DOINGS AT CAIRO.

CAIRO, July 21—At a meeting of notables here Acush Pasha declared he did not believe the statements against the khedive. A great clamour arose, and several officere threatened Acush with violence. The chief magistrates of Gardria, Menoofis and Gahoubia, three of seven provinces of lower Egypt have been dismissed and replaced by men of Arabi's party. In the villages all Europeans are being brutally murdered, evanthe natives who acted as their servants being butchered.

THE KHEDIVE'S STATESMEN DISTRUSTED.

ALEXANDRIA, July 21—The men surrounding the khedive are regarded with great suspicion, and it may eventually be necessary to arrest several for treasonable communications with Arabi. It is feared that news of the coming of the mission from Cairo will open the door again to fresh talk of diplomacy, intrigue and procras ination.

guson and Hugh Kelly. At 8.10 last night Coroner Riddel resumed his enquiry into the cause of death of William Long on the night of July 12, at Smith's hall on the Kingston road. The room was densely packed as on the previous nights and the utmost interest is nanifested over the Don in connection

manifested over the Don in connection with the case. Mr. Hall (Fullerton & Hall) watched the case for Thomas Crozier, who as usual, was brought over from jail.

Charles Greenwood, a young brickmaker, was the first witness called by the coroner. Did not know deceased. Was in Carother's hotel on the night of July 12 at intervals from 9 o'clock until 12. Saw John Banks, James Ferguson, Samuel Cooper, Robert Swanton. Frank Peterson, John McKean, Hugh Wise, Hugh Kelly and Miss Wise and Miss Banks. Did not see a "set too" between Ferguson and Banks. Both of them were a little intoxicated, but did not see them or any other parties go to the bar and drink. At intermission I came out of Gowan hall and heard quarrelling opposite Manson's butcher shop. Saw Peterson, Banks and another young man fall in the ditch during the fight. Saw Hugh Kelly the next day and Wise the next night. When Dr. Carroll was examing Peterson's leg there were present, Thomas Crozier, Patrick Finnegan, Mrs. Wise and Mrs. Carothers and her husband.

To Mr. Hall—At first James Ferguson held the lamp while Dr. Carroll was fixing Paterson's leg. I then went home and saw no more.

Cole standing at the corner. Asked them where they were going, and my brother replied that they were going to see if they could find the fellows who struck Willie (the deceased), at the row. Heard a pistol shot before that as if from Strange street. Went down to Long's with deceased and Thomas Swanton. Cole and Banks went home. Deceased told me that four fellows overtook him at the corner and one of them struck him with a stone or something hard. He told me that the fellow who struck him at Leglie was lames Ferguson. The fire seems to have started on Water street, fire seems to have started on Water street, on the banks of the Kennebec river among the sew mills. Nice's mill, Dorne Bros. mills, Tolman & Son's mills, C. D. Lawrence & Co's sash and blind mill, Maine manufacturing co's mills and York & Co's mills are burned, and in fact all the saw mills, shops, dry houses, stables and everything on that street. The fire is now working toward the centre of the town where the depot and business stores are located.

LATER—Two furniture factories and fire dwallings have been destroyed in addition dwellings have been destroyed in addition to those previously reported; loss over \$100,000; six hundred men are thrown out of employment. The saw mills were not insured. The insurance on other buildings is light. At 12.30 the fire was nearly under control, though burning fiercely.
