of deflation of credits and high commodities prices. In the financial district this policy already has been effective in reducing speculative loans against securities to the extent of hundreds of millions of dollars in the last fortnight. Banks in the wholesale drygood and general merchandise districts have been proceeding along the same lines and the pressure exerted by those institutions is said to be directly responsible for the wave of price cutting in many lines of the retail trade, especially by the large department stores. Down town banks which in a large measure control the operations of the uptown banks are reported to have advised drastic curtailment of loans to merchants who for any reason fail to comply with the government's deflation programme. A price slashing movement appeared to have struck New York to-day. The afternoon newspapers carried advertisements inserted by many leading department stores reading "reductions of twenty-three to seventy dollars in women's high class capes, wraps and wrap coats." "Fifty per cent. off our entire stock of children's and misses hats."

GOVERNMENT'S IRISH POLICY.

LONDON, May 19. The government's policy, whether the struggle be short or long, would be to employ the whole available forces and resources of the Kingdom to restore law and order in Ireland.

Baron Birkenhead, Lord Chancellor, announced in the House of Lords to-day. It would be the aim of the government in adopting this policy he said, to render utterly impossible the existing campaign aiming at secession. Considerable military reinforcements already have been sent to Ireland, the Lord Chancellor stated, and more would be sent as required. He was speaking with authority and on behalf of the rest of his colleagues, he declared, when he said that if the existing military forces were insufficient the government would hesitate as little to ask the country for more as it hesitated in the late war.

A LIQUOR FIND.

ST. ALBANS, Vt., May 19. Five hundred bottles of Rye and Scotch whiskey were found by United States customs officials in a shipment of seventeen barrels of fish taken from a Montreal train to-day. The

liquor was concealed under layers of fish consigned to a Boston address.

ANXIOUS TO UNLOAD.

CHICAGO, May 18. Prices crashed down in the corn market to-day as much as seventy cents a bushel. The failure of two Kansas banks embarrassed by unwieldy loans on grain, did a good deal to bring about the selling stampede, and which attained almost whirlwind force at last.

WILL NOT RISK NAVY.

LONDON, May 18. The navy estimates for the new financial year, under discussion in the House of Commons yesterday, endured a running criticism from a comparatively small number of members, anxious to secure the reduction of the various votes. The Right Hon. Walter Long, First Lord of the Admiralty, in reply declared that no other department showed the same reduction as the Admiralty, but the Government was determined to do nothing to risk the navy being brought down below that margin which the Admiralty had laid down for the coun-

try's safety. He also said the Admiralty was considering removing obstacles in the way of promotion from the lower deck to commissioned ranks to which George Barnes, former Labor member in the Cabinet, retorted, "the lower deck boy has as much chance of getting commissioned rank as I have of entering the Kingdom of Heaven."

PEACEFUL SETTLEMENT.

WASHINGTON, May 18. A settlement of the controversy over the increased demands of the anthracite coal miners, which has extended over several weeks, is expected by Department of Labor officials. Concessions, obtained by Secretary of Labour, Wilson, from both miners and operators during the daily conference, official said, have made possible peaceful settlement.

THE DISAPPOINTED FRENCH.

LONDON, May 18. Several messages from Paris indicate disappointment among the French people that the meeting between Lloyd George and Premier Millerand at Hythe was not productive of the recognition of France's claim to prior-

ity for reparations for devastated districts. It is asserted that the British Premier objected to the earlier claims of France on this account, his objections being inspired, particularly, by the British Dominions attitude, especially Australia, which strongly holds that before material damage is atoned for, reparation should be made to the dependents of those killed. Hon. W. A. Watt, Australian Commonwealth treasurer, now here is said to confidently expect some installment of this sum next year, with which to pay pensions.

After last Mass His Lordship, seated on the throne and attended by Rev. M. F. Dinn, received the Address, which was read by Mr. A. J. To the Right Rev. John March, D.D., Bishop of Harbor Grace.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR LORDSHIP: We, the members of the Cathedral Congregation, extend to Your Lordship a sincere and hearty welcome on your return from the second ad limina visit to our Holy Father the Pope.

Since the occasion of Your Lordship's last visit, the world has passed through the greatest cataclysm ever known to history. The world was shaken to its base; but the Church, whose foundation rests not on this world, alone stood firm; and conscious of the fact that the great catastrophe was the result of the accumulation of conditions against which she has ever struggled, she continued to carry on the fight for the rescue of christianity and civilization. Hence a great task developed upon her leaders, and it is a cause of joy that their efforts have proved successful.

