### Herriot Has No Fears of the Communists—Newfoundland Delegation are Guests of Federal Government—Dundee Elects a Laborite.

**VIENNA'S UNEMPLOYED THREATEN TROUBLE.**  
VIENNA, Dec. 22.  
Five thousand mounted and foot police paroled the streets to-day from early this morning until late to-night to prevent rioting by the unemployed who had passed a resolution which declared that if doles were not increased in time for them to make Christmas purchases they would spoil the fun for everyone else.

**HERRIOT NOT AFRAID OF COMMUNISTS.**  
PARIS, Dec. 22.  
Premier Herriot, who has been ill for a number of days, received the Paris representatives of the Foreign Press this morning for the purpose of discussing the recent rumors regarding Communist uprisings, and reported his statement made to the French correspondents a few days ago, that there was no menace from Communist factions. France lives in absolute calm, he said; she has not known nor shall she know any violence. The Communist forces, he said, were decreasing.

**1927 PRESBYTERIAN MINISTERS TO ENTER UNION CHURCH.**  
TORONTO, Dec. 22.  
The results of the official census of the ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, on the question of a statement issued at the headquarters of the Presbyterian Church on Saturday evening, when the last returns from 77 Presbyteries were received. It was reported 1907 will enter the

United Church, this being 80.1 per cent. of the total. The number reported to have definitely decided not to enter is 197 or 12 per cent. of the total. The balance of 136 Ministers are reported to be undecided.

**MOLSON'S SALE RATIFIED.**  
MONTREAL, Dec. 22.  
A special general meeting of the shareholders of Molson's Bank at Head Office here this morning formally ratified the previously announced sale of that institution to the Bank of Montreal.

**CANADA'S REPRESENTATIVE.**  
OTTAWA, Dec. 22.  
Dr. W. A. Riddell, former Minister of Labor for Ontario, has been appointed Dominion of Canada Advisory Officer for the League of Nations purposes at Geneva.

**FIREMAN KILLED WHEN TRUCKS COLLIDE.**  
MONTREAL, Dec. 22.  
Two fire department trucks collided this morning, injuring one fireman, William J. Woodbine, so seriously that he died a few minutes later on the way to hospital.

**GUESTS OF DOMINION GOVERNMENT.**  
OTTAWA, Dec. 22.  
The delegation from Newfoundland, headed by Prime Minister Morrice and including Hons. J. R. Bennett, Colonial Secretary, Hon. W. J. Higgins, Minister of Justice and Sir Patrick McGrath, was in the capital to-day and will be entertained by Premier

King at luncheon to-morrow and by Governor General Byng at dinner to-morrow night. The delegation was in Montreal for the Labrador Boundary discussion with Quebec officials and was invited to the capital as guests of the Government.

**BEVIS APPEALS.**  
HALIFAX, N.S. Dec. 22.  
Appeal from the death sentence imposed on Lewis Bevis for having shot police officer Charles Fulton, last July was made this morning on behalf of Bevis, by Lawyer Major Maddin, K.C., of Sydney. The appeal, which will probably be heard by Supreme Court en banc in January, is based on five points including the charge that the evidence of Mrs. Fulton was improperly admitted.

**WINDSOR, Ont., Dec. 22.**  
A blazing cross, the second within eight days, was extinguished by the Fire Department in Windsor City Hall Park last night. The emblem was about six feet in height and five feet, four inches across.

**ASSASSIN SURRENDERS.**  
CAIRO Egypt, Dec. 22.  
Abdel Hadjal Melligul, wanted in connection with the assassination of Sir Lee Stack, Sirdar of the Egyptian Army, surrendered last evening.

**DUNDEE ELECTS LABORITE.**  
DUNDEE, Dec. 22.  
Johnson, Laborite, was elected to Parliament over the Liberal candidate E. D. Simon, in the bye-election rendered necessary by the recent death of Edmund Dene Moral, Labor member.

**FREEDOM OF ACTION.**  
GENEVA, Dec. 22.  
Opening up the whole problem of German armaments, Germany has sent a note to the League of Nations touching on the question of Germany

**Silver Jubilee**  
OF REV. FATHER ASHLEY OF TORBAY.

The Rev. Father Ashley, the beloved Parish Priest of Torbay, is now in Rome, where he celebrates the silver jubilee of his ordination to the Priesthood. To his parishioners it is, undoubtedly, a disappointment that he is not in their midst to receive their congratulations and to listen to the expression of their devotion and regard, but the golden thread of love can traverse wider distances, than that between Terra Nova and the Tiber's banks, and there is a vision in memory that absence cannot dim.

The Rev. Father Ashley, who is now nearing the 49th anniversary of his birth, left St. John's on September 2d, 1876, for Mount Melleray Seminary, County Waterford, Ireland, where he spent three years under the direction of the Cistercian Order. In October 1883, he left Ireland after completing his classical studies, and proceeded to Rome where he entered the Irish College, under the direction of Archbishop Kirby and Monsignor Kelly. After spending five years in the Eternal City, the College was visited by the late Archbishop Howley, Monsignor Donnelly and the late Monsignor St. John, who were on a visit to the Holy Land. On their return to Rome, accompanied by the student ecclesiast, they were received in private audience by Pope Leo XIII. Shortly after Father Ashley was transferred to the Propaganda, where he spent two years, and was ordained by Cardinal Parocchi on December 23, 1889—by five years ago to-day—on the "Mater Omnium" Ecclesiarum—the Mother of all the Churches—St. John Lateran. His Bishop granted him leave of absence till the following May, when he arrived home and was appointed to the Parish of Portugal Cove.

During his incumbency there he began to exercise that activity as a Church and School builder which evoked frequent eulogiums from Bishop Howley. When another Parish needed a supervisor endowed with the powers of initiative and executive ability the late Archbishop manifested his desire that Father Ashley should undertake the work at Argentina. This Father Ashley volunteered to do, and his Church work there, as well as his successful efforts towards the development of the social, moral and material well being of his parishioners, are matters of honored record. Incidentally, as is well known, it was due to his persistent and untiring zeal that the Railway was extended to Argentina, and the Terminal established there.

In April, 1918, on the decease of the Rt. Rev. Monsignor St. John, Father Ashley was appointed to the important Parish of Torbay. The work there and the changed surroundings may not have involved excessive effort, because from every parishioner he received that co-operation and substantial support, which bids obstacles disappear. The results of his zeal and unremitting effort are familiar to all visitors to the flourishing eastern township, and to quote the familiar Latin words, spoken of St. Paul's and Sir Christopher Wren—"Si monumentum requiris, circumspice"—If you seek monument, look around,—they abound on every side.

The distinguished Jubilarian, whilst before all a Priest and Pastor, has rendered invaluable aid to every movement calculated to promote the interests of his fellow countrymen. To-day, not only his parishioners in Portugal Cove and Argentina, and his fellow Churchmen and co-religionists extend congratulations; but Newfoundlanders of all classes and conditions, who have learned to appreciate his sincerity of purpose and his devotion to the welfare of Newfoundland and Newfoundlanders will rejoice to accord to him cordial and sincere welcome when, in due course, he returns to the land, the parish, and the people, whom he has so faithfully ministered to for a quarter of a century.

