

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THE STATE AND INDIAN SCHOOLS

Discussion on the Granting of Government Money for Teaching Religion—Prof. Farmer's Previews.

"Religion is a matter which the State must leave alone. On the other hand the Church should not seek to control the State, but must attend to its own business."

Professor Farmer of McMaster University delivered himself thus at the Ministerial Association yesterday morning.

The latter supported State grants to Indian schools, Dr. Maclean of Knox College, favored the State.

Professor Farmer said religion was a matter for the State must leave alone, and mutual respect and independence must characterize the relations between Church and State.

To make such grants would violate principles of both Church and State. The latter should support State schools and the former religious schools.

Dr. Maclean supported the grants on the ground that the Indians were Government wards without the rights of citizenship.

The State must provide education for the Indians coupled with religious instruction. If it would not do this in itself it should seek aid from the churches.

The discussion will be resumed at a future date.
