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NO USE FOR YANKEE SILVER.

Montreal Bankers Will Refuse to Take It as Well as Silver Certificates.

CANADIAN COINAGE IS SUFFICIENT.

Montreal, Aug. 5.—(Special)—The bankers of Montreal, so says Mr. Chipman of the clearing house, will soon take prompt action regarding American silver on the side of the line. It appears to be the intention of the banks to refuse not only the silver, but silver certificates as well. The theory that American silver coins are necessary for trade purposes is exploded by the fact that the vaults of the banks of Montreal are full of Canadian silver, and the Canadian bankers affirm that the annual sum of \$100,000 coined by the Canadian Government is quite sufficient for purposes of trade and consequently there is no need of the American article. It is held that the total amount of silver in circulation here, no less than twenty per cent. of it is American, and it now appears to be time to rid the Dominion of such foreign nuisance.

This strike gives additional faith to everything in Made Criso. It now seems to be almost certain that the option held on War Eagle at the price of one million dollars will be taken up. If so, the property will go to London.

FREE GOLD IN EVERY RIVER

Engineer Jennings Has a High Opinion of British Columbia. Ancient River Courses Said to Have Lots of Gold—Other Sections Besides Kootenay—That are Rich in Gold and Silver—Intelligence and Capital Will Produce Excellent Returns in British Columbia Mines.

A World reporter yesterday interviewed Mr. W. T. Jennings, late City Engineer on the mining situation in British Columbia. During the course of the interview Mr. Jennings said: "There is no doubt British Columbia is very rich in the precious metals, such as gold and silver. It only requires intelligence, industry and capital to develop the gold and silver mines of British Columbia. Undoubtedly the Kootenay District, in which Rossland is situated, and which is now attracting so much attention, especially in gold and silver. There are, of course, many other sections which in the near future will be equally as valuable from the mining point of view, as the Kootenay country—especially in the matter of hydraulic mining and otherwise working the widely distributed gravel banks for the free gold contained in them. River bed, bar and bench mining can be carried on to almost an unlimited extent. The season for this class of work, however, is limited to five months in the year, according to the elevation of the district. Undoubtedly gold will be found in the gravel banks deposited in various sections of the country, as exemplified near Clinton, Dr. Dawson's Ashcroft, on the C.P.R. The presence of gold in these areas has been frequently pointed out, and is widely referred to by Prof. Selwyn, ex-director of the Geological Survey of Canada.

"Deep mining for gold in old river channels will also, it is reasonable to suppose, be successful. This has been satisfactorily demonstrated in the Cariboo section, as well as in many other parts of the world, including the Rand in Africa. So far, want of capital and want of intelligence have prevented the development of this class of mining, which is fully expected will yield out the expectations of the present director of the Geological Survey, Dr. Dawson, who believes that gold in paying quantities exists in many old channels now filled up with gravel and detritus. Shafts were sunk through this detritus to the bed rock, and deposits of gold were found. In the Cariboo section, the admirable maps issued by the Geological Department, and the excellent engineering and prospecting can very readily locate numerous ancient courses, and with the necessary capital, it is soon verified. Dr. Dawson's prognostications. I have been through much of British Columbia, at various times since 1875, and I can say without hesitation that there are traces of gold in every river in that province.

IMPROVEMENT OF TORONTO HARBOR. Before another dollar is spent in dredging and improving the western entrance into Toronto harbor, the question of abandoning that entrance altogether ought to be seriously considered. In 1883 Capt. Eads was commissioned to report on the location of permanent entrances into the harbor; one from the east, the other from the west. His recommendation in regard to the former was adopted. The construction of the Eastern Gap, as it is called, was an event which proved a wise undertaking. If that channel had not been constructed, the passenger business between Toronto and the various points on the lake would have been frequently interfered with, both last year and during the present season. Several of the larger boats are frequently unable to enter the harbor by the western channel, and are obliged to anchor in the Eastern Gap, thereby lengthening the time of the voyage from that city to Toronto by twenty minutes. It is quite evident from what we have said that the construction of the Eastern Gap, which has been in progress for the past couple of years that something will have to be done to afford a better entrance from the west. The existing channel has been dredged to a depth of three feet at a cost of \$125,000. When he inspected the harbor Capt. Eads noticed the presence of a rock in the channel, and he advised the cutting of another channel some 1400 feet to the south. At this point the rock is considerably lower than in the immediate vicinity of the Eastern Gap. If we had not cut a channel, on Capt. Eads' location involves no rock cutting at all. Competent engineers estimate the job can be completed for less money than it will take to deepen the present channel three feet. If the new channel were made, we would then have a permanent entrance similar to the Eastern Gap. It should be borne in mind that the water in the lake is gradually becoming lower, while the canals are being raised, and a bicycle made of vessel is demanded for the lake traffic. Looking at the requirements of the future, it will be foolish to spend more money on the present channel. It is better to build a new one. It would provide adequate facilities for vessels at all lake and river harbors. Thousands of dollars are expended in harbor improvements all over the country where very little shipping is carried on, while the greatest difficulty in getting the Government to provide even such accommodation as is absolutely necessary. The city had to contribute \$100,000 towards the construction of the Eastern Gap. If we had not contributed this money the city would have been dependent altogether on the western channel, which is utterly inadequate for the traffic.

