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## NOTE AND COMMENT.

A Conservative daily congratulates the Militia Force upon the fact that the estimates submitted to the House this year provide for an increase of $\$ 25,000$ in the allowance ior drill pay, etc. ()ur esteemed contemporary is apparently unaware that for some ycars past the estimate for this particular purpose has been considerably exceeded, a fact to which attention has regularly been drawn by the Auditor-(ieneral. The amount now asked for is nothing more than what it has been found necessary to spend for several years past, and is no increase in fact, but merely a question of bool:-kecping, other items being decreased to adjust this apparent inerease.

General rules established to meet special cases or remove specific grievances not infrequently work more injustice than that sought to be removed. An illustration is afforded by the provision made a couple of years ago, that graduates of the Royal Military College not having joined any corps, but becoming attached for certain service at camp, should after five years be promoted from their Militia rank of I ieutenant to that of Captain. But no such step in rank is allowed those who regularw join any corps of the Militia, and the effect oi this is that graduates who have put in more than five years constant service are still only lieutenants in the absence of regimental promotion through resignation of their seniors, while others who have served only a few weeks in camp as atlached officers, have got their captaincies. The anomaly should be removed without delay.

The Manitoba Ritle Association are in the creditable position of reporting a surplus on hand, after closing the accounts for the past season, during which they were at ronsiderable cepense in meeting

liabilities of former years. The new management deserve congratulation on the satisfactory result of their unselfish effor:s, especially when it is remembered how blue was the outlook when they took hold. lluck and enthusiasm, added to a thoroughly practical knowledge of the work undertaken, make an irresistible combi nation, and when upon the reorganization the Association chose as their secretary Mr. Coulson N. Mitchell they secured a working head endowed with all these desirable qualities. That he and his associates in the work may be as successful this year will be the wish of all devotees of the riffe.

Notifications have been sent to the first twenty eligible for places on the Bisley: team, that acceptances must be sent in to the Secretary of the Jominion Rifle Association by the 15 th April, otherwise the next in order will be called upon. II: M Andrews, 5th Royal Scots, who shot as an officer on the Retired list, but has since taken his present commission, the Executive have decided that he is not qualified under the rule, and in consequence he has been passed over, the twenty-first man being thus brought into the list of those notified.

DOMINION RIFLE ASSOCIATION.
The annual business meeting of the Dominion Rifle Association was held on Wednesday, the roth inst., with the usual average attendance, although some familiar faces were missed; among whom was the late Capt. Macnachtan of Cobourg, who fur many years was a very regular attendan.
I.t.Col. Hon. G. A. Kirkpatrick occupied the chair, and on his right was His Excellency the Governor-beneral, attended by Viscount Kilcoursie, A.I).C.

The annual report having been received as printed, accepted as read, and adopted, Major Hughes, 45 th Battalion, moved the usual vote of thanks to His Excellency for his presence and continued patronage of the Association.

His Excellency in replying remarked that on glancing at the cover of the report the thousht occurred to him that the title might le aptly changed from Dominion Rille Association to Dominion Smoothbore Assoriation It was a source of regret that year after year passed without any improsement in the arm wih which the force is equipped.

It.Col. Massey moved the vote of thaniks to the Minister of Militia, whose presence at the meeting afforded much plesure to the members present, and might, he trusted, be accepted as an augury of good omen for the force, als evidencing the interest which the Mimster intended to take in eversthing connected with his lepartment.

It.-Col. the Hon. Mackenzie Bowell responded in a most felicitous strain, and recalled, amodst considerable amusement, the first occasion on which he had met the Hon. I'resident of the Association; on which occasion, acting as A.I.C. to the I). t. (i. at one of the brigade Camps, he had $b$ en detailed to convey an order to the I'resident, then commanding his regiment. Upon delivering the order he was asked to repeat it, and having done so, was asked it he could tell how to do it, to which he was forced to reply, "Lord no ; it was hard enough to remember how to deliver it."

He assured the members that whatever it was in his power to do to improve the position of the force, having due regard to the limited means placed at his dispesal, woukd be done, and he would always endeavour to secure the co-operation and approval of the other members of the Cabinct in any scheme to improve the force.