SPRING SOUNDS.

Don't you love the different sounds things have in Spring?

One of my matter-of-fact friends insists that what I think is a different quality in the sounds in Spring, is merely due to the fact that we have our windows open more universally.

But I refuse to be convinced. I insist that the Spring air gives a new quality to sound, just as there is a different look to the Spring sunshine.

If you were dropped down in a room with the sun shining in it, and did not know what season it was, and were allowed to look out of the window—

don't you feel sure that you could tell whether it was December or May sunshine? I feel confident I could.

Could You Tell the Season This Way?

And though I am not quite so sure, I think I would know the season by the quality of the sounds that came in the window.

That would be a more difficult test to arrange (to say nothing of the initial difficulty) because the sounds themselves are distinctive. For instance, almost any Spring day one is likely to hear the staccato thump of the carpet beater. What a lot of individuality, by the way, can be put into even so simple a rhythm as this! In one hand the beater falls with a quick irregular beat; in another, with a lazy draw-out beat; in still another, with a calm efficient regularity. I wonder if one could not learn to read character by the sound of the carpet beater?

The Carpet Beater is Ousted.

As I write, I hear a sound outside my window that reminds me that the above paragraph may not be always true—I mean that part which declares that almost any Spring day one may hear the sound of the carpet beater.

For the sound I hear is a peculiar pump, pump, pump. Here as well as elsewhere, machinery is displacing pleasant old customs (not so pleasant sometimes for the arm that holds the carpet beater as for the ear that listens).

My neighbor diagonally across the street has joined the army of those that clean house without one thump of the carpet beater. In other words, a vacuum machine stands in front of her house and the travelling vacuum cleaner is at its work.

The First Lawnmower.

Another sound, almost as redolent of Spring as the chirrup of young birds, is the sound of the first lawnmower. I wonder if science will find some way to abolish that sound, too? I rather hope not.

And from the vacant lot across the street on early Spring afternoons come certain sounds that are as inextricable from the suggestion of Spring as they are from the first activities connected with the annual forming of our neighborhood baseball nine.

Housebuilding, too, is an essentially Spring sound. Of course houses are built in the Fall, but then so do roses bloom in other months than June, but "the workman's hammer in creaking song" is just as essentially a Spring sound as roses are a June flower.

I am not as ardent a Spring lover as many. I have a tenderer place in my heart for Autumn than for Spring—but I do love to hear the Spring sounds, and this year more than ever before. I fancy a good many can agree with me in that last statement.

THE ANCIENT THEME.

When there is naught else to inspire the Scottish bard, he takes his lyre, and sings about the heather, and oftentimes I envy him; for when my stock of themes is slim, I've nothing but the weather. Today my head is working wrong, I cannot chant a decent song, my thoughts all run together; and I'm afraid some angry hick may through my window throw a brick if I ring in the weather. And yet there's nothing else, odds fish! There's nothing else, though much I wish to write some deathless stanzas; you may have other themes in mind; the weather's all that I can find, out here in bleeding Kansas. The weather comes, the weather goes; sometimes it rains, sometimes it snows, again it ups and freezes; and it embraces all there is of thaws that melt, of storms that whiz, of fogs and mists and breezes. I've worn the weather out, I fear; I've sung about it, year by year, in high and burning phrases; I've raved about it when 'twas cold, and I've roared up, to paw and scold, when it was hot as blazes. It's saved my bacon many times, when I looked round for themes for rhymes, looked round and couldn't find them; and then the weather, good as new, suggested sonnets three or two, and I'd sit down and grind them.

Canada's Coming Envoy.

(Boston Sunday Herald.)