W.M. McGILL & Co. AND HE NEVER CAME BACK. HAPPENINGS OF A DAY. Items of Passing Interest Gathered in and Around this Busy City. Hon. C. Fitzpatrick, Q.C., Solicitor-General of Canada, will be one of the speakers at the North York Church picnic Saturday, Aug. 8 next. Robert Johnson, 58 Hamilton street, was arrested last night on a charge of burglarizing the premises of Mrs. T. B. Reid, 229 Queen-street West, last Monday. Charles Fox, 55 St. Vincent street, was arrested by Police Constable Campbell (200) on a charge of robbing a man from a bicycle on Monday night. Ed Kupis, the alleged crook, who was made on Aug. 10, to be paid by Mr. Abbey, pending the determination of the action. Mrs. Abbey is well known in theatrical circles. She was formerly a Miss Gerard, and her marriage with the theatrical manager took place in Boston in November, 1892. Mr. Abbey was then a widower. The affidavit sworn to by Mrs. Abbey states that her husband abandoned her on April 25, 1896, leaving her in destitute circumstances. Since then she says he has contributed nothing to her support. When he went away from her it was on the pretense of taking his daughter by his former wife to Long Branch for a few days, but he never returned.

LUMBER YARD ON FIRE. Five Thousand Dollars Damage at Reid's Coal and Wood Yard—Gooderham's Property Endangered. For over four hours last night the fire from the central section of the Reid yard burned hard at a hot blaze on the premises of the Reid Coal and Wood Yard, at the foot of Berkeley street. The fire, which was caused by a match, spread and made a fierce conflagration. It was at 1:45 the alarm was turned in from box 212. When the firemen arrived the whole of the immense coal shed was a mass of fire, which had apparently originated at the south end of the shed. Flying sparks fell from the roof of the kitchen of Gooderham's residence at Trinity and Mill streets and an alarm was sent from the Gooderham box No. 24, which brought more firemen to the scene, but only small damage was occasioned at the Gooderham residence. Owing to the hold the main fire had obtained and the nature of the surrounding buildings, and its close surroundings, the firemen had a very tough job to handle. From the first it was clear that the coal shed could not be saved, and special exertions were made to keep under the fire which had spread to the stores of hard wood piled in contiguous to the shed. A large quantity of this material was destroyed, and not a remnant of the big shed left, save a few charred uprights. At one time the wharf was on fire and the coal blazing. Fortunately, the wind blew strongly from the south-west and this prevented the fire spreading to the adjoining yards of the Reid yard. The Reid yard is a large lumber yard, and the firemen were carrying by the stiff breeze on to the great distillery and the firm's home was played on the roofs. Thick volumes of smoke were carried westward and charred splinters were borne by the breeze as far as the baseball grounds. A great crowd collected on the railway lines and on the wharves adjoining that of the Reid Company. At times the fierce flames shot aloft far above all surrounding buildings. The heat in the yard was terrific and there were several configurations at the same time. From boats in the bay and the Niagara canal, a grand view was had of the big conflagration. There were enough men there to keep their premises safe from flying sparks by turning on their fire engines and playing the hose all over the buildings nearest to the big blaze and keeping their docks wet. Two Small Fires. A small blaze in Hancock's engine house, Bloor and Dundas streets, caused trifling damage at 7:05 a.m. A vacant space on Funston street was set on fire shortly before noon and \$40 damage occasioned. 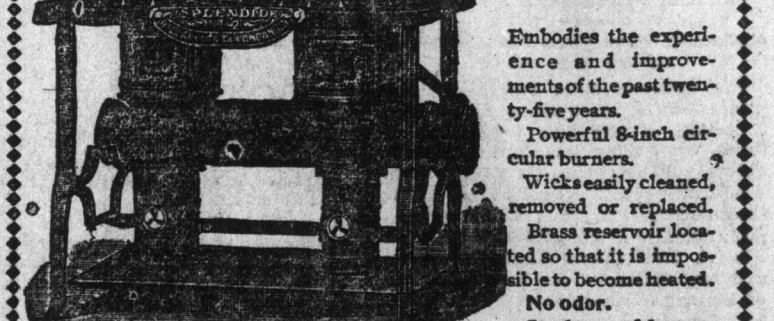