**CANADIAN PROS. MAKING TEMPTING OFFER FOR HARRY WATSON.**  
TORONTO, Dec. 18.—"Give us one hockey player and we will have a squad that will be the best fighting for the honors," remarked one of the St. Patrick's owners. Later he specified that the one player must be Harry Watson. And the statement is not very far from being correct. Harry Watson on the St. Pat team would make a world of difference. It is that hole at left wing that must be plugged before anything else. St. Pats might possibly go out and get someone to fill it better than it is filled now but they believe Watson is the man and they are determined to get him if at all possible.

To-day Watson will be sought again with a tempting price but before him Harry maintains he will not join the Pros. He maintains he has nothing against pro. hockey. The money offered is sufficient and he has no personal objection to joining the St. Patrick squad, if he joins at all. It is purely a matter of business. He has built himself up a nice little establishment and he wants to maintain it. He claims his jump to the pros.—if

**Queen Alexandra in Retirement**  
HER MAJESTY'S 80TH BIRTHDAY AT SANDRINGHAM.

(By SARAH A. TOOLEY, Author of "The Life of Queen Alexandra").

The eightieth birthday of Queen Alexandra finds her Majesty still able to enjoy the quiet, simple pleasures of her country home.

She lives principally in her special rooms, overlooking the sunny garden terrace of Sandringham House.

These rooms are simple in their arrangements, for Queen Alexandra has no liking for display.

A beautiful sentiment rules her life. Every nook and corner of her rose-colored boudoir speaks of friendship and tender family ties.

The Queen Mother finds pleasurable occupation in reading and in keeping up her large family correspondence. It also gives her great pleasure to look through the albums of her own snapshots.

They recall many scenes and people and places, for at one time Queen Alexandra was among the most active of amateur photographers. Queen Maud's snapshots in Norway are a great interest to her mother, and particularly those which reveal the charming and "wonderful" Prince Olaf at sports and games from early life to the present maturity of twenty-one.

On most days Queen Alexandra motors about the neighbourhood to Kinnaird, Lynn or Hunstanton, accompanied by the Hon. Charlotte Knollys.

It is not such a picturesque progress as in the old days, when she drove her Hundagan ponies tandem or four-in-hand, or mounted on beautiful Vera, galloped over the moors and greeted her friends and neighbors as she passed along. But the royal mother is looked for, all the same.

**Public Interests.**

One feels that Queen Alexandra must miss the beautiful horses which filled the stalls in her pretty stables. Some of her old favorites still remain in the dog kennels, and on sunny mornings she pays them a visit.

Although in retirement, so far as public activities go, Queen Alexandra likes to follow the progress of the societies and institutions which have long enjoyed her patronage, particularly the nursing services of which she is president.

Much correspondence of this kind claims her Majesty's attention, and is dealt with by her Private Secretary, Colonel Sir Henry Streetfield, while correspondence of a more personal character is attended to by the Hon. Charlotte Knollys, whose long and faithful service is valued beyond expression by her royal mistress.

Each Sunday morning Queen Alexandra is to be seen in her accustomed seat in the church in the park, a sanctuary which has become hallowed to her by many memories.

The Queen Mother will spend her birthday quietly at Sandringham surrounded by the immediate members of her family.

There will be no special celebration on the estate, or entertainments in the schools, as in the past, but a heartfelt "Many Happy Returns of the Day" will be lovingly echoed all round the wide estate.—Daily Mirror.

**South Africa Plans to Annex Colonies**  
HERTZOG FAVORS INCORPORATING BECHUANALAND AND SWAZILAND.

JOHANNESBURG, Union of South Africa, Dec. 13.—(Associated Press)—Developments toward incorporating the whole of Bechuanaland Protectorate into the Union of South Africa are imminent, the Johannesburg Star is informed. A definite move in this direction, it says, will be one of the first matters to engage the attention of the Assembly at its coming session.

Premier Hertzog is said to have told a deputation from the Protectorate which recently waited upon him that he thought the time had arrived to consider the incorporation of Bechuanaland and also Swaziland into the Union and that he would obtain the British Government's views on the subject.

Bechuanaland Protectorate, which has been within the British sphere since 1885, comprises about 275,000 square miles and had a population at the time of the 1921 census of 152,083, including 1,743 Europeans.

Swaziland lies at the southeast corner of the Transvaal and is administered by the High Commissioner for South Africa. It covers 6,878 square miles and the 1921 census was 133,665, of whom 2,300 were Europeans.

**Ancient Rent Wrangles**  
The housing question seems to have been acute at times in ancient Rome, and disputes between landlords and tenants were not infrequent.

About 150 B.C. a Senator of Rome appealed to the courts against his landlord, who had demanded 6,000 sesterces (about \$20) a year for a house which had been rented at only half that sum. Grassus, famous for his wealth, made much of his fortune building houses which he let by the yard. He had trouble with the courts when he tried to make a tenant pay 15,000 sesterces for a bachelor's apartment.

Against these abuses Caesar promulgated a law according to which landlords could not exact more than 2,000 sesterces (about \$20) a year for villas in Rome, or more than 500 sesterces in the rest of the country.



And leaves us big enough to say: "To all a Merry Christmas Day!"

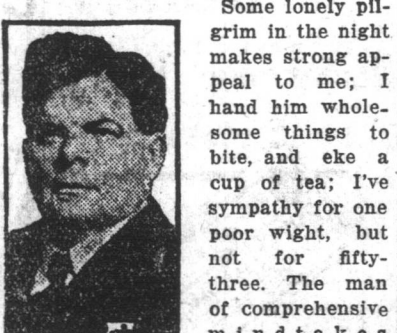

### Scientists Find Blood Does Not Show Race

Germans Used \$2,000,000 Fund from Rockefeller Institute for Two-Year Experiments.

Berlin, Nov. 26.—The Nordic professors who have been working for two years at Kiel University Medical School on the theory that race could be determined by blood tests, now state the theory has been exploded.

Two years ago the Rockefeller Institute granted the Kiel institution \$2,000,000 for research work. The professors came to the conclusion that diet and climate cause a difference in blood.

Germany is alarmed over the number of cases of sleeping sickness which follow influenza. Four hundred cases of sleeping sickness have been reported from the district near Hanover. Every case was preceded by influenza of the head. One-fifth of the cases of sleeping sickness are fatal.

Nervous breakdown also follows influenza and that has proved the cause of many deaths. The Prussian State Medical Association has placed a big fund in the hands of the doctors for research work in identifying the influenza germ and finding a cure.

### Gas and the Next War

Kansas City Star: It needs to be borne in mind, that no great military innovations ever have been worked out in time of peace. The German general staff has been playing with the contrary idea, but simply under stress of circumstances. Unable to arm the German army with the heavy artillery used in the recent war, because of the watchful French, the staff has put forth the theory that heavy artillery is obsolete. It insists that since the armistice the theory of war has been revolutionized; that there will be no trench warfare in the next conflict; that it will be fought with highly mobile columns with tanks and airplanes and machine guns. These suggestions are scoffed at by the French, who point out that every new war begins where the last left off; that innovations worked out in peace cannot be trusted in a nation's defense, the stakes are too important; that any change in the art of war comes gradually under the stress of actual fighting, and that the infantry with its auxiliaries as developed in the late war remains the reliance of the nation.