In view of the friendly relations always existing between the United States and Canada, we may look forward with pleasure to the closer diplomatic intercourse which will be brought about by the coming of a Canadian envoy to Washington. How soon he may take up his residence and enter upon his duties is not yet certain, but the provision in the Dominion government estimates of \$80,000 for his official expenses shows that the appointment is likely to be made whenever the progress with parliamentary business permits. It is understood that the agreement with the British government concerning the designation of a Canadian minister to the United States is complete, no objection having been made in London to the desire of Ottawa. Legislation will now be introduced in the Dominion Parliament to define the status of the proposed representative, and the scope of his diplomatic or semi-diplomatic duties. These matters will have to be kept in close relation in the British commonwealth of nations and in the world league of nations. But with such things America is not concerned. She extends her hand to her northern neighbor and welcomes the direct communication. Commercial affairs and trade relations bulk large in our business with Canada, and prompt and efficient arrangement of these could never be promoted by the roundabout road of negotiation through London. It appears certain that time will be saved and understanding and agreement more easily reached when Canada has a minister of her own at the United States capital. Having regard to the approaching change of system, the appointment of Sir Auckland Geddes as British ambassador to the United States may have some connection with impending events. He knows Canada, having lived there for several years, and he may be supposed to understand trade on the international scale, having come to us from the presidency of the British board of trade. So Canada will be strongly represented at Washington. That is right. The two nations that divide North America between them should always be in a position for ready consultation and co-operation. And what could be more appropriate than the coming to the United States of the first diplomatic representative of Canada as a nation? History will record it as an epoch.

An' Pa says, "Gosh! there's folks enough on earth to talk to, I should think. Without you peesterin' the folks whose souls have gone across the brink." Shall Woman Have the Franchise.

Why not? What is there different in the intelligence of woman from that of man, that the former should be deprived of her right to vote in the selection of those who should rule and govern over civic as well as national affairs? The suppression of woman from entry into affairs of government may have been perfectly all right during the middle ages or to come to a later date, the mid-Victorian era, when the zenith of women's desire was to do tatting at home, and be perfectly submissive to her grandmother, if unmarried—to her husband and his family if a wife. Life held no broad vistas for her. It was bounded by home on the one hand and the verdict of society on the other, and so her narrow existence was passed and she died as she lived, the negation of sex and all that it means. Emancipation from tradition was not for her thoughts. She was satisfied to live, move and have her being in the provincial or parochial circle of her forbears. Drably she entered life and drably she left it, none the better in the main for her short and uncolored sojourn upon earth. Some, of course, there were whose spirits soared above such a life, and these few daring souls have left their mark on the world's page.

Woman has worked for her right to take part in the affairs hitherto controlled solely by man. She has earned a title to enter upon a new phase of existence. The rolling tide can as easily be pushed back by human power, the mountains removed from their bases, as can woman be any longer denied of her will to enter the realms of politics and discuss equally with man matters of state. No more evidence of this right, as well as

privilege, is needed than woman's part in the Great War. The response made by the gentler sex when country called, was none the less heroic than that of the man. Woman made it possible for the war to be carried to a victorious end. She neither shirked nor evaded her duties or responsibilities. For no matter what service she was called upon, that service found her ready. No need to recapitulate all that was done by "weak woman" when the war cloud loomed darkly and forbiddingly. History, if written truthfully, will record her deeds and tell of her worth. There was no hesitation. Whether for home service or at the front; whether to till the land, make munitions, act as bus drivers and what not, or whether to adopt the role of V.A.D. or Red Cross Nurse at the front or in base hospitals, where the horrors of war were seen in all their hideousness, no matter what the duty, the women of Britain and her Dominions never once faltered, but endowed with heroism accepted cheerfully and bravely the work assigned and did it.

In recognition of these services then, if for nothing else, women deserve the franchise—the right to vote. But other factors are in her favor. She has proven herself capable of managing great organizations with as much success as she undertook and carried out other war work. Financially and with great credit to herself and sex she handled such national affairs as belonged to the Patriotic and other Associations with which she was identified, and all with as much ability and acumen as men in similar cases displayed. She became self-reliant; learned to depend more upon herself and associates and through this development brought to bear on the work, voluntarily taken up, a knowledge which was as surprising as it was original. Every intellectual power, every capacity for organization, every spirit of genius possessed by man was repeated and duplicated in woman when the necessity arose. Though her talents may have been latent, they were there. The psychological moment gave them development, and woman entered into man's sphere in friendly competition with him. She now asks for the right as well as the privilege of exercising the franchise in municipal and dominion affairs. Is there any valid reason why her request should be refused? Her intelligence is equal with that of man, her intuition sometimes greater. Altogether, with her new knowledge, woman will be a valuable aid in the proper governing of a city or a country, and man will be all the better

An Abortion.

