
The unprecedented development of Vancouver and Victoria as Canadian shipping ports affords ample facilities for cheap direct water transport of canned salmon to all the leading ports of the world, as the principal steamship lines have established monthly, or more frequent sailings from British Columbia. All goods are delivered f.o.b. the

Careful records of operations are kept by the Dominion Government, which has inspectors at the canneries, and by the cannery owners, to insure the standard quality of the packs, and observance of all regulations in relation to the fishing and canning industries.

A large business has developed for frozen, mild cured and dry salmon, owing to the exceptionally high quality of the flesh and care taken in the handling and curing of the article. "Frozen salmon" is hard frozen with a thin coating of ice, wrapped in tissue and glazed paper and packed in boxes containing 100 pounds and upwards. "Mild cured salmon" is _packed in therces - containing 800 _ mars.eod.tf