### Loot Christmas Mail in London

Motor Thieves Steal Many Mail Bags in St. Pancras.

London, Dec. 12. (A.P.)—Motor bandits early this morning raided a post office in the St. Pancras district and escaped with mail bags, variously estimated at from 16 to 100. The raid was made while a large extra staff of postal employees was dealing with the heavy Christmas traffic. The exact value of the loot is not known. Scotland Yard forces are using a special wireless equipped car to track down the robbers.

This is only one of numerous incidents in the crime wave of considerable proportions which has recently been sweeping London and the surrounding country, causing the police authorities great trouble. Reinforcements of police and detectives seem unable to intimidate the criminals who, during the past few days, have been aided in making their escapades by the extremely heavy fog.

The majority of the burglaries have been committed by "cat burglars" whose particular exploits include the climbing of drainpipes to reach rooms on the first and second floors of buildings. These burglars abstract valuable jewelry and vanish without leaving so much as a finger print. Another section of the criminals favors motor cars. They operate in the country districts and district suburbs, making hauls two and three times nightly without being apprehended.

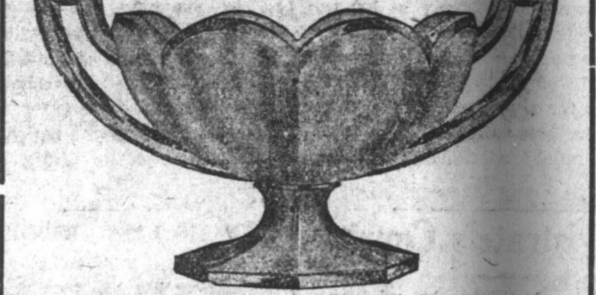

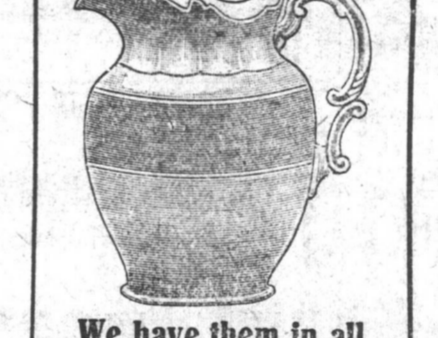

### Father's Skin is Grafted to Girl

WATERFORD MAN COMES TO AID OF HIS DAUGHTER.

NEW WATERFORD, Dec. 13.—Much has been said and written in prose, poetry and song of mother love, than which there is nothing finer, nobler or purer in a good old world, but a father's love is seldom the subject of an epic. It exists, however, as was clearly shown in New Waterford hospital on Wednesday. Little Miss Anna Cole was sometime ago severely burned with some new kind of stove polish exploding. Her neck, arms and hands were badly burned and she has been in hospital for several weeks. Latterly things were becoming serious with the little maid and the doctors decided that skin grafting was necessary to give her a chance of recovery. The girl's father, Mr. Joseph Cole, immediately volunteered to give all that was necessary for his girl. The dual operations were staged Wednesday and the father was on the operating table two hours under ether while the doctor worked carefully cutting and grafting. Dr. Hartigan

was the operating surgeon and operated with his well known skill while all the nurses were ready to help in any way possible. It is too soon to remove the bandages to realize the full value of the operation but the girl is now resting easily and good results are confidently expected. The father is also resting nicely and will be all right in a few days. This is the first case of this kind in the new hospital and has created great interest among doctors and nurses and all those who have known or it hitherto. The general public will not be equally interested and will feel that something more can be recorded in regard to love and sacrifice than is usually credited to a man.

### C.P.R.'s Bond Issue Off for Some Time

MONTREAL—It is now almost certain that the C. P. R.'s big bond issue will be put off until after the turn of the year and in fact, may not come out at all as originally planned, various legal difficulties having cropped up in the way to delay the issuance of the bonds or notes in the form originally planned.

It is felt locally that the issue will be sold entirely in Canada in order to get wider Canadian interest in C. P. R. securities, and also to arouse interest in one of the main purposes of the issue, which is said to be the financing of a comprehensive scheme of immigration and development for the Dominion.

### Killed a Sentry a Day

War Story of Officer's Lonely Raids to Avenge Company's Honour.

How an English Lieutenant took revenge for the capture of fourteen men of his company in the war was related by "Piscout Hampden at Westminster City School.

"In July, 1918," he said, "the troops under my command were digging, and they had wrongly put their rifles down on the back of the trench. The Germans came over and took fourteen prisoners.

"Lieutenant Kermode of the West Yorkshire Regiment, was determined to avenge our honour. He went out every day, crawling through the grass and gave the German sentry an afternoon bomb. It cost the Germans a sentry a day."

The Cull of Fish

In returning to the subject of the talqual system and the culling of fish, the Trade Review describes fully how the existing state of affairs has arisen. The methods followed are traced from the merchant to the purchasing agent, and from the agent to the fisherman, and it is pointed out that while the latter has come in for a large share of the criticism, the persons really to blame are those higher up. There will be no disagreement as to that.

The Trade Review says: "The mischief goes round in a circle." A vicious circle would perhaps be an even more correct description, and the time has come to break it. The fishermen under the keen competition provoked by the talqual system may be enabled to get rid of his catch more quickly and with a minimum of labour, but he realizes as clearly as anyone else that it must eventually end in killing the goose that lays the golden eggs. The agent is more or less the victim of circumstances. The merchants are also aware of the evils of the system, but those who are most anxious to maintain a high standard find themselves "up against it," because of the lack of co-operation. In other words it means that it is impossible to arrive at a working agreement between those immediately concerned. The duty therefore rests with the Government to evolve a system which will be advantageous to all.

The lead has been given by the Fisheries Board, and the best indication that their proposals are generally approved is shown by the fact that not a single objection has been raised to them. The one reservation which we made earlier in the week to the suggestions put forward by the Trade Review in a previous issue was upon the manner in which culling could most effectively be carried out. That, however, is a detail. The main thing is to decide that a cull will be enforced, and that the methods adopted to enforce it will be effective.

Placentia Lighted by Electricity

The United Towns Electric Co. have finished laying one thousand feet of high voltage cable, and two thousand feet of telephone wire to Placentia. Jersey Side was illuminated with electric light for the first time last night. The Presbytery and surrounding buildings will be lit up to-night. It is expected to have the lighting installed at Argenta within a few days.

No Sign of Schooner Reported in Distress

Nothing was heard to-day of the schooner reported yesterday from St. Shovel's as driving off the land. The Marine and Fisheries Department has advised shipping to look out for the disabled vessel. The department has been advised that the schr. Ethel, Delv. master, is on the passage here from Branch since Thursday last. She has about 500 gals. of fish on board for Balto, Johnston & Co.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES

LOOKING FOR REVENGE. PARIS, Dec. 23. Viscount D. Eza, former Spanish Minister of War, has arrived in Paris for the expressed purpose of obtaining an apology or satisfaction from Vicente Blasco Ibanez, the author, for what the statesman considers an insulting reference regarding him in the writer's manifesto against King Alfonso and the military directorate. The manifesto is entitled "Alfonso Unmasked." The Viscount's present plans, it is said, are to publish an article in Le Figaro calling upon Ibanez to make retraction. In the event the author declines the Viscount's friends say he is prepared to seek out Ibanez in his retreat at Mentona and publicly challenge him to a duel.