The thanks of the Association having been tendered to the Major (eeneral commandins:, Major (ieneral Herbert on ris. ing expressed his thanks to the members of the . Issociation for the kind manner in whel the mention of his name had been received. He assured them that everything the had been able to do had been not only a duty but a pleasure, and that the more he gres on and sees the deep
interest taken in their work by all ranks, the very satisfactory progress made, and the good results attained considering the limited opportunities afforded them, the greater pleasure it afforded him to work for and with the Militia of Cimada. It was the same way with the rifle shroting, and this made him all the more anxious that a weapon might be put in their hands more efficient than that with which they are at present armed.

Last year was a red letter year for the riflemen of the Deminion, not only at Bisley but at the D.R.A. also, for which he thought we owe a great deal to the Military Rifle I eague, and he was pleased to announce that he had just given authority for the winners of badses in the league to wear them when in unifurm in a similar manner to the badges won at Bi-iey or at the I) minion Rifle dsoociation meeting.

He had read with great interest the evport of Major Weston, commandant of the Bisley Team, whose recommendations were practical and of considerable value. With reference to the suegestion that the Association endeatour to doan permission for the teain to practice on the Pirbright range, he feared there would be difficulties in the way which would be hard to overcome, as the whole brigade of Guards had to do their firing on this range, and it was usually fully occupied; but if the Council determined that it would be desirable to endeavour to obtain permission to use it, he would communicate with the military authorities if the Exerutive would wish him to do so, and do his best to secure the needful permission.
It.Col. Turnbull, M.(i.A., moved, seconded by L.ieut I.auric, I.S.I., the thanks of the Association to the several dunors of prizes to the Dssociation.

Major llaiklock moved a hearty vote of thanks to I.t.Col. Koberts for his continued kindness to the Bisley Team of 1Syt. Major blaiklock stated that on the arrival of the team at Cambridge they found that no arrangemenis zohatiometer had been made for their board or lodging, and they were indebed to Col. Roberts for most unremitting kindness and attention in endeavouring to secure suitable quarters for them, as well as in granting them the use of the Cambridge University rifle range ior practice during the week preceding the bisley mecting.
I ieut. Sutherland mowed that inasmuch as the National Rille Assoctation anthorities have determined to epen their matehes under certain restrictions to ratired volunlecrs, and it is usual for our 1. R. A. to follow in the footsteps of the parent insticution, that provision be made by the Council in this year's prosramane for the admission of retired voiunteers to all matches under certain restrictions to be imposed by Cummil. Major Blaiklock moved in amendment that Mr. Sutherland's motion be received as notice of motion for next annual meiting, in order that a full discussion of the matter might
be had at the competitors' mecting and the views of those most interested aseertained before action is taken in the matter. The amendment was adopted.

Captain O'(irady announced that Mr. ]. W. Mekae, President Othwa Electric Street Railway, Mr. J. R. Buoth, lumberman, Otiawa, and Mr. I. X. St. Jacques had each announced their intention of contributing $\$ 50$ to the funds of the Ass . ciation, and that Captain S. Maynard Rogers, 43 rd Bat. O. \& C. R., had given $\$ 40$ for the same purpose.

The election of officers followed and resulted in the re-election of the l'resident and Vice-Presidents, as last year, with the exception of Lt.Col. Dilan (ilmour, who is replaced by la.-Col. J. M. Gibson as Vice-President for Ontario.

The Council, with one or two exceptions, is much the same as last year. The most notable change is the clection of 1,t.Col. Henshaw as a representative from Quebec, and his subserpuent choice as Chairman of the Council in succession to L.Col. Hon. J. A. ()umet, who had expressed his desire to be relieved of the position.

Notes of rile mbeting.
It felt as if a portion of the routine proceedings had been omitted when the Deptaty Minister of Militia, who has always taken a deep interest in the welfare of the Association, was not called upon to apolegize for the absente of his Minister.

His Excellency the (iovernor-(ieneral and the Major Gencral are entiled to very warm corners in the hearts of all Militiamen for their unceaving efforts to stir the Government into providiag more modern arms for the use of the force than the old gas pipes now in their hands.

Colonel Mackenaic lowell is winning golden opinions in his new portolio. Militia officers from a distance who had business to transact with the Department weee astounded to find that it wats posible to obtain definite and decisive answers inside of 48 hours.

The I). A (i. of Military District No. $z$ was, we think, the only officer present from points west of Ottawa who came to the city specially for the meeting. This does not evidence great interest on the part of western riflemen in the proceedings and ought to be remedied. Hamiton used to send two very favourite faces, I:Col. Cibson and Mijor Mason, but of late years we have missed them, and no one seems to replace them.

