

Not Marched Back.

Some of the Tory papers have been greatly exercised about Mr. McKim lately. The London Free Press a day or two ago asserted that after his defeat in Centre Wellington, he was seeking re-election in his old riding for the seat which he had only a few days before resigned. The Herald of this town also strikes in with its protest against such a course, and declares that when the Globe said Mr. McKim deserved to be re-elected, it had to be so, for no other course was left open to Reformers. We hope they are now both satisfied. Mr. McKim well deserved, and we doubt not would have received, the unanimous nomination if he had chosen to give his consent. But he never desired it, and would not have accepted it had it been tendered to him. The Free Press has therefore wasted its indignation, and its charge against Mr. McKim of "political calumny," "child's play," and other tricks so well known to Conservatives, falls to the ground. As for the Herald, we beg to inform that Mr. McKim has not "been marched back," and the field is still open for the irrepressible Fabry if the Tories don't choke him off, and run a better man. Mr. McKim is not the candidate, but we have a good one in the person of Mr. O'Callaghan, who will carry the North Riding by a handsome majority.

Centre Wellington Election.

A Protest Decided On.

We learn that a number of the leading Reformers in the Centre Riding held a meeting on Saturday, when it was decided to enter and vigorously prosecute a protest against Dr. Orton's election. The grounds on which the protest is made will be clearly set forth in the petition, and from what we have heard they are quite sufficient to lead to the unseating of Dr. Orton, and perhaps also to disqualify him from becoming a candidate during this present Parliament.

According to the new Act for trying contested elections, the petition must be presented to the Election Court—consisting of the Chancellor, Queen's Bench, and Common Pleas Judges—not later than thirty days after the publication in the Canada Gazette of the receipt of the return of the member elect by the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery. Security to the amount of \$1,000 to cover the expenses of the trial must be given, either by recognizance or by deposit of the amount. As soon as the petition is filed, the Clerk of the Election Court sends a copy to the Returning Officer, who advertises in the Riding that such a petition has been presented, and a copy of it is served on the member against whom the protest is made. The trial takes place within the Riding either before any of the Judges of the Superior Courts, or before the County Judge, or any barrister of good standing whom the Election Court may appoint to try the case. The Judge reports to the Speaker of the House the result, and whether corrupt practices have been committed by or with the consent of the candidate, and the names of the persons guilty of such practices.

The Premier and members of the Government are daily receiving letters from gentlemen—supposed to be in the Opposition, and who are strong supporters of the late Administration—expressing their confidence in Mr. Mackenzie, and offering to give him their support.

A Western journal indulges in a guess as to the Speakership of the new House, and recommends Mr. Holton for the position. Mr. Holton is certainly better qualified for the office than any other member in the House, but it is more than doubtful that he would accept it.

North Riding Reform Convention.

Mr. O'Callaghan Nominated for the Local Legislature.

The Reform Convention for the North Riding of Wellington met at Rothsay on Saturday to nominate a candidate in the Reform interest for the seat in the Legislative Assembly vacated by Mr. McKim. There was a good attendance of delegates from all parts of the Riding. After considerable balloting the choice fell on Mr. E. J. O'Callaghan, of Arthur, and a resolution was passed making the nomination unanimous. The candidates before the Convention were Messrs. O'Callaghan, Samuel Robertson, Harrison; James McMullen, Mount Forest; Thomas Garbutt, Peel Township; and Robt. Hay, Maryboro.

Mr. O'Callaghan accepted the nomination, and has already entered on his canvass with the most cheering prospects. He is in the prime of life, shrewd, active and intelligent, and is thoroughly informed on all the political questions of the day. He took an active part in aiding the late Mr. Foley in the election of 1867, and again in 1872; and in the late election, rendered Mr. Higinbotham and the Reform cause signal service, especially in his own Township. He will get a very large support in Arthur and in the central part of the Riding, where he is best known, and where his abilities are fully appreciated. Although not so well known in the outlying portions of the Riding, the Reformers there may have every confidence in his political integrity and steadfastness to the Reform cause, and we trust they will heartily support and work for him. There is no time to lose, for the nomination takes place on the 13th, and the polling only a week after. Fortunately the organization in each municipality is very complete, and it only remains to take advantage of them, and use them with as good effect as in the late election.