GOMPERS LEAVES \$30,000. WASHINGTON, Dec. 22. Samuel Gompers left an estate valued at about \$30,000; Samuel J. Gompers, his son and executor under his will, declared in a petition for probate of the document filed to-day in the District of Columbia Supreme Court. All of the heirs and next of kin joined in the request for probate of the property except the widow, Gertrude A. Gompers, who under its provisions would receive only the minimum allowed by the law. Attorneys for the executor asked that Mrs. Gompers show cause why the will should not be admitted to probate.

AIRMAN'S LAST RESORT FAILS. CHICAGO, Dec. 22. Trusting his life to a few yards of silk composition, his parachute, after his airplane failed to function in a blinding snow storm, Clarence Gilbert, an air mail pilot, last night leaped into space high in the clouds over the little town of Kaneville, Ill., and lost his gamble with death. His body with strands of the parachute which failed to operate still attached to his belt was found near Kaneville to-day, shortly after some farmers had found his wrecked plane with its burden of mail after a fifteen hour hunt. His death marked the first fatal accident to the band of trans-continental birdmen who since July have been winging their way across the continent in good and bad weather maintaining schedules almost to the fraction of a minute with their cargoes of mail.

NO ELECTION IMMINENT. ROME, Dec. 23. The Executive Committee of the Fascist Party has sent a circular letter to its provincial branches stating the new electorate bill in no wise indicates that a general election is imminent. It further declares that the Government's decision to introduce a bill is proof of Premier Mussolini's parliamentary security.

NO MORE PRIVILEGED PASSENGERS.

NEW YORK, Dec. 23. The leading trans-Atlantic passenger line operators have abolished the preference system, whereby socially or professionally prominent people have been able to ride the ocean in first class accommodations upon payment of staterage rates of fare.

FRANCE'S ARGUMENTS FOR PREFERENTIAL TREATMENT.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23. Jules J. Jusserand, retiring French Ambassador, told an audience here yesterday that France after a moratorium for a breathing spell could and would begin repayment of her war debt to the U.S. He made it plain however that France expected preferential treatment as compared with the terms granted by the United States to other war debtor nations, because he said France suffered the greatest loss in life and blood, the greatest in fortune comparatively, and because France was the battlefield.

CROSS-WORDS PUZZLE LEADS TO DEMANDS FOR DICTIONARIES.

BOSTON, Dec. 23. A Boston publishing house reports because of the cross-word puzzle craze, the usual yearly output of 10,000 dictionaries has grown to the monthly production of that number, which is increasing day and night and that the forces fail to keep pace with it.

ANGLO-GERMAN TREATY BLAMED.

PARIS, Dec. 23. Suggestion that commercial negotiations between France and Germany are dragging because German and English manufacturers have already concluded an alliance is put forward by Lucien Chassigne, Chief Editor of Le Journal.

**Women Want Word "Obey" Omitted Entirely**

**VIEW THAT MARRIAGE SERVICE CHANGE IS INADEQUATE—MR. SHAW'S MESSAGE.**

Should brides when they go to the altar pledge themselves "to obey" their husbands?

That is the question of the hour. The House of Clergy, on Wednesday, by a majority of thirty-one retained his phrase: "Wilt thou obey him and serve him," etc., in the question addressed to the bride, and to which she has to answer "I will."

But in the actual marriage vow the "obey" was taken out from the bride's promise, and the formula for both bride and bridegroom was made the same—"To love, cherish and serve."

The decision cannot take legal form, however, before it has been considered by the House of Bishops, who have power to refuse to submit the question to the House of Assembly.

From inquiries made by the Daily Mirror yesterday it would seem that among women there is a growing feeling that the wife's pledge "to obey" her husband could be very well omitted from the marriage service.

**EQUALITY OF MARRIAGE.**

The secretary of the Women's Freedom League said: "We think that the marriage service should be equal as between man and woman. In our view it is extremely ridiculous to ask a woman to say that she would 'obey' any man."

"A woman has her own individuality."

Other opinions received by the Daily Mirror are:

Sarah Grant, the novelist: "I think it highly desirable that the word 'obey' should be omitted from the marriage service."

Mr. Bernard Shaw: The Church should not condemn its female members to celibacy unless they make vows which they have no intention of keeping.

Lady (Agnes) Grove (traveller, writer and public speaker): Except for the supposed physical superiority of males, it is as absurd to exact a pledge of obedience from a bride as it would be to exact one from a bridegroom.

Canon Donaldson: I desire the omission of "obey" in both clauses. Mutual love and service is the Christian ideal. Obey obscures this by introducing a wrong idea inherited from ancient Roman Law.

Obey interferes with comradeship and in practice does harm. In many marriages true fellowship involves mutual submission, not obedience by one party only.

Mr. Joseph Hocking (the novelist): In my judgment, the marriage vows should be the same for a man and for a woman.

Mr. W. L. George (the novelist): The Bible entails the subordination of woman. Therefore the word "obey" in the marriage service is essential. Objectors can go to the registrar.

**HUSBANDS WITH RINGS.**

**Proposal Rejected by Large Majority—Expensive for the Poor.**

Women filled the public gallery when the House of Clergy yesterday resumed consideration of the proposed amendments to the Revised Prayer Book (Permissive Use) Measure.

The Rev. Fr. Parsons proposed to add to the form of service, "The woman may likewise give a ring unto the man in the same manner."

The Archdeacon of East Riding, in opposing, said the giving of the ring to the woman was an immemorial social custom.

To wealthy people the buying and giving of a ring was an easy matter, but in poorer places it might be a serious matter.

Permissive use that became a custom might act as a deterrent to marriage if there was a sort of obligation to have two rings.

This would be practically a decree that married men should wear a ring, and there were a very large number of men who objected to wearing rings altogether.

Canon Hether said there were thousands of husbands who wore a ring to-day who regarded it as an honour to their wives, and this proposal would give a religious character and sanction to it.

The Dean of Chester contended that the marriage ring was a symbol of much that was beautiful and represented the man's love. To introduce another ring and make the giving mutual would be to destroy the symbolism.

The proposal was defeated by a large majority.

**ANNOUNCING THE SICK.**

**Bishops Pressed to Deal with Question of Spiritual Healing.**

Canon C. E. Scott-Moncrieff sought to obtain the sanction of the House for the inclusion of an office for the "visitation of the sick."

It was pointed out that "holy anointment" (holy oil) was in common use, and it was desired to regularise it by including it in the Prayer Book.