The Executive had a long discussion as to whether or not lieut. Andrews should be allowed a place on the Bisley team. He shot as a Retired Officer Then taking a commission in the 5 th Rogal Scots, his appointment was antedated to a time before the matches. The rule is that Retired Officer are ineligible tor lisley, but because his commission had been antedated an unsucesssful attempt was made by personal friends on the Executive to have him declared eligible.

## THE DOMINION ARTIILERY ASSOCIATION.

T're annual meeting of the Dominion Artillery Association was held in the Ciower Room of the House of Commons, on Cloursday, $17^{\text {th }}$ March, commencins at 12.15, with a very sim attendance. The president, Lt.-Col. Stevenson, was in the chir, and among those present were: His Excellency the Governor General and Capt. Walsh, A.I.C.. ; I. .Col Hon. Mackenzie Bowell, Minister of Mlitia; Major-(ieneral therbert, Commandens the Militia; Col. Walker Puwell, Adjutant( General ; Col. C. E. Panet, Depuis-Minister ; I.t-Col. Irwin, Inspector of Artillery; Capt. Domaldson, secretary : It.Col. Hon. (ien. A. Kirhpatrick, M.I.: L.t.Col. F. (. I Enison, M.I'. ; I.-Col. E. (i. Prior, M.P.; It.-Col. ()ter, I).A.(i.; L.t.-Col. Turnbull, M.G.A. ; Maj.r Cole, $\because$ (i.A. ; 1.t.Col. folen Macphersen ; Capt. Biss, O. F. li.: Licut. (iilmour, O.F.R.: Dr. K. J. Wickstecd, and Mr. J. I). Taytor. The procecdings opened with an address from the chairman, who in moving that the report as printed and presented be taken as read, expressed regret at the small number of officers present. This might be because of the general satisfaction with the manner in which the affurs of the Association ware co:du ted, or to a feeling of indifference, but if the later were the canse it was certainly confined to the attendance at the meeting, as during the year great interest had been shown in the practical working of th:: Association. Col. Prior seconded the resolution in a brief speech in which be expressed his conviction that the small attendance was by no means due to indifference to the welfare of the Assoriation. The motion was carried.

l.t.e ©ol. Irwin, as Chairman of the Fxecutive, mored the adoption of their report, and dwelt brieny upin each of the subjects there dualt with. With respect to the range tinding practice, which it is proposed should be continued next season, he said that whilst in former yoars, with the smooth bore guns in use and the targets plandy visible, very careful laying was not a necessity, the afoption of rilled guns has made the case entirely different, the ranges being so great that the most carefui observition is called for. The Domin,ion Association hod in a humble way endeavoured to imitate the example of the Royal ditillery, and commencing with range linding practice with one gun, they had gone on to two, and then the whole battery.

The eompetitive giln practice at Kingston had been carried out with good results.

Thd drill and driving competition was also exceedingly well carried out, and the beautiful rup) offered by col. sir Casimir (izowski had been finally won by the Jurham lïeld Battery, as winners two
years in sucression. They richly deserved the victory, their record for several years baving been exceedingly high.

Wibh respect to the (iarison Artillery practice, usually carried out at the Island of Orleans, a change was proposed with a vinw to meeting the claims of the Maritime Province gumers for a meeting nearer home. L.c-(ol. Montizambert, Assistant Inspector of Aitillery, had examined the range available at Bedford Basin, Hatifas, and having found it in every way suitable for sarrison sun practice it was proposed that next ye.res mectiog should be there. Col. Ry in and the other officers of the Imperial troops at that station had promiscd to do all prisible to assist an cartying out the arrathements; and the expected tacolites for praciace with the modern improved guns of the lmperial garison would be: in indacement to the Ontario and gurbec members to visit Halifax

The field battery practice would it wa hoped be carried out next season as usual.

A deplorable and fatal accident had occurred at the shiting ordnance competition at the foland cf Orleans, Int this was the finst areident sinee the meeption of these e mpetitons, and was the single exception to the rule that when properly conducted they are quite sate. The accident combld not have been foreseen and no one coold be held blameworthy.

The Bfflexac schand:
As to the effitioncy competitions be rould not speak too highly of the eroed effects they had upon the whole artiitery force. His lixallemer had been kind enousi to comtinue his presentation of cups, and they were the objerts of the areatest emulation. The eredits in these competi ions had been doubled in value, in order to assist the in-perting officers in making their awods relatisely accuate, and the phan had worked well. A specially noteworthy fact was the manner in which the guestoms were answered by the members of the leading batteries, showing a thorough study of the subjects.