We trust that the Reformers in this election will allow no local questions to interfere with, or lessen, their efforts in securing the election of the Reform candidate. It was impossible to get a local candidate who would in all respects suit each place, and in view of this difficulty it is therefore the wisest and most patriotic course to sink all local differences, and unite as one man on the nominee of the Convention. If this is not done then the strength of the party is greatly weakened, an advantage which our opponents will not fail to profit by. We hope for better things, however, and earnestly counsel our friends in the North to go to work at once—shoulder to shoulder—and they will elect their candidate.

The Conservatives did nothing at their meeting at Arthur on Saturday. They wanted to ascertain what the Reformers would do before they brought out their man. They, therefore, adjourned their meeting till to-day, when they will assemble at Harrison to choose their candidate.

The poor old Leader, after wandering since election day among the ruins of the Conservative party, says, "all is not yet lost." What's said is not worth talking about.

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John A. Macdonald's political path is covered with the gravestones of his followers. John A. resembles Samson in at least one particular—he has slain more men at his death than he ever did during his life.

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A Western journal indulges in a guess as to the Speakership of the new House, and recommends Mr. Holton for the position. Mr. Holton is certainly better qualified for the office than any other member in the House, but it is more than doubtful that he would accept it.

The New York Times says: "The result of Canadian elections not only exemplifies the force of the reaction against corruption, which has been so prominent a characteristic of recent politics, but it furnishes a reasonably good security for the comparative purity of Canadian statesmen in the immediate future."

Enquiry having been made of the Marine and Fisheries Departments respecting the fisheries trade of British Columbia, the Minister of Justice has given a legal opinion that the production of the fisheries of that Province are entitled to admission into the United States free of duty under the Washington Treaty.

The School Bill will not come up for discussion in the Legislative Assembly for some time to come, perhaps not until the week after next, as the Attorney-General has directed correspondence to be opened with the teachers in various parts of the Province, in order to elicit their views on the proposed amendments.

NORTH PERTH.—The nomination of candidates for North Perth, to fill the seat in the Local Legislature vacated by Mr. Monteith, took place on Saturday. Mr. Jas. Corcoran, a leading merchant of Stratford, and a staunch Reformer, was nominated on the one side, and Mr. T. M. Daly on the other. Mr. Daly tried to catch stray votes by stating that he would support the present Government. The contest will be a warm one, but Mr. Corcoran is a strong man, and his friends are working most energetically.

MORE GAINS FOR THE GOVERNMENT.—There are returns from six more of the Maritime Provinces—four in Prince Edward Island, one in Nova Scotia and one in New Brunswick. The Globe says the six members from Prince Edward are all Liberals; Nova Scotia stands nineteen Government, one Opposition, and one Independent, and New Brunswick twelve Government, three Opposition, and one County to be heard from. The Maritime Provinces have thus sent only four Oppositionists among their forty-three members. Only fifteen members remain to be elected,—one in New Brunswick, two in Quebec, two in Ontario, four in Manitoba, and six in British Columbia.

MANITOBA.—Contests are to take place in all four of the Manitoba constituencies. Mr. John Henderson is to oppose D. A. Smith in Selkirk, though with poor prospects of success; Cunningham meets with opposition from a Mr. Ryan in Marquette. The Manitoban considers Mr. Ryan's chances slim. In Leger Dr. Schultz will have to face Mr. Hay, a strong candidate, and the prospects are that the doctor will be left at home. Attorney-General Clarke and a Mr. La Riviere are named for Provencher. The latter, according to the Free Press, will be elected. Riel is also spoken of as a candidate. The Government will have the united support of those elected, as all the candidates pledge themselves to its policy.
