TO INVESTIGATE IT.

Washington, Oct. 31 .-- The United States consul at Liverpool has cabled to the State Department that two cases of bubonic plague and a few other suspicious cases have developed in a hospital in Liverpool. Surgeon-General Wyman has cabled As-sistant-Surgeon Thomas, who did similar work in the outbreak at Glasgow some months ago, to proceed immediately to Liverpool, and investigate the outbreak and keep this government advised of the situation. This is the first outbreak of plague in Liverpool in the recollection authorities here.