The priee list had been increased by \$304, making a wal of $\$ 1,3.3+$ offered last year, besides which all hat heen paid for the time spent in camp in conner:ion whit the competitions.

Capt. Bhas seconded the resolution, and the remon was then adopted, and the accounts as andited were pansed.

l.t.e.o. Tarnhall mowed a we of thanks to llis $\because \mathrm{x}$ efleney the desermon. (ieneral. He felt that this monion repree sented the entiments of the Artillere all over the combtry. who had moned with great satisfactom the interest His Dixedleney had taken in the meetinsial Orleans and clsewhere. I.e.e ©o. J.han Marpherson secombed the resolution, and it was carried by a tising vote.

Lord Staniey of Breston in reply thanked the moyer for the kind words just spoken, and said that whateyer effort; he had made in connection with the artillery meetings had occasioned him sincere plegasure: On every occasion except one lince he had come to Canada he had attended the meeting at Orleans, and his impression was always fayourable: The Camp Commandant and Quartermaster were entitled to great ciedit for the arrangements made, and the range itself could not be improved upan in that part of the popptry. He was glad to hear that a concession was to be pade to the Garrison Artillery of the Maritime Provinces, in the way ot holding the next meeting at Halifax: He felt quite sure-and General Herbert would hear him out-that the Regulars there have eyery desire to facilipate the camp arrangements: Sir John Ross had expressed his willingness to give ppportunities for practice with the jmproved gyns at Halifax, and anything sanctioned by the authorities he pould gladly carfy out.

Since the last meeting of the Association, there had been a change in the office of Minister of Militia, a gentleman well known as the most efficient head of anpther department haying been placed Where he could be of immense advantage to the militia force. He was glad to see the new Minister present, and would direct his attention to the small appropriation for riffed ordnance made every year, though no advantage was taken of it. He would not advise any but the most cautious investment in this connection, but thought we should have the most improped guns of position. If, hawever, pur present weapons are not as perfect in equipment as they might be, practice with them is of great adyantage and he trusted it would not be neglected during the coming year.

The field tatteries so far as he had seen pad maintained an excellent record, and he congratulated the Durham Battery upon their exceptionally proud position. As to the Association generally, so long as the spirits now inspiring prevails, it could claim and should receive the utmost attention from all gaod citizens.
fhe minisfer of militia.
Major Cole maved a vote of thanks to the Covernment, to Parliament, and to the Minister of Militia ; and that Lt-Col the Hon. Mackenzie Bowell be elected a Vice-Patron of the Association. He felt sure, he said, that the new Minister of Militia would afford them all assistance in his power. Lt.-Col. Otter seconded the resolution, which was declared carried.

Lt.-Col. Hon. Mackenzie Bowell, replying, thanked the Association for the resolution, and Lord Stanley for the kind reterence made in his address. He could promise His Excellency and the head of the Cauncil that whatever advice he might tender them his desire would be to do what was best in the interest of the force.

He knew that in the days of his active military connection there were very great demands on its behalf, and he anticipated that in this as in the Customs Department the demands would be rather more than could be granted. He invited, however, representation of all desires, and if any could not be granted he would frankly tell them sa, and why (applause). This he had found to be the better way for all concerned On the suhject of weapons, he thought it highly desirable that the best arm procurable strould be had for each branch of the service, and he should da his best to render the Artillery and the whole force as effective as possible.

## A New RULE:

In accordance with notice given lt.Col. Irwin moved the following resolution affecting the Rules of the Association :"That the following be made a rule : 'Officers wha campete for prizes must be life ar annual subsscribers to the Assaciatign.'"
He desired also to make an explanation which would bave been made by Major Stewart, the Preșident of the Ccuncil, had he been present. This related to the reference to the Morris tubes, which the Council had reparted as not forthcoming. These, he was happy to state, had been received, and were now ready for issue to those field batteries in a position to make intelligent use of them. The duck suits also had been received, and would be isshed in time for this year's dill.

The motion carried, after endorsement by the chairman, who said he would like to see every officer a subscriber to the Association.

Capt. Donaldson moved a vote of thanks to the Hamilton Powder Co , for their continued donation of $\$ 100$ to the funds of the Association, and that Dyight Brainerd, Esq., be elected a life member. He wished it particularly noted that this was the ouly mercantile firm contributing to the funds. The resolution carried.