The Rev. G. H. Hewitt urged that they should concentrate on a cult of spiritual healing, and said there was too much danger in the present practice of visiting the sick of giving up a

**"BAN" JOHNSON MUST TAKE BEATING OR RESIGN PRESIDENCY OF LEAGUE.**

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—The major league magnates met solemnly in joint session at the Waldorf-Astoria this afternoon and then adjourned to await the pleasure of Commissioner K. M. Landis, who was prevented from attending by the illness of his wife. After a long-distance telephone conver-

sation with the Judge at Rochester, Minn., the date of the adjourned meeting was set for next Wednesday in Chicago at the Congress Hotel.

The National League proposed assembling on Saturday in Chicago, but the American League held out for a day in January. Judge Landis compromised on Wednesday, and the fireworks, if any, will come off on that day.

Organized baseball rumbled today with rumors of a bitter fight at next week's joint meeting. It was said that Commissioner Landis has determined to force a showdown with Ban Johnson. It was said that Charles A. Comiskey of the White Sox would continue his onslaughts on Johnson. Finally it was said that John J. McGraw, the fiery manager of the Giants, had decided to carry the fight straight to Johnson and enlarge on his remarks at the Na-

tional League's dinner Wednesday night.

National League men freely predicted that next week's meeting would be the bitterest and most vital session ever held in baseball, with Johnson under fire from several directions. On the other hand, the American League was trying to pour oil on the troubled waters. Colonel Jacob Rupert, one of the peacemakers, told reporters that he looked forward to a quiet and peaceful session, at the same time that prominent National League magnates were informing the press that the meeting would be the stormiest ever held.

Colonel Rupert, as head of the American League's peace committee, will call on Commissioner Landis Wednesday morning in Chicago and convey to him the resolution adopted at Wednesday's session. With the Colonel will be Bernard and Shibe, fellow-

members of the committee named to bring about peace.

**No Longer "Private" Fight.**

John McGraw has suddenly come forward as the doughty battler of the National League in the bout with Johnson. Breaking a silence of several years, the "Little Napoleon" unexpectedly delivered a bitter attack against Johnson at the dinner given to National League men last night by President Heydler.

McGraw traced his feud with Johnson back to the days when John J. managed the Baltimore team in the then new American League. He described his break with Johnson and carried the story down to the present day—down to the recent attacks by Johnson on McGraw and the Giants just before the World Series.

McGraw denounced the charges as baseless and malicious, and declared he was ready for a war to the finish with the enemies of the National League.

However, he paid friendly tribute to the American League magnates and praised their efforts to work for harmony in baseball.

**No Recruits To Johnson Cause.**

Charles A. Comiskey's red-hot speech at the American League meeting was still the subject of conversation in various circles to-day. The "Old Roman" attended his first meeting in several years and delivered a sharp rebuke to Johnson and ended up with a demand that Johnson either work with Landis and for the best interests of the American League or resign his office.

**LANDIS READY TO SUE UNLESS GIVEN PROTECTION.**

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—Baseball has taken its stride to Chicago, with a committee of three carrying a peace dove. On Wednesday the joint meeting of the American and National

Leagues will reassemble, with Commissioner Kenesaw Mountain Landis in the chair.

It was reported around the hotel lobbies where magnates and managers gathered that the Commissioner also would demand a "showdown" and repeat his threat of a year ago to quit his post unless all charges made by the American League head regarding his administration are swept away and future peace assured by guarantee that the agreement under which he became the head of baseball shall be broken again. Under this agreement members of both leagues assured the Commissioner that they would not make public criticism of his actions.

**Catching Jungle Beasts Alive**

The spotted leopard which was caught in the net on the tree in the far Sumatra jungle was howling and snarling and trying to bite his way to freedom from the entanglements of the net. He was not comfortable in his mind or body, for he was practically standing on his head. It was a difficult task for the well-known wild-game collector, Mr. Charles Mayer, to lower the net, and with the help of his natives, get the leopard into a cage. It was a moment of triumph for the natives, for one of their jungle enemies had been taken alive, and Mr. Mayer tells in his book on "Jungle Beasts I have Captured" (Dobbsday, Page & Company) of the enthusiastic celebration which followed. Mr. Mayer had just a short time before he finished his wonderful net and captured the monstrous python, and his fame had spread through all Sumatra as a being with a charm which rendered him invincible against the wildest animals.

After the celebration over the leopard Mr. Mayer says that the trapping began in earnest, for he planned to get many animals for various zoos. To dig pits was the first task, and he tells how the men did it, while the women worked on the nets:

All the strongest men in the place I took into the jungle with me, to dig the pits. The work was done with Changkul (hoes) and spades. These were of Chinese make, and very good tools, too. Since we always "travelled light," we made the handles on the spot. The men whom we left at the kampong were busy all day with the making of cages and nets. The women worked on the nets of smaller mesh. These were not unlike fish-nets, and were made by a method already familiar. I paid the women well, putting the money into their own hands, not their husbands'. It was so unusual for them to make money, that they went at it with nervous enthusiasm. Even the children helped out by carrying the lighter weights and doing some of the simpler wrapping and tying.

Abdul said to me very thoughtfully: "Will the tuan give me a charm to make men work?"

"No one can carry that charm," I answered, "unless he was born in a land where the cold bites him."

Abdul sighed and stretched his arms lazily. It was a particularly oppressive day, and rest was sweet.

When every member of the fifty families composing the kampong was working at top speed, Mohammed Tye, Abdul's brother-in-law, a young man about twenty-five years old, straight, brave, and first-rate at spear-throwing—decided to show me what he could do all alone in the way of killing a tiger. The special incentive was my curiosity about a puzzling contrivance, very much in disrepair, that I had run across in the jungle. It was a double cage made of bamboo poles, sunk three or four feet in the ground. A cage within a cage was a thing I had never seen before. Between the inner and outer rows of bars there was a space of about six inches. The whole thing was at least eight feet high, eight feet long, and about four feet wide. The poles were not more than two inches apart and—a thing which struck me as odd—were placed with great care directly opposite one another. I should have expected to see them alternate. "What has been inside this double prison?" I inquired of Abdul Rahman.

"A man and a dog, tuan," he answered, "and also, on other nights, a man and a goat, the smell of a goat and his bleat both being of value." I began to see light. "He comes to hunt?" I asked.

"Yes, tuan. He comes to kill." I could see, now, the gruesome picture that Abdul Rahman's words had conjured up.

A man would come to that jungle spot just before sundown. He would bring a dog or a goat with him and a kajanang (woven palm-leaf matting) on which to sleep. He would lift several bars, loose in their earth sockets, go in and settle himself—and the animal with him—for the night, or until they were disturbed. When a hungry tiger smelled them out, the dog would bark or the goat would bleat and waken the man, if he slept. He would stand ready with his parang—his long, straight, swordlike knife; two feet of blade sharpened to a razor edge, stuck in a wooden handle. The bars had been placed opposite each other, not by accident, but to leave free play for that knife.

When the beast, driven by hunger, stood on its hind legs, as a tiger would be sure to do, its front paws against the bars, out would shoot the knife, the soft belly would be pierced, and with an upward cut the beast disembowelled.

"It is safe for the man," Abdul remarked, "and his dog or his goat comes to no harm." He added, after a moment: "If he has a good charm, no ghost or devil will hurt him, though he is alone in the night."

