Conditions Handed to M. Witte Include "Reimbursement" for Cost of War and Withdrawal of Russian Power From Eastern Sea.

Portsmouth, N.H., Aug. 10.-Reimbursement for the expenses sustained in the prosecution of the war and the cession of the Island of Sakhalin constitute the main features of the peace conditions handed by Baron Komura to M. Witte at the conclusion of the morn. ing session of the plenipotentiaries here. The word "indemnity" is care fully avoided, the term being employed being "reimbursement" for the cost of the war. No sum is fixed, the amount being distinctly adjourned for mutual conditions known.

The Russian correspondents here are not optimistic as a result of the disclosure of the Japanese terms. They adjustment between the two countries after the Japanese expenditure has been ascertained. They telegraphed their papers to-day a pessimistic view of the outlook for peace, taking the position that the Japanese demand as to Sakhalin and indemuity were excessive and such as Russia, in the present circumstances, was not forced to yield to all-important conditions, and those which the Russian plenipotentiaries

Certainly the danger of a sudden rupture, no matter what the ultimate result may be is precluded by to-day's developments.







Commissioner's Report Shows Strides Made in Bridge Building and Road Making in Past Few Years

Farmers and others all over the province will be interested in the ainth unual report of the commissioner on highways, which Mr. Campbell has ready. It deals pretty fully with the 60,000 miles of roadways (exclusive of streets in towns and cities) in the Province of Ontario. These roads have cost millions and will cost millions All-wool Kilting Cloths

Statute labor has been superseded in more than 25 per cent. of the townships by a system of commutation or in some cases the statute labor work is abolished more than 25 per cent. of the townships by a system of commutation or in some cases the statute labor work is abolished and a special rate levied with the township rates. There are differences in detail, but the general plan is to appoint an overseer for the township. The county method of management is the same on general principles and the government is provided to the extent of half the cost of construction, the counties which have adopted the plan being Wentworth, Wellington, Simcoe, Lanark, Oxford, Lincoln and Hastings, while Victoria and others are on the eve of doing so. The actual oversight of the work on the ground is deputed to road foremen and overseers, with a commission exercising general oversight for the whole county. Under the highway improvement act county councils covering 20 per cent. of the province have adopted county systems, taking over 1624 miles of main road and expending thereon in the years 1903-04 nearly half a million dollars.

Modern methods of road censtruction demand for economical and efficient work the use of machinery. The principal of these grading machines are in general use, very few townships being without one or more. Cost 11 grading and repairing has been greatly reduced,

Drainage is the matter of fist importance, and every attention is given to keeping open the surface drains, placing the drains where under drainage is needed and carrying these to frequent outlets where the water will be removed along natural water courses. Bridges are being built with steel superstructures, concrete abutments and concrete floors. Culverts are being made of tile or concrete arches. The use of permanent material, while greatest at first cost, is a measure of economy in a term of years. Road improvement is now progressing in long stretches, where heretofore work was done in patches.