Chief Justice Horwood and Judge Kent have decided rightly not to give judgment upon any enquiry they make into the Woodford-Squires charges. Acting as Election Court Judges, or sitting as trial judges, in a criminal proceeding, they would be much embarrassed, perhaps disqualified, by the fact of previous findings having been made by them as Commissioners. But they would have acted more wisely still if at the outset they had refused to act as Commissioners, thus saving much waste of time. The high standing of our Supreme Court Judges in public opinion should not be prejudiced by their participation in matters essentially political, about which partisan feeling is bound to be high.

What will the Governor do now? In our opinion he should ask the Colonial Office to nominate a retired English or Colonial Judge to come here as Commissioner to enquire and report upon this matter. No local man will be above the suspicion of partisanship. Any man appointed by the Governor-in-Council will be regarded as a mere tool. The duty of ultimate action after verdict is upon His Excellency, and the evidence upon which to base that action should be taken, and report made, by a man of his own personal choosing. In the meantime, the delay has been scandalous, and should not be longer tolerated. The Opposition should move vigorously and immediately.

The New Regulations.

The Honorable the Minister of Marine and Fisheries introduced the new Fish Export Regulations Bill in the House of Assembly yesterday afternoon and swanked quite a bit over it. He is evidently determined to have it go through, and being the real power behind the Government, there will be no hesitancy on the part of members on that side to vote as they are directed. Those of them who so strongly condemned the twenty cent export duty on dry fish last fall when soliciting votes, will now have to swallow and endorse an additional tax of ten cents per qt. on dry and five cents per quintal on salt bulk codfish, as well as a license fee to be imposed on exporters of \$50.00 before certificates to ship will be issued. The state of mind of Western exporters can be well imagined when this intelligence reaches them. Government members, of course, have to fall in line, otherwise as Mr. Higgins put it a day or two ago, "they will not be foisted along." An outline of the resolutions follows. Readers may draw their own conclusions and make their own comments.

- (1) For the establishment of a Codfish Export Board of five members, of which the Minister of Marine and Fisheries shall be the Chairman. Three members of the Board shall be appointed by the Governor-in-Council and one by the President of the Board of Trade.
- (2) The duty of the Board shall be to advise the Governor-in-Council as to the exportation and marketing of salt codfish and more particularly to recommend rules to regulate:
 - (a) The issuing, holding, suspension and cancellation, of licenses to exporters of salt codfish;
 - (b) The conditions and terms of sale abroad;
 - (c) The minimum prices for the sale of salt codfish in particular markets at particular times;
 - (d) The maximum quantity of salt codfish which may be sold for or exported to any particular market at any particular time.
- (3) No salt codfish shall hereafter be exported without a license. A license fee of \$50.00 shall be charged, and an additional export tax of ten cents a quintal on salt codfish and five cents a quintal on green codfish, shall be imposed. The license shall be issued yearly and may be suspended for breach of the Act or any rules that may be made.
- (4) Trade Commissioners shall be appointed, and their salaries paid out of the moneys collected as above.

Twenty-Nine Houses Being Built.

Some twenty-nine new dwelling houses are now under construction or having places for foundations digged. These are houses which were begun since January 1st, this year. In addition there is a big amount of carpentering being done in the way of enlargements and improvements on dwellings. Last year there were 104 dwelling houses constructed. These included the ones built by the City Council. Fifty-one of them were connected with water and sewerage.

Is This Profiteering?

A man stated a day or two ago that a certain clothing factory, of which he was a shareholder, had declared a 1919 dividend of 35 per cent. Up to now, 1920, there is a dividend of 30 per cent, which means, he stated, that this year's dividend will be at least 70 per cent. That would be 135 per cent profit in two years. The question which prompts itself is: Must THIS be called profiteering? Verily, the way of the clothes wearer is an expensive one.

Police Court.

A business man of Water Street was fined \$10 for a breach of the street trading regulations. For cruelly treating a horse, a driver was fined \$5. For careless and improper driving, the driver of a double team was fined \$2.00.

House of Assembly.

May 19.

The House met at 3 p.m. Hon. W. F. Coaker (Bonavista), presented petitions from Open Hall and Keels, asking for Modification of the Prohibition Act. He took occasion to state his position on the subject. He would not be prepared to consider modification unless those who voted and worked against liquor asked for it. Personally, he thought that doctors' scripts should be cut out and a sort of license for small quantities of alcohol granted. However, he would not agree to any modification of the Act unless asked for by those who drove liquor out of the country. (Has it been driven out?—Ed.)

