Proceeding Mr. Wainwright said the general fundamental principle underlying the law of marriage, was that the one great essential was the common consent of the two contracting parties. By a process of gradual evolution the necessity of some outward formalities, was made imperative, but simply to be admitted as proof of the existing contract. There was no need of any authorities on the point, as under the Roman law the common consent of the two parties was not only a sign of marriage, but was of the very essence of marriage, in fact the consent constituted marriage.

MORE CLUBS THE BETTER SAYS MRS. PANKHURST

Argument of Anti-Suffragists Refuted by Work Canadian Women Societies Are Doing.

A large and enthusisastic audience of the members of the Women's Canadian Club greeted Mrs. Pankhurst when she addressed the club yesterday afternoon in the Jecture hall of the Young Women's Christian Association.

Mrs. Pankhurst first referred to the formation of clubs for women as being a factor in disproving the statement so often made concerning women in the past that they were not loyal to one another, but the existence of many clubs in Canada and the United States for educational purposes, the study of social science, etc., proved that women's sense of responsibility was keenly awake.

sense of responsibility was keenly awake.

In England, Mrs. Pankhurst stated, women's clubs were yet in their infancy. The ones that exist are for purely social purposes.

A strong argument of the Anti-Suffragists, Mrs. Pankhurst said, was that the vote for women would lead to a large number of clubs coming into existence, but, judging from the work they were doing on this side of the water, it appeared that even if they did no harm would be done.

Mrs. Pankhurst referred to an article in a Montreal paper which stated that 20,000 men had been deprived of their vote because they had not paid the water rates in time and therefore could not register, but women continue to pay the water rates regularly but never have the chance to vote at all.

Mrs. Pankhurst spoke forcibly and movingly upon the great necessity of more and better legislation affecting such vital questions to women as the white slave traffic, child labor, the proper remuneration of women workers, in all of which it was vitally important that women's voice and views should be heard.







FAVOR WELLAND CANAL,

BERGIN, Dec. 13.—At a meeting of business men here to-day D. B. Detiweller introduced the question of ocean navigation up the St. Lawrence and the great lakes. Mr. Detweller has investigated the proposition for some time and considers his proposition better than the proposed Georgian Bay Cana, which has been suggested for some time by English contractors.



One might well ask, "Can this child possibly live?" It has a chance. But such a thing is not at all probable, tho, Judging from the vigorous thump of the heart at the present time, one would be inclined to think it might grow to maturity. Nevertheless, no medical men entertain the thought that it will survive for any length of time.





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Classes Unscrupulous Mining Men With Meanest Perjurers-Appeals For Accuracy.

"Do for Canada and the world at large your very best. You can only do this if you are as honorable as you are accurate. 'Pretty near' is not near enough. It is 'pretty near' that builds Austen, Pennsylvania, dams and similar engineering failures. It is 'near enough' that is killing and maining Canadians every day. The engineer

enough' that is killing and malming Canadians every day. The engineer must be accurate."

Justice Riddell made the appeal at the Engineers' Club yesterday. His address was one of the mest inspiring Canadian engineers ever listened to.

"The only pleasure worth while," said his lordship, "is intellectual pleasure, and the true engineer is the one who takes most pleasure in his work. The utilization of the raw material nature gives him represents the engineer's translated thought.

"Engineers usually make the best expert witnesses," he continued. "But men of high standing sometimes full in this respect.

So-called mining engineers claim ability to see clearly with the naked eye, velns which neither the mine owners nor anyone else see with a microscope. Lord Bramwell's story at the expense of his brother, Sir Frederick Bramwell, one of the cleverest of British engineers, is rather apropos. "There are three distinct types of liar," said the eminent jurist. The first is the ordinary liar, the second the d-m liar and the third is my brother Fred.' I am glad Canadian engineers are not in the 'my brother Fred' class, The unscrupulous mining engineer deserves to be treated no better than the meanest perjurer in Kingston Penitentiary."

Capt. Killaly Gamble, president of the club, presided and Dean Galbraith of the faculty of applied science, University of Toronto, 'added a word to the vote of thanks.

T. and N. O. Railway Has Made Rapid Strides During Past Year.

Great increases in the receipts of the Timiskaming and Northern Ontario Rallway are reported by the provin-

During the month of September the net earnings of the government railway amounted to \$75,814, as compared with \$21,604 during September, 1910.

The gross receipts for September, 1911, were \$200,317, against \$119,072 during September of last year.

The gross revenue of the T. and N. O. Railway from Nov. 1, 1910, till Sept. 30, 1911, amounts to \$1,563,646, as compared with \$1,480,318 during the corresponding 11 months previous.

After all expenditures have been deducted, the net revenue of the government railway from Nov. 1, 1910, till Sept. 30, 1911, is \$492,822.

Last year it was \$384,841.

Max Schultz, an English ship broker, was sentenced to seven years' penal servitude. One of his associates, an engineer named Hipsich, was condemned to twelve years in tail; another engineer named Wulft was sent to jail for two years; a merchant named Von Maack and Max Schultz's housekeeper each received three years.

Max Schultz was accused of using his profession as a ship broker as a covering for corrupting shipyard workmen and getting them to betray German naval secrets. He was for a long time closely watched by detectives during his frequent trips between Hamburg and Bremen, at which ports ten German warships of different types were at the time under construction.

Clique Broken Up.

The judge in sentencing the accused said that their arrest had I roken up a group of spies, whose activities were dangerous in the highest degree to the safety of the empire. Hipsich particularly, who had been twelve years employed as an engineer in one of the principal naval shipyards, was able to collect designs and information from all the German yards. This he delivered in January last to the agents of an English information bureau thus exposing Germany's most important military secrets.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-

WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

A NY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba. Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on centain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by nim or by his father, mother, son, caughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside aix months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.


