HEARD THE NEWS BRAVELY

THE CZAR INFORMED THAT HE MUST DIE.

Dr. Zacharin Is Blamed for Not Having Diagnosed the Emperor's Case Properly -The Dying Ruler Has Dictated a Far-well Message to the People of Russia-The Czar's Condition.

Berlin, Oct. 25 .- A despatch from St. Petersburg to The Cologne Gazette says that the Czar heard the intimation of his physicians that his case was hopeless with great bravery. Upon hearing that it would be impossible to save his life His Majesty ordered the settlement of the matter of succession to the Imperial throne and expressed a wish to bestow his blessing upon the Czarewitch and Princess Alix. It is the general belief in St. Petersburg that the marriage of the Czarewitch has been postponed only for a brief period and that the formal cere-monies of betrothial will take place al-most immediately.

Blaming the Doctor.

Despatches from St. Petersburg say there is a general feeling against Prof. Zacharin, who is held responsible through his mistaken diagnosis of the Czar's malady, for much of his suffering and the probable fatal termination of his illness. The Professor is charged with negligence and lack of professional skill, and the opinion is freely expressed that should the Czar die it will be because the proper treatment of his case was not begon in time.

It is said that the condition of the Czar yesterday varied between drowsiness and comparative cheerfulness. He passed an hour alone with the Czarewitch and during the interview dictated an affection ate farewell message to Russia, which upon his death will be issued to the public,

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