The House then went into Committee on the Codfish Export Regulations Bill.

Hon. W. F. Coaker (Bonavista), the father of the Bill, explained that it was intended to provide machinery for regulating the export and marketing of fish. Ten cents on dry and five cents on green fish will be charged as an additional tax, the revenue accruing in this manner being used to pay Trade Commissioners to look after the markets. From the export duty of twenty cents now collected there is derived three hundred thousand dollars revenue and from the ten cents duty above noted, another one hundred and fifty thousand dollars will be collected. Total \$450,000,000.

This will be expended as follows: \$150,000 for salaries and expenses of Trade Commissioners, \$150,000 for scientific research, inspectors' salaries and expenses, etc., and the other \$150,000 will be devoted to the general revenue. A Superintendent of Fisheries will be appointed at a salary of \$5,000.00 per annum.

The Trade had informed Mr. Coaker that they didn't want the Bill, or at least a part of it. They would be in favor of a nominal fee of \$50, as an export license fee, but told him that they did not want regulation of prices. Mr. Coaker welcomed the news that a number of young men were

Sir M. P. Cashin (Leader of the Opposition), asked that further consideration of the Bill be deferred until to-day.

The next Bill for consideration was the Income Wartax Act. This provides that the Act shall remain in force for another year with this amendment, a taxpayer shall be allowed two hundred dollars free of tax for every child he has under eighteen years of age. The Committee passed the Bill and it was reported. The House went into Committee on the "Business Profit's Tax, 1917." This Act is extended for another year. Only one amendment is made, that of compelling the Banks to pay their assessment on the

deposits in the Bank at the end of each year instead of on the profits. An alternative was in force enabling the Banks to choose between these two. Now it must be on deposits and the rate is 1/4 of one per cent. After some short comments, this amendment was agreed to and the Committee rose and reported the Bill passed.

QUESTIONS.

Sir J. C. Crosbie asked that all correspondence be tabled in connection with the dissatisfaction expressed by the Minister of Posts and Telegraphs over the Post Office at Broad Cove, Bay de Verde.

Reply—Will be tabled to-morrow.

Mr. Walsh asked the Hon. the Prime Minister if it is the intention of the Government to place a coastal boat on that isolated section of the coast between Trepassay and Placentia, taking in the following settlements: Trepassay, St. Shott's, Peter's River, St. Vincent, Gaskier, Point LaHaye, St. Mary's Riverhead, Mall Bay, Regina, Admiral's Beach, Mosquito, Salmonier North, St. Joseph's, Haricot, Tickle's, Collins, John's Pond, North Hr., Branch, Point Lance, St. Bride's, Cutlet, Angel's Cove, Patrick's Cove, Ship's Cove, Barachois, Point Verde and Placentia Railway.

Reply—No service will be considered this year.

Mr. Walsh asked the Hon. the Prime Minister if it is the intention of the Government to continue the motor mail and passenger service between Sound Island, Barron Island, Woody Island and the eastern end of Merasheen to Long Island and Arnold's Cove to connect with railway.

Reply—Service will be operated.

Mr. Walsh asked the Hon. the Prime Minister if it is the intention of the Government to place an additional coastal steamer on Placentia Bay.

Reply—Service won't be considered this year.

Sir M. P. Cashin asked the Minister of Justice to table a copy of the Commission issued to the Commissioners appointed to inquire into the "Woodford Affidavit."

Reply—The Commission issued was abortive, because, while the Judges were satisfied to take the evidence, and conduct the enquiry, they were not prepared to come to any findings on the matter. His Excellency the Governor was now considering what further steps he would take.

Sir M. P. Cashin asked the Hon. the Prime Minister to lay on the Table of the House copies of all communications between the Food Control Board and the Sugar Importers relative to the sugar situation or the control of the sugar supply.

Reply—Will be tabled to-morrow.

The House went into Committee on the Legislative Disabilities Bill.

Mr. W. J. Walsh (Placentia and St. Mary's) hoped that when naval and military men applied for positions on the coastal service they would not be blocked.

Dr. W. E. Jones (Hr. Main), considered that the state of affairs as revealed by recent statements in the House did not reflect much credit on the Ministry of Shipping. We have a coal famine and we have a salt famine. This session would go down in history as one of erratic and freak legislation.