It took a full week to make the pits, as they had to be carefully dug so that the animals would not be hurt. The natives have a natural strong sense of drama, and seemed to think that they were playing a game, or unconsciously setting the stage for the great act, as they laid branches over the pits to conceal them, and strewed

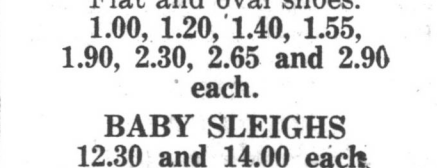
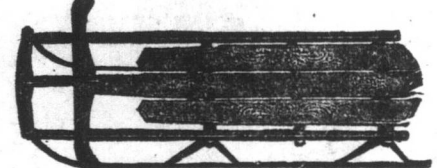

over that grass and leaves. Traps and nets were also set, and Mr. Mayer relates the exciting result of all this work:

could profitably dispose of, I went with a dozen or more men to make one last round of the section of the jungle that had yielded so rich a haul—a final "clean-up." As we were nearing one of the pits, built near a muddy drinking-pool in a break in the jungle, I suddenly heard something strange: a confusion of wild-beast cries. The sounds seemed to separate themselves into the howling of a buffalo and the snarling and coughing of a tiger.

One of the jungle tragedies was taking place, Mr. Mayer found. All wild life either preys on something weaker than itself, or is the victim, but it is seldom that man is present at such a conflict.

Abdul Rahman handed me my gun and I took the lead. The men crowded up close behind me. I moved forward slowly, very cautiously, and caught sight, at length, of a water buffalo. I settled myself on a limb with an uninterrupted view of the battle. There was sparring for time on both sides. The tiger crouched, growling, and the buffalo circled. After a few minutes of this the buffalo made a dash and raked the tiger with her horns. The tiger leaped back, sprang at the buffalo's flank, buried his fangs and then seemed to whirl away. I saw him only as a confused blur of stripes and grass.

I realized that the men about me were watching with the tenseness with which a Malay looks on at a cockfight. I heard a murmur of voices. They were laying bets.

The tiger gathered his forces, gave his coughing roar, and sprang at the head of the buffalo. The great cow met this onslaught with thick neck bent. The force of the impact sent her back on her haunches. She shook her horns, but the tiger clung to her head as if he had been part of it. With the huge cat biting and clawing, she struggled to regain her footing. At last, balancing on her horns the load of her terrible head-dress, she staggered to her feet. For a moment she held the tiger in the air; then lowering her head, she threw him to the earth. Slowly her knees bent, she pressed her weight of a ton and a half against his body. There was a snarl, a roar, and then a long-drawn cat-yowl. The buffalo shook her head free, snorting and bellowing. ### In the Realms of Sport

**NEXT YEAR'S FUTURITY TROTTERS GOING TO FLORIDA KINDERGARTENS.**

Many Trainers Will Follow Ben White's Successful Course by Wintering Future Competitors for \$50,000 Hambletonian Stakes in Semi-Tropics.

Prices for yearlings at last week's Old Glory horse auction in Squadron A. Armoury reflected the fact that foals of 1923 will trot for purses and stakes aggregating almost \$150,000 in the next two campaigns. The youngsters from Walnut Hall Farm were typical. Sixty-six head from this famous nursery in Kentucky fetched \$52,805, an average of \$800, or around \$100 in excess of last year's average.

If all goes well with the Grand Circuit of 1925 these colts and fillies will be eligible to compete for upward of \$60,000 as two-year-olds, and as three-year-olds the next season they may start for the \$50,000 Hambletonian Stakes in addition to the usual futurities for three-year-olds.

Unexampled Earnings in Sight. These are unprecedented earnings for colt-trotters, and every horseman in the country who owns a well-bred yearling, well engaged, is building air castles in which there are pictures of some 650 different favorites stepping down the home stretch in front of the field in the contest for what will be the largest prize ever won by a trotter. Needless to say no stone is being left unturned that may help each youngster to make the picture a reality. Many owners are sending their equine hopefuls to Florida for the approaching winter in the belief that more can be done in the semi-tropics than in the frozen North to develop the early extreme speed that will be required next summer when prizes of \$10,000, \$11,000 and \$25,000 will be in sight for two-year-olds at Syracuse, Lexington and Cleveland.

The remarkable success of Ben White's stable in the last few years is alone responsible for the migration. White, who was assistant to the late Billy Andrews, until a sunstroke cut short the career of that brilliant trainer, got his chance when Lee Axworthy, Volga and other great young trotters of the Pastime Stable were suddenly left without a trainer, and he improved it so well that he now outranks Tommy Murphy and all the rest of the professional trainers in the recent records of colt trotting.

Futurity Winners From Orlando. Wintering them and working them on the half-mile track at Orlando, Fla., White has come to the Grand Circuit in the last few seasons with such outstanding futurity winners as Jane Revere, 2:06½; Mr. McElwain, 1:59¾; Aileen Guy, 2:05½; and Sumatra, 2:07½, winning the lion's share of the important races for two-year-olds and three-year-olds.

White picked up several promising yearlings by Guy Axworthy, 2:58¾, and other futurity sires at last week's auction, and these, with others bred by his Philadelphia patron, Frank H. Ellis, will soon be making speed on their new training ground in the far South. Even in the last month of their yearling form—all trotters and runners take their age from January 1, regardless of the actual date of birth—the youngsters are not exactly raw material in the trainer's hands. Those foaled at Walnut Hall Farm, however, have not yet been broken to harness, but merely halter broken and taught to lead by the side of a saddle horse.

Harry Burgoyne, manager of the farm and breeder of Aileen Guy, the fastest two-year-old of 1924, said that she had never felt the pressure of a sulky shaft until White took her to Florida last winter.

"I broke her to harness in October," he added, "because she seemed a little high strung and would be safer jogging to a cart. But she never moved faster than a jog in harness. We gave her the fast work by leading her on a straight stretch about 600 feet long, just as we gave it to all the rest."

Broken and Shod as Yearlings. Most of the other yearlings sold at the armory recently had been broken to harness when they were weanlings more than twelve months ago. Many were also shod at that time, and some of those inclined to be double-gaited when started up may even have been fitted with toe weights to square them away. The conservative methods in vogue at Walnut Hall Farm are no longer generally followed by colt-trotters, but Mr. Burgoyne says he is convinced that buyers will bid for the yearlings with more confidence in their soundness when they have not been worked for speed in harness at that age, and he has no notion of changing the course that has always been followed.

The possibilities of intensive training and feeding yearlings from early spring until mid-summer were exemplified by Miss Stokes, dam of Thy Brooke, 1:50, the mare for which Burgoyne paid \$18,000 at auction recently to add to the band of more than one hundred broodmares kept at Walnut Hall. Ed. Willis, the negro trainer then employed by W. E. D. Stokes, her breeder, worked Miss Stokes to sulky with such success that, in August she earned a record of 2:19½—the first before 2:20 ever made by a yearling trotter. Peter Tole, at the same age, trotted for Fills in \$18, and Alredale soon afterward set the record for yearlings at 2:15¾, where it now stands.

