Stetsenburg deciding to charge as the cheapest way out of the difficulty, led the attack at the head of his regiment. He fell with a bullet in his breast, dying instantly, about 200 yards from the breastworks.

Lieut. Sisson fell with a bullet in his heart, the bullet striking him near the picture of a girl suspended by a ribbon from his neck. In the meantime the artillery had arrived and shelled the trenches.

The Filipinos stood until the Nehraska troops were right on the trenches, and then they bolted to the second line of entrenchments, a mile back. The Nebraska Regiment lost two privates killed and had many wounded, including two lieutenants.

The Iowa Regiment had several wounded. The Utah Regiment had one officer and three men wounded.

Thirteen dead Filipinos were found in the trench. Their loss was comparatively small, on account of their safe shelter. The Americans carried the second trench with small loss, and are holding the town tonight.

He Was a Brave Fighter.

Col. Stetsenberg had won a reputation as pne of the bravest fighters in the army. He always led his regiment, and had achieved remarkable popularity with his men since the war began, although during his first poloneley the volunteers, who were not used to the rigid discipline of the regular troops, thought him a hard officer.

The loss of the Nebraska Regiment in the campaign is the greatest sustained by any regiment, and to-day's disaster has greatly saddened official circles and men. One and a half miles out of Newnan, a place believed to be favorable to the burning was reached. A little to the side of the road was a strong pine tree. Up to this the negro was marched, his back placed to the tree and his face to the crowd, which jostled closely about him.

He said not a word to this proceedings, but at the sight of three or four knives in the hands of members of the crowd about him, which seemed to forcast the terrible ordeal he was about to be put to, he sent up a yell which could be heard for a long distance. Instantly a hand grasping a knife shot out, and one of the negro's ears dropped into a hand ready to receive it. Hose pleaded pitifully for mercy and begged his tormentors to let him die. His cries went unheeded. The second ear went the way of the other.





The body of Andrew Lowe, the missing clerk in the Grand Trunk freight department, was found floating in the Bay at the foot of York-street bridge Saturday morning. The discovery was made by W. W. GERMANY'S DELEGATE FOR WAR

A Few Pertinent Extracts to Show Just Where the Emperor's Delegate Stands.

An Advocate of War.

The British newspapers this week have warmly taken up the question of Emperor William's choice of Prof. Von Stengel as a German delegate to the conference. It is pointed out tnat, judging from his writings, he is a declared advocate of war, and not of peace. Therefore the papers here confess themselves as being nonplussed at his selection and declare it is hardly possible the German Emperor can desire the success of the conference if he maintains his nomination.

Extracts from Prof. Von Stengel's pamphlet, "Der Ewige Friede" ("The Everlasting Peace"), have been reproduced. Some of his references to America are decidedly interesting. After declaring that the Germans least of all nations should support the "fantastic aspirations of the friends of peace," he says: "The Americans, intoxicated with success, will strive more and more to become the dominant power and dictate their law to Europe in any contest between America and Europe. Shall Germany stand peacefully on one side and bow humbly before America? Certainly not. This is already impossible, because political dominion is also economic dominion, and Germany must be politically and militarily powerful if she does not wish to go to economic destruction."

Further on, Prof. Von Stengel declares he does not know whether it was "mere madness or crime when perpetual peace was preached to the German nation," and describes the Czar's rescript as a "bombastically composed document."

David Christie Murray, in a London daily to-day, remarks that Europe is anxious to learn if, after this frank expression of his opinions Prof. Von Stengel's appointment will be confirmed by Emperor William, adding that if so it would be a saving not to hold the conference at all.