Mr. C. J. Fox (St. John's East), wanted to register his protest against legislation in Section 3 of the Bill.

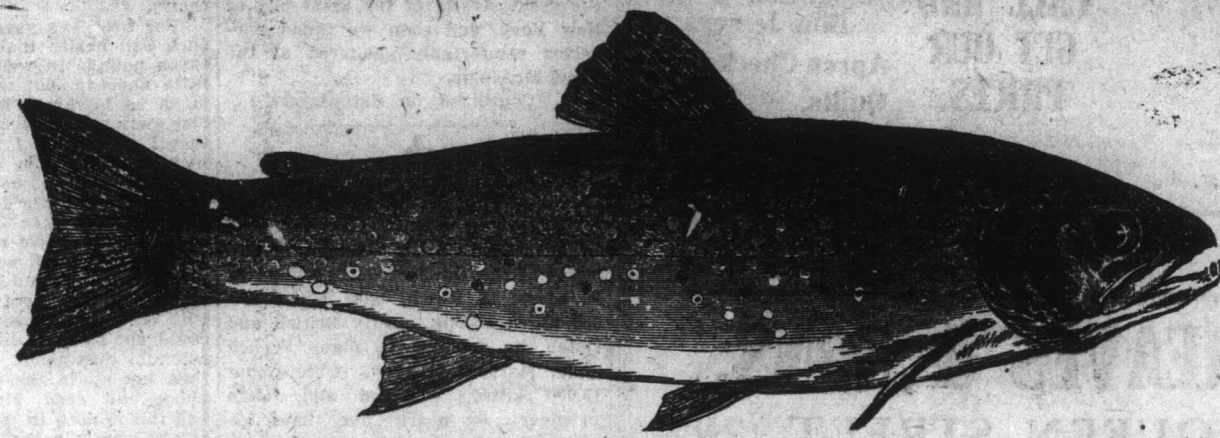
By this Act, Mr. Cave is made Statutory Head of the Department until Dec. 31st next. Once this Act is passed he cannot be removed from office except by Act of Parliament. He suggested that this state of affairs was not good enough and asked the Minister in charge to alter it to meet his views. If this were done he had no other strong objection to offer.

The Prime Minister thereupon inserted the words "subject to His Excellency the Governor's will and pleasure."

Sir M. P. Cashin (Leader of the Opposition) was against the Bill, which he placed in the same category as the one which came up when asked for a Bill containing retroactive power. There was no precedent for the action. Sir Michael then took occasion to discuss the salt situation and deplored the state of affairs that exists. Somebody is to blame. Who is it? It is either the trade or the Minister of Shipping. When Sir John Crosbie was Minister of Shipping he was on the job looking for salt from Jan. to May. We never had trouble like this, even when the war was on. If we run out of salt in June then it will be disastrous. It is the mainstay of the fishery industry. But nobody is excited over it as far as the Government members are concerned and not one of them is troubling the least about it. Sir Michael then discussed the coal situation and the Railway situation and asked the Government what they were doing with regard to the latter. It must be tackled, if not this year then next. Something must be done by the Government. The truth was they were too weak to bring down the Legislation they knew was required. They said the late Government was bought by the Reds, Well, where is the present Government?

S.S. Cabot reached Carmanville yesterday afternoon, and had orders to leave at once for the scene of the Dundee wreck.

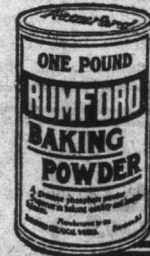
W. M. A. Entertainment.

And Reminiscences of a Pleasant Tour.

CHAPTER V.

THE APPROACH TO NEW YORK.

To enter New York by ship on a fine day is an experience not soon forgotten. For hours before, the interest among the passengers is keen, and every object is criticised and pleasantly commented upon. The approach to New York for many miles is all dotted with bungalows and residences; and these buildings are literally buried in trees and foliage; and as one beholds them in panoramic order, there arises a feeling of admiration for the scene itself, and of congratulation upon the people who live under such favorable circumstances; they truly have a lot in their favour, and if their lives are as happy as their surroundings are pleasant, then they are a happy people. But we cannot judge peoples' happiness by their surroundings at all times. There are a score of things to interest the traveller at such a place. On every hand there are the bell-buoys, and also the light ships. With every toss of the sea these buoys ring out their alarm, and their chimes are as signals to passing ships. To us they looked really picturesque and novel, while in shape and size, they varied. But our view was on summer seas, and summer sunset enhanced what we beheld; still they taught us many a lesson, for though on pleasure bent, we closed our eyes to the real and the practical.