### Make Speed by Brush System.

White and his contemporaries indulge in no such forcing process with their futurity prospects. The colts and fillies he is taking to Florida this year will be making speed gradually by the brushing system which seems to have been originated at Polo Alto Stock Farm, in California, not by its noted trainer, Charles Marvin, as many suppose, but by his owner, Governor Leonard Stanford, who had introduced it before Marvin went to work there. Slow miles supplemented by fast sprints of an eighth and later a quarter, constitute the procedure by which some of White's well-bred colts and fillies should be showing 1:10 speed under the watch for a short distance, with full miles around 2:20 before it is time to ship them north next spring. By the time they arrive at Lexington late in April the star performers of the string may be up to trotting in 2:15, or even a good deal faster, with quarters at a 2:05 gait.

Colts trained in the North are not usually up to much before mid-summer, or if they are their handlers do not ask them to demonstrate it. But they sometimes improve with wonderful rapidity when they have begun to find themselves and come to their speed. It is well known that Oettinger Brothers' great colt Guy Richard, by Guy Axworthy, had not trotted faster than 2:20 for Walter Cox when that trainer shipped him from Goshen, N. Y., to Cleveland late in June last year. Yet the youngster came on so rapidly that he was able to beat White's best two-year-old, Mr. McElwain, and win the fastest race then on record for one of his age by the time he reached Lexington in October.

Native Belle's Rapid Progress. When Tommy Murphy had Native Belle, the first two-year-old to beat Arion's long-standing record of 2:10¾, she had never been harnessed until April of the season in which she set the record at 2:07½ in winning the Kentucky Futurity at Lexington. She was bred by L. V. Harkness at Walnut Hall Farm and her only schooling as a yearling consisted in leading her to halter by the side of a saddle horse.

Joe Serrill, who has developed more futurity winners and trotters that beat 2:10 as two-year-olds than any other trainer in the North or the South, starts work with the yearlings by Dillon Axworthy, 2:10¼, in November, jogging them from three to five miles every day when the weather is fair at his farm track near Philadelphia.

In the spring when they are two-year-olds, he begins to make speed by driving them miles around 3:00, and then increasing the clip two or three seconds a week, with some fast eighths or quarters frequently. By this method he developed such two-year-old trotters as Nellie Dillon, 2:06¾; Clara Dillon, 2:05¾; Rachel Dillon, 2:06¾; Nelson Dillon, 2:07¾; Norman Dillon, 2:07¾; Helen Dillon, 2:08¾; Sister Bertha, 2:09; Reva Dillon, 2:09¼; Thompson Dillon, 2:09¼, and Miss Bertha Dillon 2:10 all by the futurity trotter Dillon Axworthy, and all bred by Alexander B. Cox, of Paoli, Pa. Such are the possibilities of heredity supplemented by expert handling.

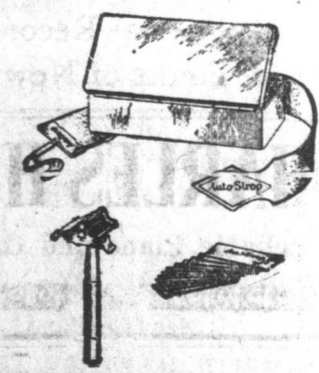

## BAN JOHNSON'S FATE IN HANDS OF LANDIS.

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—Having

spread their last resolution on the minutes, the magnates of baseball packed up and went back home to-day, leaving everything quiet along the Rialto. Garry Herrmann and his Cincinnati party were the only lingerers in the Metropolis, and this brought a report that the Reds still had hopes that John J. McGraw would take a generous turn and let them have Firstbaseman Terry.

The next move in the annual baseball war is now up to Commissioner Kenesaw M. Landis, who will have to decide before next Wednesday whether he will have the long-awaited showdown with Ban Johnson or will list to the peace overtures of the American League. The adjourned joint meeting in Chicago next week will be either the stormiest session in recent history, or the quietest, depending on the Judge's decision.

It is known now that two major leagues are at cross-purposes as far as the coming conclave is concerned. The National League wants an open meeting with the press present, and a fighting one. The American League would have the doors shut and peace and harmony within.

The younger league's attitude, as expressed to-day by one of its prominent officials, is that it will ask Landis to let Johnson be handled by his own employers. The American League magnates intend to promise the Commissioner that they will take care of Johnson themselves and they will all tell Landis that they have warned Johnson that another outbreak will mean his resignation from the league presidency.

Whether or not the war will be continued in Chicago may depend on the efforts of the American League committee, headed by Colonel Ruppert, who will call on Commissioner Landis in Chicago, Wednesday morning. At that time the committee will attempt to persuade Landis that Johnson has already been checked, that he will be good in the future, and that a show down between the two would hurt baseball and bring no benefit.

Whether Landis will listen to this plea and call off the scheduled bout is the question of the hour. The Commissioner may decide he wants peace, but not until he has spoken his mind before the magnates and league heads.

National League men were still confident to-day that they would be a battle. They insist that the American Association, the National League and the New York Club should have an opportunity to answer Johnson's accusations, and they want to do it in an open session.

## Mystery of 30,000 Loss

### VANISHED FROM SHIP.

Thirty thousand new one-dollar Trinidad notes vanished from the strong-room of the S. S. Intaba some time before she sailed from the West India Dock recently.

A box containing the notes was brought from Mount Pleasant Post Office in a guarded van and placed in the keeping of the ship's authorities. The theft was discovered by one of the ship's officers, who found that the strong-room lock of the ship, although to all outward appearance intact, had been tampered with and forced and another lock substituted.

Immediately the disappearance was discovered the ship's captain ordered a parade of the crew and telephoned to the police and Scotland Yard, who at once instituted a thorough search of the ship.

Nothing was discovered, however, and the ship, which carried passengers, sailed some hours later. Scotland Yard detectives, however, travelled on it as far as Gravesend.

## Tax on Gasoline

Will Net \$400,000

### QUEBEC REVENUE ON AUTOS EXPECTED TO BE UNCHANGED.

QUEBEC, Dec. 9.—Judging by the revenue gathered already by the Government from the gasoline tax, which was created at the last session of the Legislature at the rate of two cents per gallon, it is expected that the total amount collected for the year will reach at least \$400,000.

In some of the summer months as much as \$50,000 was collected from automobiles in this manner, but with the closing of the tourist season there has been a drop. This month it is estimated the revenues will hardly reach \$15,000.

A complete report is now being prepared by the Provincial Treasurer, and will be submitted at the coming session of the Legislature. It is expected that the revenue from motor vehicles will remain practically stationary, notwithstanding the reduction made in registration fees at the last session.

## Lake in California

Disappeared

Years ago, when the first pioneers invaded the San Joaquin Valley, in California, there was a real lake. It covered approximately 108 square miles. Geologists are of the opinion that at one time in ancient history it covered 1,000 square miles. The early settlers started reclaiming the shallow parts of the lake by levees. Later on higher levees were erected. Slowly the old lake was encroached on until it was squared and required by levees 30 feet high. The reclaimed lands were exceedingly fertile, and wheat was grown on them.

The old lake had no dry that in some places the farmers have to pump to a depth of 2,100 feet to get any water. It is so dry that no crops could be raised without irrigation.

