ward. LONDON, Dec. 6.-Wolff, the socialist. and the Frenchman Bondurand, were arraigned in court to-day with having in their ssion explosives for unlawful purposes Kalborn, who was arrested as an accom plice, deposed that the prisoners told him

they wished to blow up the German em-bassy, that they were planning a much nore terrible explosion than that at Praed street, and at least two thousand Praed street, and at least two thousand pounds rewards would be offered for the authors. Kalborn remarked that the un-dertaking would be dangerous. They re-plied: "We have the police with us." Wolff said five persons were concerned in the matter—himself, the two Bondurands, a police officer and a Polish Jew. Wolff told Kalborn to induce a German to walk told Kalborn to induce a German to walk near the German embassy at the time of the explosion. The more people there are killed, said Wolff, the better, as the re ward would be higher. Kalborn said he was a deserter from the German army, and Wolff was one of the greatest scoundrels living. The hearing was adjourned.