In fancy we beheld these beacons amid the storm. We thought of the darkness and the fog and the tempest. We remembered how eagerly they are looked for, and what relief their signals bring to the anxious mariner. We knew that they meant guidance and direction, and in the end anchorage and safety. In these we saw their true worth. As mere ornaments they possess no commercial value; but as guardians of the ocean's highways, their price is beyond computation. Their real place is in the danger zone; and the greater the danger the greater is their usefulness. They were meant for the storm. They were meant for the dangerous places, and

for the time of stress. How much like true friends they were. In them we seemed to see a reflection of strong character — character that stands amid the storm of temptation. The storm tests these stations; and so the storm tests one's true friends. Anybody can be nice when the wind is fair, and when the sun is shining, and the course is even; but it requires the test to prove the worth of our professions. A true friend can be depended upon; adversity does not change his position, nor does idle gossip prejudice his judgment.

Turning from the danger signals, we next noted the passing shipping. Some of this was out-ward bound, and some of it, like our own good ship, was inward bound. Tugs, Scows and Yachts scampered along, like so many birds at wing. Merchantmen and stately ocean liners came constantly into view. But it was the huge excursion steamers, with their ponderous and high-built promenade decks, that we seemed to admire the most. These boats run daily in the holiday season, and hundreds and thousands of excursionists patronize them. They are equipped with every appliance that marine architecture can devise, and are provided with every safeguard to life; in fact safety first, seems to be the watch-word of the American people. Amid these passing ships, the Rosalind steamed up the Sound, and then into the harbour of New York. Arriving there the passengers began to hustle in preparation for landing. The voyage was over. The ship had done her duty. The expense of waters was spanned, and the next step was to pass the quarantine regulations. For this some were prepared and some were not, but in good time, and amid some little suspense, the ordeal ended and everybody breathed a sigh of relief. Similar to the quarantine regulations, were those of the immigration department. In passing these not all the passengers were successful, for some

had to stand aside and await investigation. Marlborough at Ramillies.

The second of the outstanding victories of the Duke of Marlborough in Flanders, in which, with about 60,000 allied troops, mostly British and Dutch, he defeated as many French under Marshal Villeroi, with about 15,000 killed, wounded and taken prisoners, or nearly five times his own loss, was one of the occasions on which his person was imperilled. It was at a critical moment when the Dutch, after carrying the French front line, recoiled before the second, that Marlborough saw and seized his chance. Calling up all the available cavalry he headed a charge against the exulting enemy. The result proved decisive, but the Duke was twice in danger. Having been recognized by some French dragons, he was all but captured, and escaped only by cutting his way through, after the manner of a medieval commander, his horse being shot under him in the struggle. One of his officers promptly offered him another, and had his head shot off by a cannon-ball at the very moment when he was assisting his commander into the saddle. But, "calm and serene," as at Blenheim, Marlborough led the charge as if nothing particular had occurred, the French line being severed, and the enemy utterly defeated. There was, indeed, a brief rally at a village on the French left, and Marlborough called a halt to get his men in order, but the battle was over. The French, recognizing that resistance was hopeless, with their lines broken, expected something like a panic, and general dispersion ensued. Nearly all their artillery was taken, and the remaining work was but a long pursuit by the cavalry whom he had headed in the decisive charge.

Columbus, Discoverer of America.