Nevertheless, maps, those of the State and Federal Government and tourist agencies and railroads, continue to display maps which show a large blue circle, about half the size of San Francisco Bay and bearing the caption "Lake Tulare." The fact is there is no such lake and hasn't been for so long that it is difficult for the oldest inhabitant to remember it.

**Young Doctor's Vaccine**  
OVERCOMES SLEEPY SICKNESS.  
John Swift, chairman of the Prescott, Lancashire, Union Infirmary Committee, told a Daily Mail representative recently that the medical superintendent, Dr. Hay, has successfully treated two cases of sleepy sickness by inoculation.  
Mr. Swift stated that two patients treated in the ordinary way for sleepy sickness at the institution died. ## MARKET NEWS

**Codfish**—The weekly export is dwindling down, and the total this week to all markets was only 18,697 qtls. of dried codfish and 161 qtls. of haddock. The schr. Nordtrafik took out 2,322 qtls. from Barin, for G. M. Barr, to Oporto. By the schr. Nantux Messrs. Earle & Sons sent 3,209 qtls. from Pogo to Oporto. By the schr. E. Schmidt the Nfd. Labrador Export Co. shipped 2,982 qtls. also to Oporto from Pogo. By the schr. Frank P. Adams, the Monroe Export Co. exported 1,688 qtls. to Porto Rico. The schr. Retraction took 2,994 qtls. to Macao, Brazil, from the Nfd. Products Co., and the same firm shipped 2,800 qtls. to Oporto by the schr. Harriet. By the Sable L. T. H. Carter and Harvey & Co. shipped 310 qtls. to Liverpool, and by the S. S. Rosalind 2,411 qtls. were shipped to New York by various exporters, mainly for transshipment to the West Indies. The Oporto market is still in good shape, and Newfoundland stocks for week ending December 15th were down to 19,943 qtls. with the week's consumption at 3,829. This consumption, it is true, shows a falling off of nearly 2,000 qtls. from the previous week. As the absorption of Norwegian stocks advanced about 2,400 qtls. for the same week over the previous one, it looks as if they are selling at cheaper rates. Their stocks are down to 3,743 qtls. There are five small Newfoundland cargoes on the way to Oporto market, and the schr. Rasmusen has entered and the schrs. Maagon and Lady St. John are outside the Bar.

**Common Cod Oil**—Business in this article is now almost over for the season. The stocks available are concentrated with two or three strong firms in St. John's. As near as can be estimated the stocks are not excessive compared with other years, and the prospect for any higher prices depends wholly on demands from the New England States. The S.S. Digby took to Liverpool this week a heavy shipment, totalling 175,406 gallons. The English market continues dull.

**Cod Liver Oil**—Continued activity is being given to investigations, but they are necessarily very slow, and the difficulty of getting uniform results prevents a scientist from expressing their opinion as authoritatively as desired. It is quite possible that improved methods of manufacture must be resorted to before we can obtain the very highest results. There is very little news to report this week, and notwithstanding a strong tendency in prices, there are sellers ready to accept a considerable reduction to make sales. The S.S. Rosalind took out 1,017 gallons to New York and the Sable I. 150 gallons to Halifax.

**Flour**—The wheat market is very strong, and the total advance at Winnipeg the past week is seven points, as it is now around 171 for December wheat and 175 for May wheat. A flour exporter at Chicago, writing to his agent here yesterday, said: "We look for \$1.80 wheat in this market early in the new year." It now costs \$10.00, c.i.f., to land best flour in St. John's. Importers, however, are still selling at \$9.25 to \$9.50 wholesale. It looks to be a wise course for those who can afford it to buy now.

**Pork**—The market is strong and advancing. Fat Back is now two dollars over the November price in the foreign market, and is hard to get. Other grades have also advanced, but not in such a marked degree. Some dealers say that this is only a Christmas wave following fresh pork values and demand, and that prices will recede after New Year. In the local market values run from \$29 to \$36 per barrel, according to quality.

**Beef**—The market is in about the same condition as last week and prices are holding at the same level, viz., \$27 Bos Flank, \$24 Extra Family, \$21.50 Family Special and Boneless less Flanks, and \$21 Plate. As the pork market is showing some strength it is possible that beef will follow in sympathy in a short while.

**Molasses**—The Barbados new crop will be ready early in the New Year, but no big shipments will be available till March. As the crop is a good one, and sugar is going to decline, it is likely that there will be reduced prices for molasses. The local stocks are the lowest on record for this time of the year. The prices today are 95 and 87 cents for the two qualities.

**Sugar**—The dear period for sugar is near an end, and lower values are almost certain after the turn of the year. The Cuban crop is a bit late, owing to rainy weather and labor troubles, but large lots of raws will be forthcoming early in 1925. Meantime there is a local scarcity, and the price may advance over \$8.25 for a few weeks in this market, as the Christmas demand is more than available supply.

**Tea**—The foreign markets are still keeping strong in tea prices, according to recent advices from London tea houses to dealers here. Advances of from one and a half to two cents per pound has taken place in Ceylon, India and Colombo teas, and this is reflected in the London market, so that the leading high brand teas are now up to a level of one dollar per pound.

**Herring**—The Bay of Islands and Springdale fishery is working out well for the limited number of packers engaged. As the work of packing is be-

The trade is principally in P.R.I.'s, but the local farmers are also keeping their product on the market when the weather is mild enough to do so, and vying with importers to get a share of the Xmas trade. The prices are \$3 to \$3.50 per barrel of 180 lbs., and \$1.50 to \$1.80 for the half barrel.

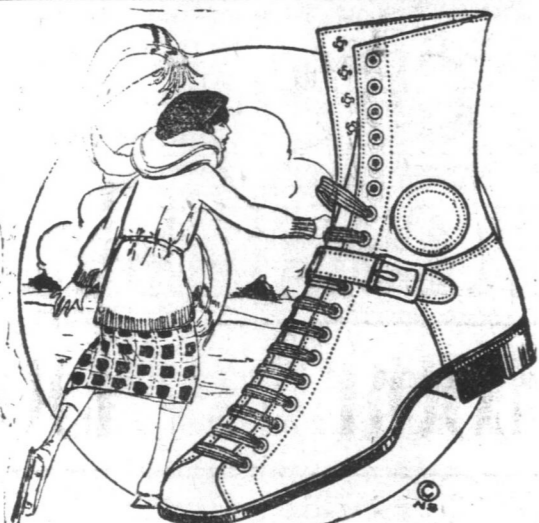

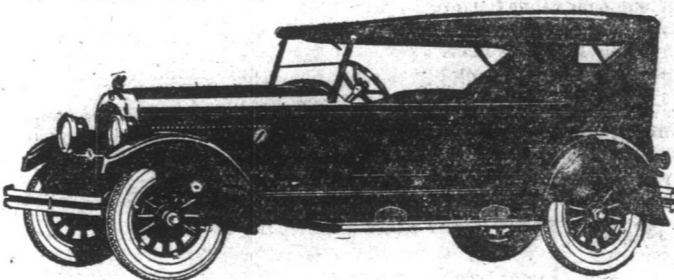