## the presidency,

General Herbert moved that L.t. Col. Curren, H.G.A., be elected President for the coming year. This choice, he pointed out, would be particularly apt in view of the intention to hold the next Garrison meeting at Halifax. As the Maritime Provinces furnish so large a proportion of the competitors and the Halifux Brigade is one of the most efficient in the Dominion it would be a graceful act this year to move the meeting down to Halifax. He knew there would be no difficulty about the arrangements. There were at Halifax some of the most modern specimens of artillery, and this opportunity of seeing the really scientific application of artillery knowledge would give a decided impetus. to our force.

## the general's rfcommendations.

He thought it not out of place here to make some few remarks on the Canadian Artillery in general, and its efficiency,
which he the $u$ ght was largely due to this Assaciation. As he tiad already intimated in a General Order, be considered the Artillery the roost efficient arm in the Hominion, and this he at:risuted to the system of inspection carried wut $i, 1$ connection with the wark of the Dobilion Artillery Association Insjecti on had thus been prevented from degenerating into a mere parade and march pait, for while the effect of inspection - what is cffi iency and what is not-had been largely lost sight of in many instances, such wis not the case here. Even here, however, he considered that too much inportance had, been attached to some things and not enough to others-for instance, discipline and interior economy appeared to be slighied-and he had discussed with the Inspector plans for improvement, with the result that he thought they had struck upon a plan for keeping the ledgers in better order, thus securing that the batteries should get their equipment in proper time, He blumed the officers of the batteries for the hitherto faulty administration which had permitted the matter of equipment to be neglected until the last moment.
the perion for drill.
In the Repart of Council, at Paragraph 8, he noticed a strong recommendation that a longer period than twelse days should be allowed for the annual c'rill of the Artillery, This he could not support, so long as he saw a thisd of the Militia not drilled at all. He would, however, recommend the grant of pay by the Department to such detachments as go into camp far practice under the auspices of the Association. Personilly, he would like to see the perıod of drill increased, but feared this could nat be done; the other he thought could be done.

## THE YICE-PRESIDENTS,

Lt.-Col. Prior, M.P., sec noled the motion and the election of Lt.-Col. Curren as President was unanimously carried, Lt.-Cols. Armstrang, Prior, and Turnbull were re-elected Vice-Presidents, and Lt.Col. Moore, P. E. I. G. A., was elected a Vice-President in place of $L t$. - Col. Curren, Lt. Col. Stevenson, Capt. W. McCrae, and Capt. B. C. F. Bliss were elected members of Council.

Capt. Bliss moved, and Lieut. Gilmonr secorided, a vote of thanks to the Auditors, Lt. Col. John Macpherson and Mr. F. E. Knight, which was carried unanimously.

## the retiring presinent.

The chair having been taken by Lt. . Col, Tu:nbull, a vote of thanks to the retiring President, Lt.-Col. Stevenson, was moved by Lt.-Col. Irwin, who feelingly referred to the various capacties in which Col. Stevenson had served the Association for many years past, and the regret all felt that ill healih had caused his absence from last camp. He knew it was very:
hard for Col. Stevenson to dissociate him
self from his battery and the Association, and that they could always count upo him as a warm friend,
Li.-Col. Stevenson returned thank. He had always taken a deep interest in and appreciated the importance of the Association. He was glad that his suc cessor was an officer from the Lower Pro-. vinces, and hoped that Col. Curren would be able to ins, ire greater interest in the Association there. Sceing that His Excellency, the Officer Commanding, and the Minister of Militia, had found time to be present on this occasion, he thought the Artillery officers generally might be aroused to the necessity of devoting one day in the year to the business of the Association, He called upon the press to make a note of this-if indeed General Herbert would not issue a General Order on the subject. (Laughter.)

The metting then adjourned.
COUNCIL MEETING.

The highest authori ties in Jinglat dagree in saying that the college course is superior theorelically and practi.ailiy th that of Woolwich and Sandhurst. This is proved by the fact that young officers, who enter the Royal Enginecrs, invariably pass through Chatham in a shorter space of time than their Woolwich brethren. The General stated that he was of opinion that all staff appointments in Canada should be given to graduates of the Rogal Military Colloge In support of his argument he would refer his hearers to the liat parastaph in the regulations for the R.M.C., whel athough it had the sorce of an order in comand, -till was ignored entirely and was practically a dead letter. In conclusion, the (iencral regretted that he could not, for varions reasons, accept the honour tendered him of becomins honorary president of the club, and atier thasking the memters of the club for the courtery done him be retired amid srat applatuse.