On May 20, 1498, Christopher Columbus, the discoverer of America, died at Valladolid, in Spain, 100 miles north from Madrid. He was born about 1452 at Genoa, in Italy, and being sent to study at the University of Pavia, showed such a strong desire for geographical knowledge, and to obtain such by going to sea. He believed that by sailing westward from Europe he could reach Cathay, as China was called by Europeans, and other countries. But, after studying all the maps and charts that he could procure, he made occasional short voyages, and was informed by seamen that there were unknown lands separated from Europe by the Atlantic Ocean. After vainly seeking aid from Genoa, Portugal, and England, he at last obtained an introduction to first Ferdinand V., King of Spain, and afterwards to that sovereign's wife, Isabella, who together were induced to equip and man for him three vessels, agreeing that he should have a tenth of all profits, and be viceroy of the land that he expected to discover. He sailed on August 2, 1492, and on October 12 that year landed and bent his knees in grateful worship on San Salvador, one of the Bahamas, the northernmost group of what are called the West Indies, as the natives of America are called Indians because such early discoverers of that continent supposed that they had found what they were seeking, a shorter and straight way to India. Columbus discovered also the great island of Cuba, and the one named St. Domingo, or Hispaniola, on which last he built a fort. Returning to Spain he presented to the King and Queen gold and other valuables which he had found, and was therefore supplied with followers for a second voyage; but it was not till his third and last voyage, in 1498, that he saw and reached the mainland of what was named America, from Amerigo Vesputi, another Italian, who followed his example in 1499. But in a similar manner Columbus is commemorated in North and South America, British Columbia being the name of that part of the Dominion of Canada from the Rocky Islands to the Pacific Ocean. A republican State called Colombia is situated on the northwest coast of South America.

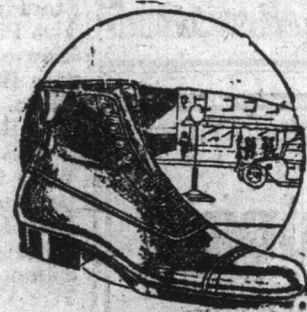

POLES GIVE GROUND.
WARSAW, May 19. The Bolsheviks have launched an attack on the Northern front, between the river Dvina and Berezhki, and the Poles have been compelled to surrender ground in the face of superior forces, says an official communication issued to-day.

PIN-PRICKING TACTICS.
PHILADELPHIA, May 19. Sir Auckland Geddes, British Ambassador came here to-day to receive from the Franklin Institute, for Sir Charles Parsons, of England, the Franklin medal awarded him. A party of Irish sympathisers appeared in front of the building, carrying banners bearing inscriptions demanding freedom for Ireland. The police kept them moving and gave them no opportunity to tackle the visitor.

RAILWAY OFFICIAL ARRESTED.
PARIS, May 19. M. Mousson, Secretary of the Federation of Railway Workers, was arrested this evening, when leaving a meeting of the Federal Council.

SUCCESSFULLY LAUNCHED.
SYDNEY, N.S., May 19. Watched by many hundreds of spectators, the Canadian Concrete Shipbuilding Company's new steamer, Permanencia, the only ocean going vessel of her kind built in Canada, took the water to-day at North Sydney. The launching has been pronounced a great success by her owners and Lloyd's special representative, who was present. The ship floated in the waters of North Sydney Harbor in as correct a position and as buoyantly as any vessel of steel or wooden construction. The launching was in charge of E. Gillard, master shipbuilder of Newfoundland, under whose supervision the ship was built. Three seconds after the blocks were knocked from launchway rollers, the ship was in the water, not a hitch of any kind being encountered. In six weeks time she is expected to be ready for a Sydney to Newfoundland freight and passenger service, in which she is to be placed.

Three Hundred Barrels Nfld. Herring Spoiled.

No Cold Storage Space Available. (Montreal Daily Star.)

Seventeen tons of pickled herrings, cured in Newfoundland and Nova Scotia in the Scotch method, formed one of the last consignments sent to the Montreal Abattoirs for conversion into fertilizer before the new rendering plant commences operations shortly. They were packed into barrels last September, according to the stamps on them, and shipped to Montreal for the tables of the Jewish community, who are the chief consumers of this kind of pickled herring. But they were not stored in a cold storage warehouse, but in the old Donnelly ice house, a tall wooden building divided into five sheds where ice used to be stored, but which are no longer used for this purpose, and which are now empty, shortly to be pulled down along with other houses on Manufacturers street to make room for a C.P.R. extension.

The first, contained in 158 small barrels, of 150 lbs. each and 40 large barrels, each weighing about 300 lbs., belonged to the Universal Importing Company, of St. Paul street, and when the Star representative called on them to inquire why such a vast quantity of food had been consigned to the dump, he was informed that they had no other place in which to keep them owing to the great lack of cold storage facilities in Montreal. It had meant a loss to them of \$1,500, and was the remainder of a matter of some ten or twelve thousand barrels of fish handled by them during the past year.
