At Flan-agan's lodgings a variety of explosives was discovered, besides a revolver, a false beard, and other equipments. Experts testified that the explosive material was lignine dy-namite which was not made for any legiti namite which was not made for any legiti mate purpose. Flanagan said: "It is a material similar to what shook the house of common., isn't it?" The prisoners were remanded for a week.
