

When broiling a steak always rub over the broiler with vegetable oil before laying in the meat.

Like roast beef the steak must be seared quickly on both sides to retain the juices. For a steak one and a half inches thick allow eight minutes to have it rare and about 13 if well done.

LAMB, VEGETABLE STUFFING

Either mutton or lamb may be used for this delicious roast, and the leg may be substituted for the less expensive breast. If the leg is selected have the butcher remove the bone. and place the stuffing in this cavity. For the breast also have the butcher take out the bones, lay it out flat and spread thickly with the following stuffing: Cook until softened, but not browned, one minced white onion, a quarter of a cupful of chopped celery and half a minced green pepper. Turn into a bowl and add one cupful grated soft bread crumbs, two tablespoons of chopped parsley, a quarter of a teaspoon each of powdered sage and poultry seasoning, salt and paprika to taste, one grated carrot, and two tablespoons melted bacon fat.

Roll up securely, tie in shape and roast in hot oven. Dust with salt and paprika after it has cooked for half an hour and baste frequently with the gravy that forms in the pan. Pour in a cupful of boiling water when you add the salt and paprika and for the last two bastings add a tablespoonful of kitchen bouquet. This is sometimes called "mock duck."

#### With the Black Trackers WONDERFUL FEATS OF HUMAN BLOODHOUNDS.

The achievements of the Australian black police, trained to police work and attached to the distant superintendent's staff, are without parellel," says Mr. Dorrington, writing in the "Daily Mail."

"The trail work of the old Red Indian reads like child's play when compared with the exploits of the Queensland black trackers. Nature has endewed them with the bloodhound's instinct combined with a superhuman sense of observation.

"The hunted desperado may cross nauriferous sandstone country where the print of a foot would appear impossible. Yet the black tracker will follow in the desperado's steps with scarcely a glance at the ground as he canters on his well-groomed horse in front of the white troopers.

#### Instinct of the Wilds.

"Often he will draw rein to indicate where an article such as a pipe. match, cap, or jack-knife has been a!owed to fall to the ground by the escaping desperado, and recovered. "I have seen a black fellow follow the trail of a lizard or iguana across

a strip of basalt country, and catch,

cook, and eat it within an hour. "And the trail of a lizard on basalt gets most white men guessing, even with a microscope. As piccaninnies in their native 'whirlies' or 'humpies', the black babies, awakening from sleep at dawn, will sometimes discover that their mother has disap-

"Crawling from the 'humpy', they will often track the mother to some distant waterhole or lagoon, through scrub and spinifex that no white child could endure. And so the instinct of the wilds is developed.

"Sometimes the black trackers turns criminal, and is himself tracked. Then the fun begins, and all the tricks of the aboroginal calendar are introduced to thwart the pursuers.

"The pursued black fellow has been known to run backwards for miles, dusting and obliterating his tracks with a leafy branch.

"But the professional tracker in his wake has become aware of this fact, and has bagged his quarry, tree branch and all, at the end of a fifty-

"Turning a horse's shoes is too old a dodge to deceive an aboriginal, but the white criminal has often puzzled him by clambering along a wire sheep fence for ten or twenty miles. Hard work in a sweltering sun, but liberty is sweet."

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,-Several events during the last two months have taken place which shows that the public mind is stirred such as it has not been for many years. Notably the United Fishermen's Movement mass meetings in the principal outports dealing with matters of vital importance to the public generally, especially the meeting at Bonavista a few days ago dealing with the question of taxation; a very broadminded article from the pen of Mr. Brian Dunfield on the question of Education, and last, but not least, is an Editorial in Telegram of the 18th inst. entitled "Ship Subsidies." In it you make some very cogent points, which I do not think should pass by unnoticed.

The question of a merchant fleet of foreign-going vessels for this country is one which I have advocated on different occasions, and if I had been backed up by you and others with such articles as you wrote on the 18th something tangible might have been done before this time. Your article is rather late, but better late than never. (We refer the Captain to several editorial articles on this subject previously published in Telegram.



### **Public Notice!**

Public attention is directed to the following extracts from the Game Laws ::-

### BIRDS.

No person shall hunt, kill, sell, purchase or have in possesion any Ptarmigan or Willow Grouse, commonly called Part idge, nor any Curlew, Plover, Snipe or other wild or migratory Birds (except Wild Geese and Crows) or the eggs of any such Birds within this Colony, between the first day of January and the twentieth day of September in any year, under a penalty not eding one hundred dollars (\$100.00) or imprisonment not exceeding three months.

Provided it shall not be held unlawful to have in possession any of such Birds when the party shall prove the said Birds were killed between the twentieth day of September and the first day of January following:—and provided that any person who shall actually have in possession upon the first day of January any Ptarmigan or Willow Grouse, shall be allowed to offer for sale such Ptarmigan or Willow Grouse until the fifteenth day of the same month of January.

### CARIBOU.

It shall not be lawful for any person to purchase, or to receive in exchange, from any other person any Venison or any portion of the flesh of Caribou, at any time between the first day of January and the thirty-first day of July in any year, and y person offending against the provisions of this section shall liable to a penalty not exceeding two hundred dollars or in lefault to imprisonment for any period not exceeding three

No person shall hunt, kill or pursue with intent to kill, any Caribou from the first day of February to the thirty-first day of July in any year, both days inclusive, or from the first day of October to the twentieth day of October in any year, both days

The season for shoeting Wild Rabbit or Hare closes on

It shall be the duty of every person using Snares for the purpose of taking any Fur-bearing Animals, except Wild Hare or Rabbit, to take up and remove such Snares on or before the 15th day of December, in each year.




